\$83,436.81 Paid Farmers Here

First 1939 Cotton Parity Checks received on August 31, 1939. Since that date more checks have arrived on September 2, 6, 8, 12, and 13th.

At present 2529 checks have been received, aggregating a total of \$83,436.81, which is being dispersed as rapidly as farmers can be notified of their arrival.

In all probability the remainder of the 1939 Parity Checks will be delivered during September.

Applications for the 1939 Agricultural Conservation Checks will be signed upon arrival of such applications in the county A.C.A. office, which will be in October according to information from the State AAA office.

Farmers are again urged to complete the plowing under of green manure crops and report same to county office for final check up.

Presbyterians Meet In Waco

With "Evangelism" as the keynote and the major matter of emphasis, Central Texas Presbytery met in regular fall session in Waco Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. A good representation of the churches was present at the meeting.

Dr. C. T. Caldwell of Waco was elected moderator, Rev. W. R. Hall, Jr., of Fairfield, temporary clerk, and Rev. Ed Bayless of Gatesville, press reporter. Rev. Andy Byers of Taylor was re-elected Stated Clerk for a term of three years.

Uppermost in the minds of the whole court was the Assembly-wide "Evangelistic Crusade," launched by the General Assembly in May. Intent of the campaign is to arouse the interest of the Church in the task of evangelism and direct special attention to this matter during the present church year.

The Committee on Bible Cause reminded Presbytery that several other communions have given official endorsement to the teaching of the Bible in public schools in Texas. Presbytery, following action of previous courts, voted to do likewise, and urged upon the ministers and elders the opportunity open thru the ruling of the State Department of Education which permits the teaching of the Bible for credit in the high schools. Members of Presbytery were urged to use their influence to have their cities follow the lead of the seventy-seven schools which last year offered the course. Several expressions of the favor and good will with which the course has been met were heard.

Methodists Begin Revival Sunday

Revival services at the Methodist Church begin Sunday morning with the pastor, Rev. S. L. Culwell, doing the preaching, and Rev. W. M. Culwell leading the singing and working with the children and young people. The singer will arrive in Gatesville Monday afternoon in time for the evening service.

Services will be conducted during the week at 10 o'clock in the morning and 7:45 o'clock in the evening, the pastor announces. Special sermon subjects are being announced, and plans are being made for a wide spread revival effort throughout the church.

The entire community has been invited to participate in and enjoy the services.

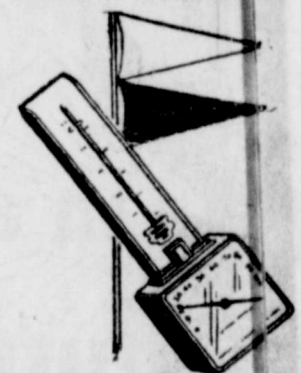

**OX-CART TO ROCKETPORT—
SAGA OF TRANSPORTATION
UNFOLDED AT FAIR**

NEW YORK—From the ox-cart to the rocketport of the future, the history of transportation of the human race is developed in eight startling exhibits in the Transportation Zone of the New York World's Fair.

Here visitors arriving at the Fair by plane, train, bus and boat can see exhibits dramatizing the past, present and future of man's movements from place to place. At the General Motors Futurama they are whisked across the Norman Bel Geddes conception of Highways and Horizons of 1960 in moving chairs. In the Ford exhibition they can ride in gaily colored automobiles, driven by skilled and talkative college men up and down the half-mile of spiral cork and rubber roadways which constitute the Ford conception of the Road of Tomorrow.

Flanking these attractions are two immense tire exhibits—Firestone where the visitor can watch the process by which crude rubber and fabric are fashioned into an automobile tire, and the Goodrich exhibit where Jimmie Lynch and his crew of daredevils subject tires to smashing, crashing abuse by death-defying stunts on a steeply banked oval track.

The Chrysler Company's conception of future transportation comes with the simulated launching of a London-bound rocket ship from a rocket gun in New York.

The other three big exhibits in

the area, the Marine, Aviation and Railroad exhibits, concern themselves with the miraculous means of getting from place to place today.

The Marine Building, whose entrance is between the prows of two great ships, stresses the comfort, convenience and safety of modern sea travel. On out-door tracks the Railroad Exhibit has parked the ultra-modern rolling stock which goes to make up crack trains on the various railroads of the world.

The Aviation Building is built to simulate a modern airport on the inside. A beacon flashes continuously across a dioramic sky from which full-sized airplanes appear to swoop in for a landing.

Around the edge of the great hall are exhibits of motors, structural details, and various communication and safety devices which have gone to make air travel such an important phase of modern transportation.

