



Workers in crowded government and commercial shipyards are driving rivets in 103 craft.

Germany's spectacular undersea sinking of a British battle ship and an aircraft carrier and Nazi air raids on fleet bases have failed apparently to shake official confidence in surface vessels.

The navy, by all indications, intends to speed the construction of more and larger battleships just as if a U-boat had not sunk Britain's 29,150-ton Royal Oak.

Official circles believe that Congress will be asked for funds to start two more 45,000-ton floating fortresses, sister ships of the two on which the first rivets are to be driven soon.

More than \$900,000,000 will be required for next year, by preliminary budgetary estimates, to continue work on vessels on the ways, start the two additional battleships, a score or more other craft and several hundred airplanes, and provide for the increase of 29,000 men whom President Roosevelt ordered recruited.

By 1944, the navy hopes to reach the goal set up in the 1938 expansion act; 18 battleships, approximately 45 cruisers, 150 destroyers, 56 submarines, eight aircraft carriers and 3,000 warplanes.

Today it is reliably asserted that Britain produces a thousand planes a month-which equals Germany's replacement rate about which Col. Lindbergh was so enthusiastic.

The French air ministry even predicts that the two allies ultimately will turn out three times as many planes as will Germanyand as good or better than those of the now pre-eminent Nazi air

The British now have fighter planes that can make 350 miles an hour or more and buzz about a slower bomber like mosquitoes. In an hour and a half British bombers could fly to Hamburg, whose importance to German warmaking is not always fully appreciated. For in Hamburg are the main German plants for producing gasoline.

According to recent French figures, the needs of France can be supplied by the colonies in the following amounts: Rice 100 per cent, cacao 100 per cent, bananas 100 per cent, Indian corn 100 per cent, sugar cane 100 per cent, tea 100 per cent, vegetable oils 100 per cent, meat 80 per cent, coffee 40 per cent, rubber 100 per cent, nickel 100 per cent, chromium 100 per cent, manganese 30 per

Figures have not been given, but the French colonies also produce much cotton which France could use for the manufacture of high explosives and a great deal of wool for clothing.

Not less important is the suport the colonies can give in way of soldiers and workers. The Algerians, Tunisians, Morroccans and black Senegalese were among the finest shock troops the French had in the last world war. In that conflict the French colonies furnished a total of 587,450 soldiers and 200,000 laborers, who dug trenches, laid railway tracks and performed a lot of other necessary then. war work.

It is estimated that in the present war these same colonies will be able to furnish 2,000,000 soldiers and 500,000 workers.

T'ville Wins 6-Man Championship; Defeats Cop. Cove 35 to 22

BRASHER LEADS MATES TO VICTORY IN THRILLING stopped at RE by Adams for no Fabian takes the kickoff, and yards. Adams plunges the ball to ball over the goal line for a touch-CLIMAX OF 6-MAN SEASON

The Coryell County Six-Man Football league was brought to a thrilling climax Thursday afternoon as an inspired half-dozen from Turnersville and a powerful six-man squad from Copperas Cove battled it out in the "Butter Bowl" in a game which was to decide the District Champions of the six-man league and when the final whistle had blown the scoreboard read: Turnersville 35, Copperas Cove 22.

Nine thrilling touchdown plays were enacted during the game and the ball on a hand-off from Mathe lead switched from one team to the other on several occasions.

Turnersville took and early lead and run the score up to 13 points before Coppras Cove ever crossed paydirt, but Adams and Mathias started a series of line plunges and as the game advanced well into the third quarter, Copperas Cove was out in front by a score of 22

With four and a half minutes to play Turnersville rallied and Brashier and Huckabee gathered in 15 points to cinch the contest and win the six-man Championship Trophy.

In one of the most spine-tingling plays of the game, Brashier, Turnersville halfback took the kickoff and raced 51 yards for a touchdown. Later in the game he tried the same end around play again and was finally overtaken by Mathias after a brilliant 46 yard run that looked like a sure touchdown.

It was a real ball game between two well coached team. Two teams who had played a tough schedule and come through with nine victories and one defeat each.

Now for the play by play.

Mathias holding and Adams kicking the ball is taken by Brasher on about the 20 yard stripe and returned 10 yards. Huckabee carries the ball around RE for 20 yards before he is finally pulled down by Dewald. Leonard stops Huckabee at C for no gain. Walker plunges over C for 4 yards. Walker over C again for 4 yards. Huckabee after a bit of fancy brokenfield running breaks through the Copperas Cove defense at RE and gets loose for 20 yards before being nailed by Faubian. Walker plows over C for 4 yards and a touchdown. Brasher crashes over C for extra point.




