

FAITH AT WORK

"Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well: the devils also believe, and tremble. But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead? Was not Abraham our father justified by works, when he offered Isaac his son upon the altar? Seest thou how faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect? And the scripture was fulfilled which saith, Abraham believed God, and it was imputed unto him for righteousness: and he was called the Friend of God. Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only." (James 2:19-20)

These passages are too simple to be misunderstood. Man must express his faith to be saved. To fail to do so is to have a "dead" faith. Many have a "historical faith", that is, they believe in the existence of God and Christ, but this is not a saving faith because it is not a working faith. Notice an example of this in John 12:42-43; "Nevertheless among the chief rulers also many believed on him; but because of the Pharisees they did not confess him, lest they should be put out of the synagogue: For they loved the praise of men more than the praise of God." Did these men believe? Yes! But their's was a dead faith because they did not prove that faith by doing what Jesus taught them to do.

We have an example of the proper kind of faith in Acts 18:8; "And Crispus, the chief ruler of the synagogue, believed on the Lord with all his house; and many of the Corinthians hearing-believed-and were baptized." Hence, these people had a saving faith because they did (obeyed) what God told them to do. People who do not have enough faith to do what God tells them to do will be lost. (Hebrews 5:8-9)

Man's plan will not save but faith (working faith) in God's plan results in salvation, (Romans 6:16-18)