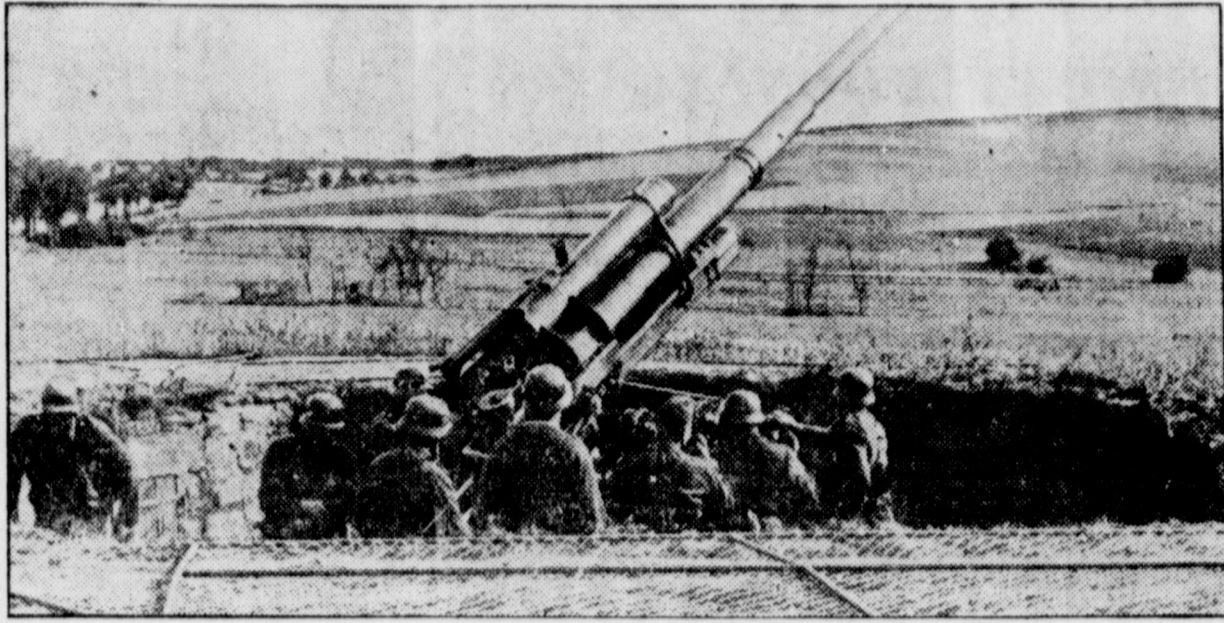

Debt Session To Aid Farmers

Worthy farmers of Coryell County who are hard pressed by debt will be considered at a session of the debt adjustment committee which meets at 10:00 o'clock on Monday, September 25th, at Farm Security Office, Gatesville, Texas.

"Many farmers of the county are so hampered by their debts they haven't much chance to farm profitably and eventually pay out," said George C. Moore, county Farm Security Administrator supervisor. "The sensible thing for them to do is sit down with their creditors and work out a business-like agreement to settle these obligations on a basis consistent with the farmers' debt-paying ability."

"They shouldn't wait until they are already delinquent and possibly foreclosure proceedings have begun," he emphasized. "The committee can give better advice if the situation is not complicated by delinquent interest, foreclosure proceedings, etc."

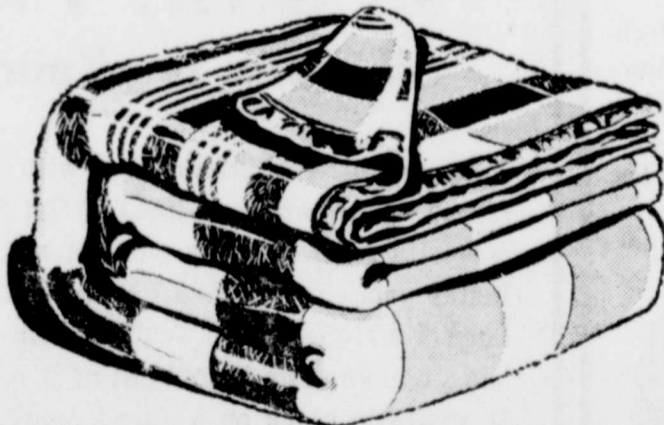

Why Make the Job Harder?

It takes about five times as much labor to soak and feed milo to hogs as to feed it dry, and the pigs actually made more gain on dry milo than on soaked milo, according to tests at the Texas

Experiment Station. Threshed grain fed in a self-feeder, and dry milo heads fed on a clean, dry platform, with a protein supplement, got better results with less effort than by soaking the grain and hand-feeding.

