## Social Security RECEIPTS

## EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1st, 1940

SECTION 1403a OF THE INTERNAL REVENUE CODE READS AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. 1403, (a) Every employer shall furnish to each of his employees a written statement or statements, in a form suitable for retention by the employee, showing the wages paid by him to the employee after December 31, 1939. Each statement shall cover a calendar year, or one, two, three or four calendar quarters, whether or no within the same calendar year, and shall show the name of the employer, the name of the embloyee. the deriod covered by the statement, the total amount of wages pair within such period, and the amount of the tax imposed by section 1400 with respect to such wages. Each statement shall be furnished to the employee not later than the last day of the second calendar month following the period covered by the statement, except that, if the employee leaves the employ of the employer, the final statement shall be furnished on the day on which the last payment of wages is made to the employee. The employer may, at his option, furnish such a statement to any employee at the time of each payment of wages to the employee during any calendar quarter; and in such case, the statement may show the date of payments of the wages, in lieu of the period covered by the statement.

Sub-section (b) of the new section provides for a civil penalty of not more than $\$ 5.00$ for each wilful failure to furnish the statement in the manner, at the time, and showing the information required.
