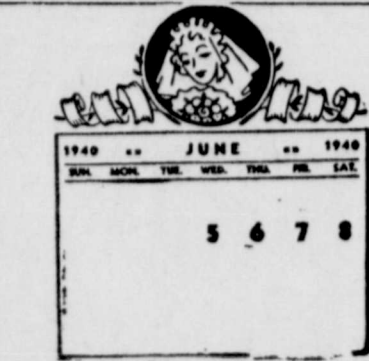

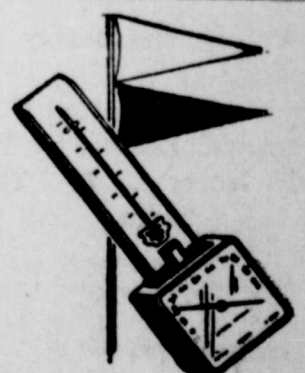
TWENTY-ONE GRADS FROM TURNERSVILLE HIGH SCHOOL

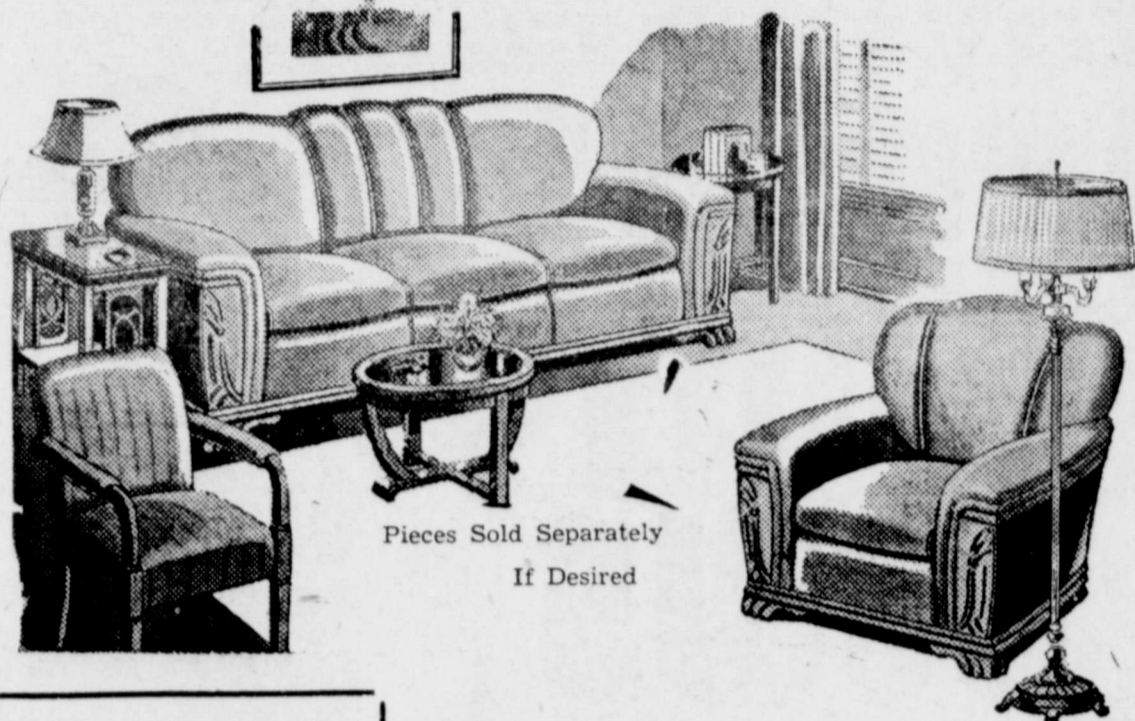

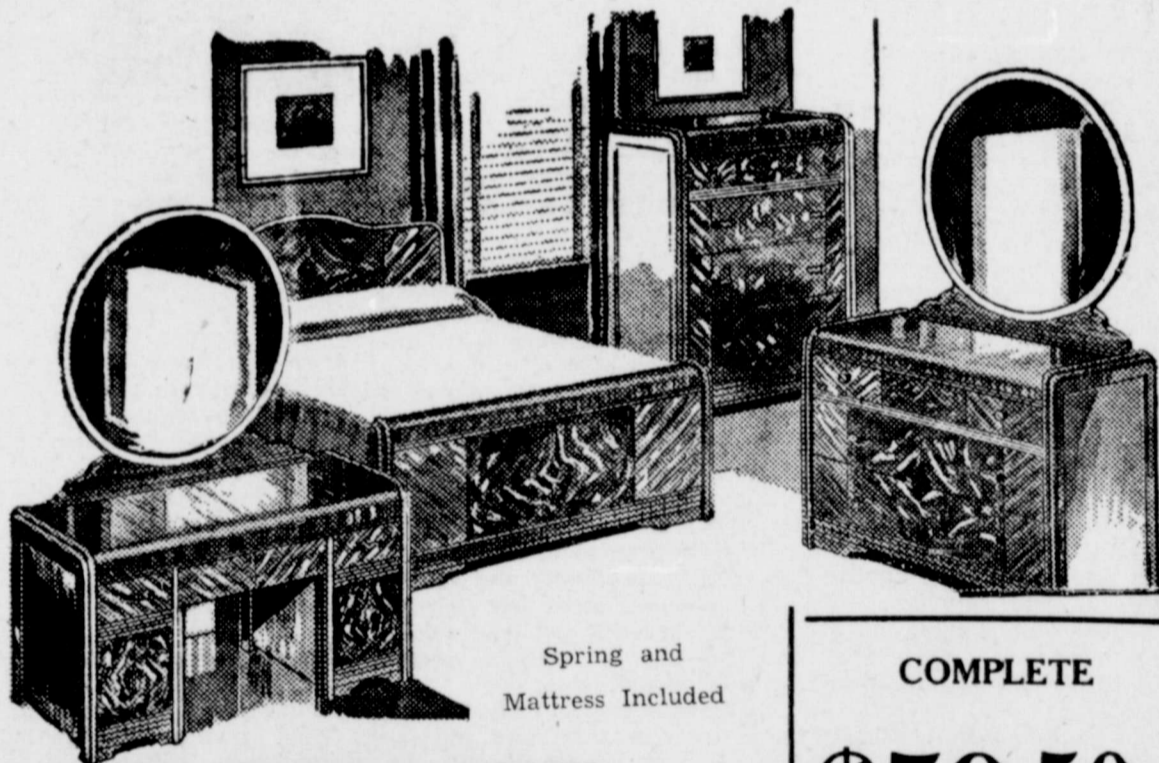

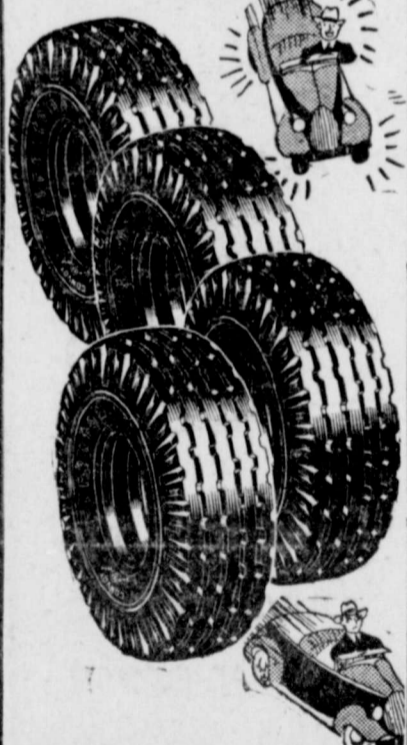

**THE NEED FOR POLITICAL
UNITY**

That at this critical period in its history the United States should be confronted with what amounts to a political crisis is not only regrettable but extremely dangerous to its security. At a time when political differences should be subordinated to the greater objective of national unity and national defense, as the British political factions are united, a spirit of harmony and collaboration is completely lacking among the leading minds of the country including the members of Congress.

Thinking people now realize that within the next year—possibly sooner—the United States may have to make decisions comparable to the decision of the British and French last September to take up arms. Their alternative was capitulation or war. This country may have to make a similar decision before many months have elapsed.

That grave decision relative to foreign policy must be made now and in the future is an accepted fact. But there is a great divergence of opinion among our responsible leaders as to whether domestic problems should be completely subordinated to questions of national defense and foreign policy.

It seems to me that it would be a grave error to concentrate all our attentions upon defense and foreign policy when our domestic house is not in order. History has provided us with countless instances of nations strong militarily that were unable to fight because of domestic weaknesses.

Our national defense policy, if it is to be adequate and capable of meeting possible challenges from the totalitarian states, must encompass not only the armed forces but the economic status of the country, the spirit of the people, the industrial machine, the

political situation.

Several of these points were discussed in a previous article, but it is with the last one that we are concerned in this article.