Why do pigs do better when the table is set twenty-four hours a day, and they eat free-choice, than when hand-fed two or three times a day? That they do, has long been known. Why does it take less grain and protein supplement to make 100 pounds of pork in a self-feeder than when it is dished out to the pigs at the extra trouble of two or three daily feedings?

We begin to get the answer when we learn that pigs in these tests made 23 trips to the self-feeder ever 24 hours, eating a little each time, masticating it un-hurriedly, and digesting it thoroughly. Hand-feeding lets them get so hungry between meals that they gobble the feed down greedily, swallow whole grain which cannot be digested. Accurate checks showed the self-fed pigs digested all but two pounds out of a hundred, of whole kafir grain, while hand-fed pigs wasted ten pounds in the hundred. At this rate the self-feeder repays the cost of materials very quickly.

Whatever grain is fed, whole or ground, the self-feeder saves labor and feed. If the feeder is properly constructed, and so placed that dirt does not blow into the feed, the feeding job is done with about two fillings of the self-feeder in the week.

It is understood, of course, that corn and the sorghum grains are deficient in proteins. A protein supplement of half tankage and half cottonseed meal should be provided in a separate self-feeder or a separate compartment from the grain. Shrimp or fish meal may be substituted for tankage. Green pasture is the ideal for getting best results in fattening hogs with grain and protein supplement in self-feeders, but if green pasture is not to be had, a protein supplement made up of 40 parts tankage (by weight), 40 parts cottonseed meal, and 20 parts green alfalfa meal may be substituted. Any good legume hay—peanut, pea, soybean etc.—cured green and ground may be substituted for ground alfalfa hay; with somewhat less digestibility than alfalfa, they are nevertheless high in protein and if cured green carry the essential vitamin A, which is lacking in dry grains.

It seems hardly necessary to refer to the mineral mixture, yet a few people still neglect this important factor in good hog feeding. Its lack may not be serious when hogs are running on good alfalfa or clover pastures, but it costs so little and is so easy to provide that it ought never to be neglected. The hogs will not eat it unless they need it, but their own

appetite is a better index of their nutritional needs than any man's guess.

The Texas Station says "a simple mineral mixture composed of equal parts by weight of bone meal ground limestone or oyster shell flour and salt, will furnish the necessary minerals." This mixture of course should be where the hogs can get at it at all times to prevent the leaching out of the soluble portions of the mixture.

Generally speaking there are better corn and other feed grain crops in the Southwest than last year. There are also more pigs to be fed. Fifteen per cent more sows farrowed in Arkansas last spring; 14 per cent more in Louisiana, 35 per cent more in Oklahoma, 20 per cent more in Texas. Whether grain is plentiful or scarce, however, it pays to buy the protein supplement if necessary, to use a self-feeder, and to furnish green pasture.

G. C. Moore Says FSA Doing Good

George C. Moore, Farm Security Administration Supervisor for this county, says that he is often asked, "How can the FSA make loans to farmers who can't get financing from any other source and actually get the money, back with interest?"

"The FSA is doing this right here in Coryell County," he said, "and the answer is that our farmers are doing 'planned farming'. Each farmer has worked out a sound farm and home plan that is adapted to the size and character of his farm, to the size and ability of his family, and also to the inclinations and special talents of his family."

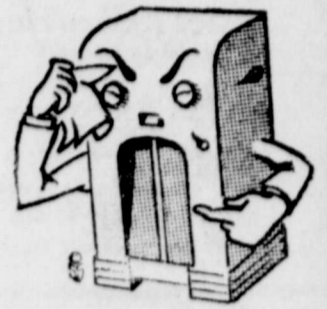
One hundred and thirty-four loans were made in this county last year. The notes come due over a two to five year period. Indications show that 100 per cent of money due this year on the 134 loans will be repaid with interest. These farmers could not get credit elsewhere or were faced with foreclosure. This does not include the renewals and farmers who previously borrowed and did not need loans.

"Planned farming is responsible for this remarkable record, and many farmers reason that if this farm and home plan will put a near-bankrupt farmer back on his feet, it will help also to put a more successful one on the road to greater success." Mr. Moore said copies of the plan could be had by calling or writing to his office, or to the Texas Farm Se-

curity Administration Office in Dallas.

He warned that the plan first appears complicated, but that it is simple enough when taken step by step.

