

ALBERT PERRY, FORMER GATESVILLE RESIDENT DIES IN FLORIDA

(From Hamilton Herald-Record) Albert Cornelius Perry, born at Paris, Texas, September 8, 1896 came to Hamilton with his mother and stepfather, Mrs. W. T. James and husband, and his brother, Wyatt Perry, at the age of ten years. He attended the public schools, but did not finish the high school course before entering into occupation for a livelihood. He was outstanding in character, and had an unusually fine, genial disposition that won for him numerous friends who were admiring and warmly loyal. The news of his untimely death came as a sad blow to all Hamilton people who knew Albert Perry.

The young man had lived in Hamilton very little since he came; home from overseas where he served in the active fighting of the World War and afterward with the Army of Occupation in Germany. He suffered from the effects of the deadly German gas, and within the past several years had been an invalid. He received treatment in various hospitals and sanatoriums, but had been at his home in St. Petersburg, Florida, for some twelve months with his family and attended by a trained nurse, when the end came on September 7, at 6:30 o'clock in the

While living in Gatesville, Albert Cornelius Perry was married to Miss Maggie Byrom, a member of a prominent family in that city. He was the father of a son, Charles Albert Perry. Survivors are the widow and her son; Mrs. W. T. James, mother of Albert Perry, and his half-brother, Garland James, of Hamilton, and a brother, Wyatt Perry, of Perryton, Texas, all of whom with W. T. James, the devoted step-father, attended the funeral

The news story taken in part! from St. Petersburg newspaper

"Albert Cornelius Perry, 42, retired salesman, who came here 14 years ago from Gatesville, Texas, died this morning, September 7, at 6:30 o'clock, at his home, 1929 Sixteenth street, south. Mr. Perry, who was born in Paris, Texas, was a member of the First Presbyterian Church here, the Masonic Lodge at Hamilton, Texas, and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in St. Petersburg.

"Funeral services for Albert Perry will be held tomorrow afternoon, September 11, at 2:30 o'clock at the Baynard chapel with the Rev. Dr. James A. McGuire, DD, officiating. Burial will be in Royal Palm cemetery.'

AUTOMOBILE LAW EFFEC-TIVE OCTOBER FIRST

After October 1, prospective car buyers will be required to have a "Certificate of Title" which shows where he got the car, and who owned it before. The cost to the motorist will be 25c, it is said.

Attorney General Gerald Mann ruled that liens placed on tires, automobile radios, parts and accessories should be noted on the certificates of title as liens on motor vehicles under the new law effective Oct. 1.

The law is designed to catch up with car theives and those attempting to sell mortgaged automobiles. Tax assessor-collectors issue the certificates.



I think it is time for the United States to quit being delivery boy. But our present law puts no restrictions on delivery of goodsthrough the war zone in American boats-. As I see it, if we follow this movement of American ships to R. N. Shelton and wife. into the war zone to continue it is certain to lead us into war. I E. West Jr. and wife. want to stop all American ships, no matter what they carry, from ris. going into the war zone. I also want to keep all American citizens out of the war zone, no matter what their business. The present the almond of the U.S.

law allows Americans to sail on the ships of belligerents just as it did in 1917, and if we don't change it we will see the same things happen that happened in 1917. The present law also allows American citizens to sell goods to citizens of warring nations on credit just as they did in 1917. This is another serious danger point. If we allow American financers to acquire a financial interest in the outcome of the war they are likely to lead us into war. I want to change these weak spots. So does President Roosevelt. I would do nothing that seemed capable of leading us any nearer to war, nor would I let anything remain undone that might keep us out of war. All nations lose. I fear that our free institutions of American Democracy might not withstand the pressure of modern war. I feel that we have no right to subject them to the test. I likewise feel that America has no right to gamble with our nation's future and with the whole future of civilization-and that is what we country in war. I, therefore, feel that we have no right to allow the same conditions to continue to exist which led us into the war in 1917. We know that in 1917 the presence of American citizens in the war zone was the immediate spark that set off our entrance. We know that this spark was lit against a background of credit sales to warring nations. The present law allows both of these errors to be repeated. I think if we are to save America we must learn

I listened in person, as I am sure you did over radio, to the President's speech yesterday. I I was only disappointed that he would even suggest allowing American ships or American citizens in the war zones under ANY circumstances. I believe we should KEEP THEM OUT. I don't think that there is any such thing as "travel at your own risk". No matter what warnings have been given when the American flag is shot down and America ships are sunk, the passions of our people are going to become so aroused that it will be most difficult to keep out of war. For my part, I prefer to say to all American cit-izens and ships- "Stay Out of Europe." If they don't stay out we can't stay out. I therefore think our government has a duty and a

right to keep them out. Inasmuch as the House passed a neutrality bill last session, which is now pending in the Senate, all of the fight will be in the Senate until that body acts and sends the bill back to us with such amendments as they may have put onto it.
