WAR GUILT Part III

Part III of this series of four articles on war guilt will present chronologically the record of all warring powers since 1919, in this manner assessing to each state its true and proportionate responsibility for the present war and establishing on the basis of accepted facts that Germany is not alone guilty for the war.

Here is the record:
FRANCE: Blocked every effort to induce the victorious powers to disarm, as promised in the Treaty of Versailles, 1919 to 1933.

Carried on economic war upon prostrate Germany, 1919-1929.

Dominated the League of Nations, which put the seal of approval upon Polish seizures of Silesia in 1921 and Wilno in 1924.

Occupied the Ruhr valley of

Germany on thin reparations pretext, 1923, with Prime Minister Poincaré privately expressing hope the Germans would not pay so France could annex the valley.

Unofficially supported Japanese invasion of Manchuria until realizing her stand was undermining her own insistence upon sanctity of the Versailles treaty, 1931.

Blocked effective sanctions against Italy when the latter invaded Ethiopia, 1935.

Sacrificed Czechoslovakia to appeasement policy, 1938.

Violated Syrian mandate by letting Turks take district in deal for Anglo-Franco-Turkish alliance, 1939.

Defaulted on war debts to the United States up to and including the present time.

ENGLAND: Carried on intermittent bombing of tribes on north west frontier of India, 1920-1939.

Supported Japan against the United States at time of Manchurian invasion, 1931.

Failed to deal effectively with Italian aggression in Ethiopia, 1935.

Sacrificed Czechoslovakia to appeasement policy, 1938.

Broke Balfour promise of a Jewish homeland in Palestine, 1938-39.

Defaulted on war debts to U. S. up to and including the present time.

GERMANY: Spent from 1919 to 1933 complaining against the treaty of Versailles and trying to evade many of its provisions.

Spent from 1933 to 1939 tearing up the treaty of Versailles.

Decreed military conscription, 1935.

Occupied the Rhineland in violation of the Locarno treaty, 1936. Invaded and annexed Austria, 1938.

Sliced off a portion of Czechoslovakia, 1938.

Invaded and annexed the remainder of Czechoslovakia, 1939. Took Memel from Lithuania by extortion, 1939.

Started, according to the best information available, at present, a new world war, 1939.

POLAND: Seized a large part of upper Silesia from the League of Nations in defiance of the result of a plebiscite, 1921.

Seized Wilno, capital of Lithuania, 1924.

Mistreated German and Ukrainian minorities, 1919 to 1939.

Seized Teschen area from prostrate Czechoslovakia, 1938.

Are there any clean hands in Europe today? If you still think so reread the record as printed above. Read it and reread it if you are not convinced that Britain and France are now reaping the whirlwind which resulted from their own actions from 1919 to 1933.

The final article of this series will deal with the role of the U. S. in international policies since 1918 and will review the heavy responsibility of American diplomacy for the failure to establish lasting peace in Europe.

Rev. M. O. Cheek of Waco, Baptist district missionary, reported Sunday that an overwhelming majority of central Texas Baptist church are cooperating in a special October mission campaign of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. This week was full of rumors, some of peace in Europe and some of further aggression. Unfortunately, everyone seems to agree that a Russian conquest of Finland seems more probable than any general peace. By the time you read this a week from the day it is written you will doubtless know whether these fears were well founded. There has been more expressed sympathy for Finland here in Washington than for any of the European people. This is doubtless due to the fact that Finland is the only European nation that has continued to keep up the payments on its debt to the United States. It should not be assumed, however, that because this country protested to Russia that we would allow ourselves to become involved in war by reason of our friendship or respect for the Finns.

At the same time, that has been little enthusiasm for the suggestion that the United States try to mediate the European trouble. From the recent statements of European leaders it is clear that England and France are standing firm in their demand that Germany give some kind of assurance that Poland and Czechoslovakia be restored, while Hitler is just as firm in his claim that the disposition of these people be left to him and to Russia. I can not see how we could bring such different views together, and I fear that were we to attempt it we would surely become involved on one side or the other. I want the United States to do everything possible to shorten any war, but I don't want the United States to become involved. Until there is a change in feeling in Europe I see no possibility for us to render any service to humanity, and I see lots of danger to our own country in any efforts we may make to act as mediators. Certainly, we could not, in good conscience, ask England and France to agree to the complete destruction of Poland and Czechoslovakia,

and certainly in view of Mr. Hitler's official statements we could not insist on the restoration of the nations without offering offense to Germany.

There has been much more debate in the House this week than heretofore. Even though the Neutrality Bill is now being considered officially by the Senate, the House is getting a rather thorough discussion of the whole subject. Many members are taking advantage of this opportunity to speak, and they are often questioned extensively. In this way the question will have been thoroughly debated in the House by the time it comes over from the Senate, and there should be little delay on this side. I hope to get home sometime next month.

The National Postmaster's Convention has been going on here in Washington this week. Last night they served more than 3500 delegates at one dinner in one hotel here. Hon. Nathan Roberson, Postmaster at Temple, was the only postmaster here from our district, but I met a number of friends from other parts of the State. Hon. Burriss Jackson, Postmaster at Hillsboro, had all of the Texas postmasters and all of the Texas Congressmen as his guests Wednesday.

These postmasters are a fine bunch of fellows, but I am sure that the public does not realize just how much trouble their appointments cause the Congressmen. We don't have enough authority to go out and pick the friends we want without any red-tape, and yet we have just enough influence in connection with these appointments to be blamed by most of the disappointed applicants and their friends. Congressmen can only influence these appointments within very limited lines, and I am sure that every Congressman would be delighted to be relieved of the responsibility
