Facilities for classing the cotton have now been completed and approved warehouses may immediately begin sending in their samples direct, in accordance with the instructions they have received.

HOSPITAL CLOSES DOORS SOON, IS REPORT FROM OPERATORS ISSUED

One of Gatesville's service institutions closes its doors within the next few weeks, according to information received from Drs. Dean B. Jones and Kermit R. Jones.

This hospital, established in 1936 has served this county and town since its opening, and it is with regret that we are asked to make this announcement. A like announcement in reference to the Hamilton hospital was carried in a recent edition of The Hamilton-Herald-Record.

The following statement was given us yesterday by the management:

"It is with profound regret that we announce the necessity of closing, to the people of this community, an institution of service—the local hospital.

To those whose cooperation we have had, we extend our thanks,

and to any who would undertake a new organization of this type for the good of the people, we offer our humble assistance."

Efforts are being made by Rev. Edward S. Bayless, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, and other parties interested, including a committee of the Chamber of Commerce, to see what can be done to keep this, or a similar institution open, which is admittedly needed in both the town and county.

As yet no definite plan has materialized by which the citizenship of the county can be assured of this convenience and service. Possibly, in the near future, some plan will be worked out with a view of having a hospital here for the service of people of the county and vicinity.

Bulldogs Crush Hornets 25-0, In Annual "Turkey-Day Tussle"

KITTRELL LEADS BULLDOG ATTACK. JONES STARS FOR HORNETS

Friday night approximately 3500 cheering football fans jammed the historic Wood field at McGregor and saw the classy McGregor Bulldogs sparked by the brilliant Bulldog back, M. L. Kittrell, soundly out-played a stubborn squad of Gatesville Hornets by a score of 25-0.

The outcome of this game had no bearing whatever on the district race, McGregor having already cinched the title, but it was the renewal of a rivalry of many years standing between Gatesville and McGregor and a game that seldom, if ever, fails to fill the stands.

Local Fans Follow Hornets

The Hornets were not lacking in support in their last and most important game of the season for nine bus loads of students, the High School band, the pep squad and almost the entire citizenship of Gatesville excepting the night-watchman, followed the Hornets to McGregor for the game.

The mighty Kittrell aided by the heads-up playing of Bradshaw, Cook and Jones, smashed through the Hornet line at will and almost demoralized the entire Hornet crew with his slashing drives around right end.

Pedigo, 160 pound McGregor guard played a wonderful defensive game for the Bulldogs and was in the big middle of every play. Bradshaw was the ace receiver for Kittrell's passes and pulled down several for long, substantial gains deep into Gatesville territory. Murphy, Cook, Jones and Muegge, though not as brilliant as Pedigo and Kittrell, played jam-up football from start to finish and even the Bulldog sub-

stitutes who were sent in at regular intervals proved a credit to the team.

Jones Stars for Hornets

Jan Jones, one of the best punters in class A football was responsible for the excellent showin g that the Hornets made and sent long spiral punts down the field that would have made lots of college experts sit up and take notice.

Time after time his educated toe would send the ball zooming right from under some Bulldog's nose and high down the field and out of the danger zone. Ten times during this game he turned the trick for an average of 37 yards per punt and would have been better had the Hornet line not yielded so easily and forced him to rush the kicks.

In the backfield Jackson played wonderfully but was handicapped against the husky McGregor line. Whigham and White played their usual steady game and smashed thru on several occasions to down the slippery Kittrell who was fading back to shoot a pass to Bradshaw.

All in all it was a great game. A game between two teams who put out everything they had in a grim determined effort to win no matter what the odds.

And now as the final curtain begins to fall on the 1939 football season we are confident that the better team won, and without the slightest regret we doff our hats to the District A football champions, the McGregor Bulldogs.

PLAY BY PLAY First Quarter

Gatesville receives, Kittrell holding, Cook kicks, ball is taken by Foster on the 18 and returned 3 before being tackled by Pedigo and Muegge. Jackson picks up about 15 over center. Kirkpatrick drives through C for 2 Hornets draw 15 yard penalty for holding. Jones punts nicely to Kittrell

who takes ball on his own 40 and returns to 43 where he is brought down by Whigham and Wittie.

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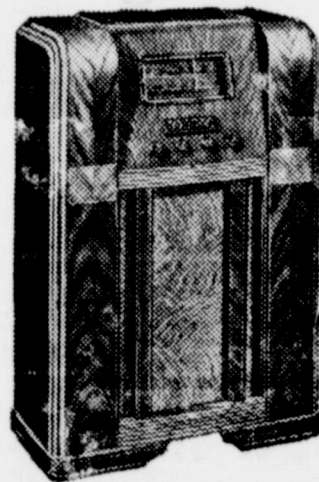
