## Passion Play To Be Shown Here

Thursday, March 7, the Passion Play, will be shown at the high school carrying the title of Golgotha, and this is the first and only talking motion picture made of the famous Passion Play. It is an all-English version and is touring the country at the request of civic and religious leaders.

There is a cast of thousands, and the finest stars obtainable are said to be in the cast. The production cost \$800,000, and the picture is acclaimed throughout the world as a masterpiece.

Golgotha is a full length picture and the complete showing is on hour and forty minutes long.

"Film Daily" writes: "It is really an extraordinary picture. The sweep of the production is tremendous, and yet handled with simple dignity. No mob scenes such as these has ever been recorded on film. They are breathtaking and awe inspiring. Innumerable close-ups are given of dozens of members in the cast, spectators in the various scenes, leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth. The picture follows with absolute fidelity the New Testament accounts, a moving spectacle thruout of reverence, power and beauty.

At least ten bands from cities all over Texas will be in the line of march, which will include a splash of colors as 175 cowboys and cowgirls (top rodeo riders of the world) pass in review during the three-mile parade.

John B. Davis, secretary-manager, announced that Amon Carter, Fort Worth publisher and civic leader, and Mayor T. J. Harrell have been invited to lead the parade. Mayor Harrell will be honored this Spring by the Fort Worth Exchange Club as the city's most valuable citizen.

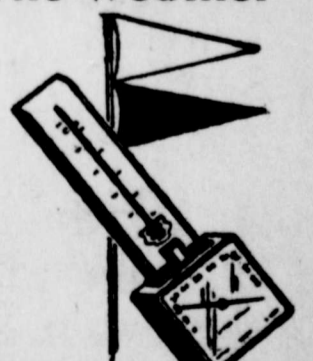

### MR. WELLES MISSION

The circumstance attending Mr. Sumner Wells' visit to Europe have been misconstrued and distorted out of all reason. Publicity accorded the visit of the under-secretary of State to Rome, Berlin, Paris and London has, on the one hand, aroused undue optimism in some quarters relative to the early establishment of peace, and, on the other hand, created apprehension that Mr. Welles might be another Colonial House, committing this government to undertakings in Europe.

Neither of these assumptions is correct; neither is based to any extent upon fact.

Mr. Welles is embarked solely upon an exploratory tour of the belligerent states to ascertain if there is any possible basis for the establishment of peace this spring or fall. He is not empowered to enter into peace negotiations on behalf of this government, nor does he carry peace proposals from President Roosevelt.

To regard Mr. Welles' mission as the forerunner of an immediate peace settlement is to disregard totally the existing state of affairs in Europe. At present there is no feasible basis for peace. Both of the belligerents—the Allies and Germany—have intact huge armies which they mobilized in September and preceding months.

For either the Allies or the Nazis to capitulate now would provoke immediate revolution against the government which attempted such a step.

The peoples of England and France are resolved to carry this war to a successful conclusion, and to them a successful conclusion does not mean compromise but rather the destruction of Hitlerism and of the constant threats to their security. Any move by their leaders to make peace, short of this goal, would surely provoke violent reactions among their peoples who have suffered so much. Capitulation—perhaps even compromise—by Hitler would destroy the foundations of National Socialism.

To interpret active intervention by the United States in Europe from a routine fact-finding tour is to imply shortsightedness unworthy even of Mr. Roosevelt. Colonel House was a secret representative of President Wilson who moved surreptitiously from capital to capital in Europe, who cloaked his movements in the utmost secrecy and—most important of all—who made commitments which President Wilson was unable to honor.

In these respects, Colonel House will have no counterpart in our Mr. Welles.

Undoubtedly the Welles' tour was inspired by a number of motives on the part of President Roosevelt. The President is an experienced hand at striking at the psychological moment, in order to attain the utmost in results. Launching the Welles' tour at this time is predicated upon the belief that public opinion in the belligerent states may be influenced to such an extent that the spring offensives will be delayed.

Furthermore, Mr. Roosevelt de-

sires to end the war, if possible, before it is extended to new fronts, possibly Scandinavia, the Balkans and Russia, engulfing new millions of peoples now neutral and a vastly greater geographical area.

Continuation of the war, even on its present basis, will inevitably have an adverse effect upon the American economic system and in so doing will threaten the new deal reforms.

Coupled with these factors the natural inclination of the President to right the wrongs of the world, to be the initiator of the peace which will restore Europe to normalcy.

It is reasonable to assume that the future course of this govern-

ment in relation to the war will be based upon the information which Mr. Welles submits to Messrs. Roosevelt and Hull upon his return, some weeks hence.

Mrs. George B. Walker died after a short illness at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Isaac Lowrance, in Uvalde, Texas on February 21.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist at Gatesville on Feb. 23 with the Rev. C. M. Spalding, the pastor, conducting the services. Interment was made in the City cemetery.

Pallbearers were: John Reesing, Brick Powell, Gus Jones, Bert Pollard, Greeley Ricketts, and Garland Sydow.

Mary Ann Elizabeth Matthews was born Jan. 27, 1870 in Tennessee. She received her education at Waverly Academy in Tennessee and was a teacher in the schools of Arkansas for several years.

She was married to George B. Walker on Dec. 30, 1891. They moved to Texas in 1897 and settled in Coryell County, where they had resided since.

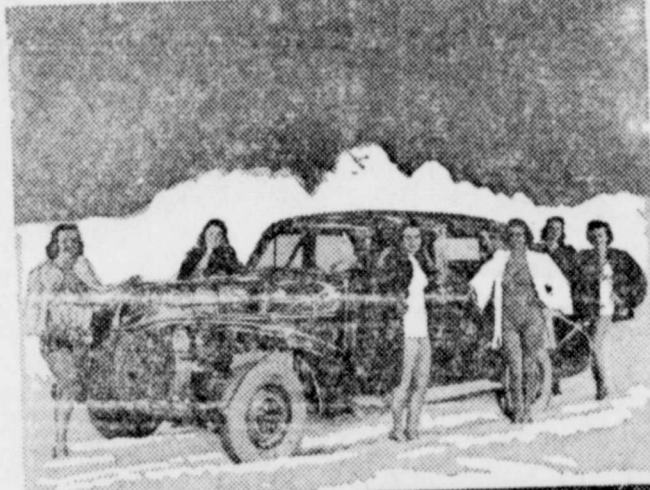

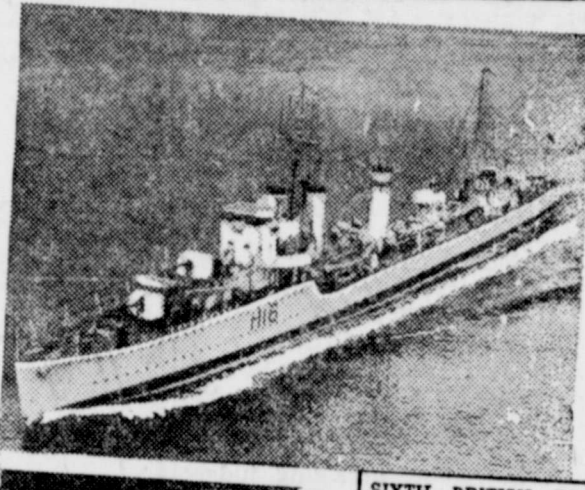