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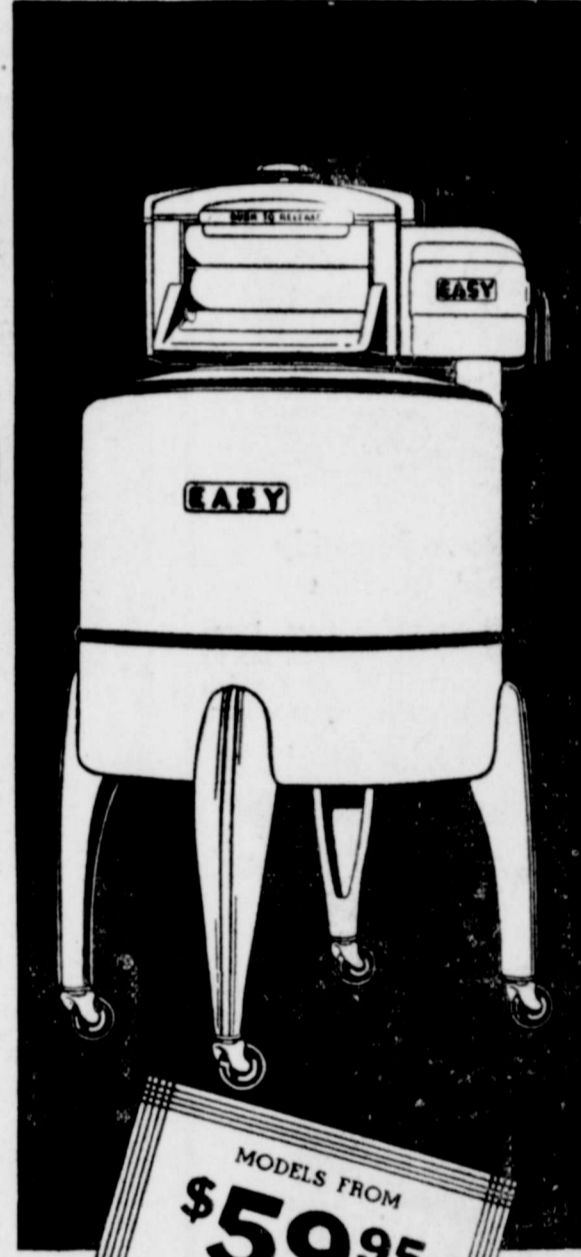
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WHAT HAS GONE BEFORE:

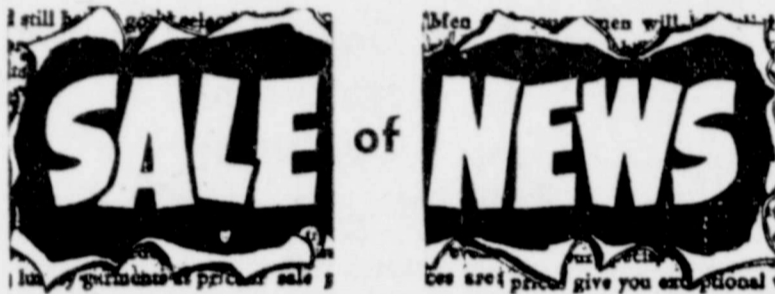
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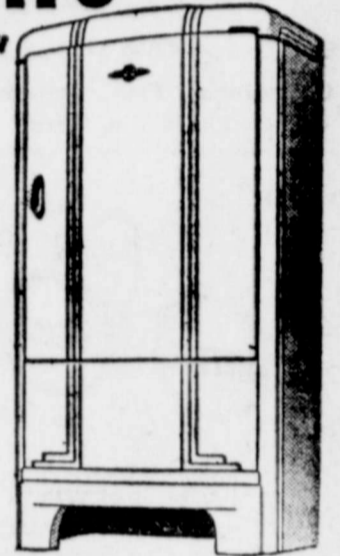
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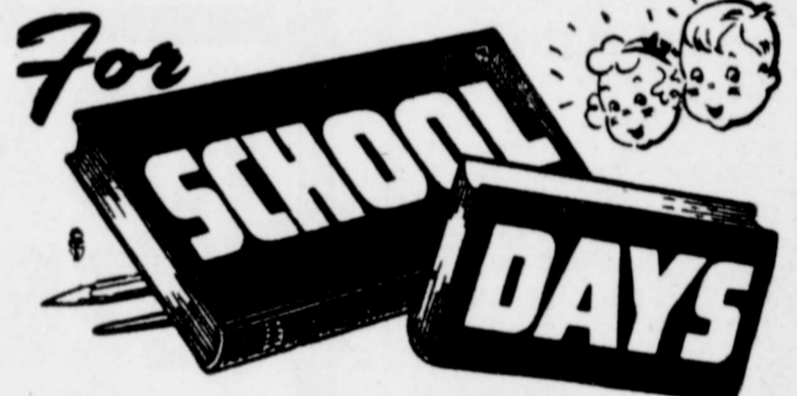
