Neutrality

Here are excerpts from the address delivered by Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage of this, the Eleventh Congressional District, just before his departure for Washington Monday night.

Congressman Poage delayed his departure at the invitation of two Waco American Legion Posts, the James Edmond Post No. 121 and Waco Post No. 440. Immediately after delivering the address he left by automobile for Washington to be present at the opening of the Special Session of Congress, which opened yesterday.

"Freedom for the individual, Peace for the Nation-these are the greatest blessings that a government can bestow on its people. In calling the Congress to consider a revision of our laws affecting our transactions with foreign nations, President Roosevelt has carried out the American way of submitting such problems to the representatives of the people.

Many of the people think that the present neutrality law would keep America out of war; some look on the present law as a cloak of isolation for the United States. In brief, the present neutrality law simply provides that, when a more nations of the world, it becomes the duty of the President to issue a proclamation of American ter this proclamation is issued it becomes unlawful for any American citizen to sell any arms, ammunition, or implements of war to any beligerent nation or citizen thereof, or to any neutral for reshipment to a beligerent. That is all there is to our much-discussed neutrality law.

As I see it, the present law is not so neutral after all. Clearly it aids Germany and Russia and handicaps England and France, but after all, that is not the law's this law has a chance to keep us out of war.

The travel of American citizens in the war zone is certain, sooner or later, to involve our country Americans continue to ride British or the ships of any other beligerent, it is sure that some of them will ultimately lose their lives, and when that happens it is going to be very doubtful whether we mediate threat to our neutrality lies in the movement of goods into the war zone on American ships, and the present law does nothing to prevent this.

Reports, are, however, that there will be a fight by the opposition forces, headed by Hiram Johnson of California, Senator Vandenburg, and Senator Borah.





The country is full of Americans, and we saw every day, cars with license plates from every state in the United States as well as from points in Canada.

The Mexican people in the interior are a high type of people and seemed to want to over do themselves, to try and make Americans feel at home, and welcome, they are probably the most polite and most patient people in the world and will really go out of their way in order to try to render a small service. In fact the trip was just one thrill after another, from beginning to finish, did not have to shift a gear on the entire trip and not even a flat tire to cause the least inconvenience. We all learned a wonderful lot, and saw many interesting things. It was really a revelation and an education to all of us, and we got back home feeling one hundred per cent better in every way, for having had an opportunity to get a little rest and some fresh air up among the clouds.