Contending that political differences should be subordinated to national unity and national defense does not mean that the two-party system should be abandoned, even temporarily, or that the presidential election should be postponed.

But this contention does imply that at this critical hour in the nation's history, questions bearing upon the democratic institutions of the nation should not be challenged or made the subject of a national election.

Democracy is being challenged in Europe and is in imminent danger of defeat by the superior forces of totalitarianism. Certainly the democratic structure of this country will not be bulwarked for an eventualities of the future by a presidential campaign over the question a third term.

In the face of the challenge from abroad, Republican leaders are prepared to assist the President in the formation and inauguration of an adequate defense policy including the points mentioned in the paragraph above.

They are prepared to do this if the president will remove himself from consideration as a candidate for re-election. These men do not believe that Mr. Roosevelt is the only man alive today capable of leading the country in a time of crisis. If they are wrong in this belief, democracy is doomed in this country for Mr. Roosevelt cannot live forever.

It is entirely feasible and possible for members of the two major political parties to collaborate in the work of defense while maintaining their political identity and continuing their campaign based upon purely national issues. This was done in Britain from the out-

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break of the war until the formation of the cabinet of Winston Churchill.

This is possible, that is, if the leaders of the minority party can be assured that the President is acting from disinterested motives.

If Mr. Roosevelt persists in his policy of keepin gsilent on the third

term question and then accepts the Democratic nomination in July, the nation will have to undergo a bitter presidential campaign that will leave the country divided at a time of national danger.

Despite the war, many, many Americans do not want to break

A. R. ALLEN
A. R. Allen, a prosperous farmer of Pidcoke Ranch, Coryell county, Texas, was born in Mississippi, in 1842.

His father, John Allen, born in Alabama in 1817, came from Mississippi to Texas in 1850, and located in Fayette county, where he remained till 1861. That year he moved to Lavaca county. He joined the Confederate army, and died while in the service, in 1862. John Allen, the grandfather of A. R., was also a native of Alabama. He came to Texas and lived in Cherokee county, where he was engaged in agricultural pursuits. The father of our subject was married at the age of twenty-two, to Cynthia Frame, of Tennessee, and the children born to them are: A. R.; Mattie, deceased wife of J. J. Tomlinson, of Eastland county, Texas; James, deceased; N. J., of Reynolds county; John, in Gonzales county; Addie, wife of Samuel Davidson, of Eastland county; Fannie, deceased wife of Joe Vancil, of Reynolds county.

Mr. Allen had only limited educational advantages. At the age of nineteen he enlisted in Tom Green's cavalry regiment, and served in Arizona and New Mexico, under Sibley; thence to Louisiana, where he was captured at Donaldsonville. He was taken to New Orleans, and from there to Richmond, where he was placed in a parole camp until exchange in 1863. He was then attached to Willis' battalion of Wall's Legion, and was for a time under General Forrest. He was then transferred to his old command at Alexandria, Louisiana, after being gone about eleven months. His company was disbanded at Cypress City, after which he returned to Lavaca county, Texas, and engaged in farming.

In 1885 Mr. Allen came to Coryell county and purchased 102 acres of his present farm, and to this original purchase has since added 158 acres, making in all 260 acres,

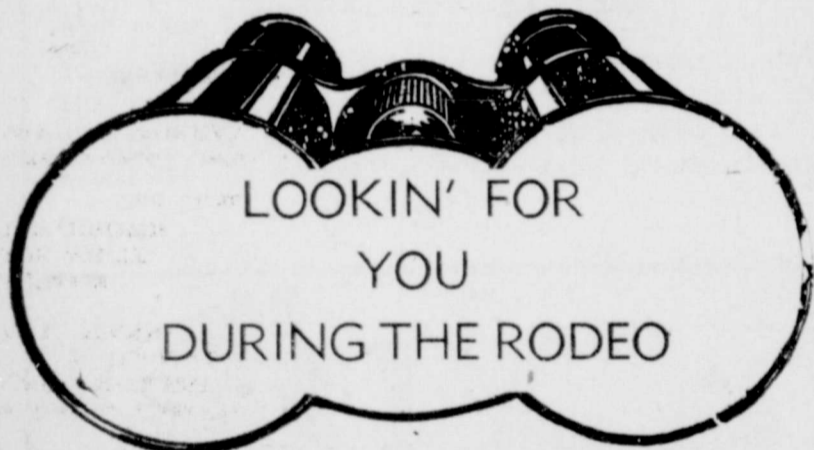
