





Speaking on the World Youth Conference held recently in Amsterdam, Mr. Ellis Nelson of Austin will be in the county Tuesday. He will speak in the Unity Presbyterian Church, Turnersville, Tuesday night, and address the student bodies of the Gatesville and Turnersville schools.

Mr. Nelson, Director of Student Work in the University Presbyterian Church, Austin, has been prominent in student and Young People's work for the past several years. He was two years president of the Young People's League of the Synod of Texas and one year President of Assembly's Council, organization of young people embracing the entire Presbyterian Church in the United States.

This past summer Mr. Nelson one of America's representatives in a world Youth Conference held in Amsterdam shortly before the outbreak of the war. A report on such a unique and significant meeting should be of general interest, and of particular interest to the school pupils because of the part played by the youth of the world.

Mr. Nelson will speak to the Gatesville High School at 10:45 to the Junior High School immediately afterward; and to the Turnersville High School and upper elementary grades at 2:30. He will speak in the Unity Presbyterian Church at 7:00 o'clock.
