We got web footed in Mississippi yesterday. It started raining ten minutes after we left Vicksburg, and we had it all day thru Alabama until about four o'clock when we guess we ran out from under the cloud, as it looked like they'd never rain out, and didn't.

You think of parts of Texas that ought to give back to the Indians. According to our notion, they can give the most of Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia back, and no one would miss it, especially the poor negroes.

There don't seem to be but two stratas of people in these three states, and they are the "gots" and the "ain't gots".

Since the AAA even most of the negroes have been run off the farms and plantations, and the owners evidently all or nearly all live in the towns. It's still the Old South, and is still clinging to something, evidently, old traditions.

Don't believe we saw over a dozen new houses in the country in the whole three states. Just about the same can be said about the towns and cities, but they're not quite as bad.

The are beautiful with their oldness, and when one says "the Old South" about these states, they certainly haven't missed it. The favorite tools of the farmers in these parts—well, all it takes to run a farm is a negro, Georgia sweep stock, or double shovel and a mule. And, all the mules haven't gone to war yet. Crops, are of course, corn, cotton, cane, beans, blackeyed peas, and little gardens. The favorite mode of travel for the "dirst farmers" here (negroes) is by bicycle or wagon. They don't know what an automobile is. On the other hand, the owners or towns people seem to be doing all right.

The towns are really beautiful, all lavender and old lace, sort of towns, with beautiful stately houses with the courthouses and the old mansions with columns, colored mummies, etc.

At Jackson, Mississippi, we of course saw the capitol, and at Vicksburg, we passed thru the National Military Park, where a lot of soldiers of another war were knocked off. They've got one like that in France for the last war, and it looks like we'll either have one over here for this one or, maybe over there again.

We went into Alabama at Cuba, (Continued on last page)

## JULY 6 IS DEADLINE FOR APPLICATIONS ON F.S.A. LAND LOANS

Coryell county tenant farmers who wish to borrow money from the Farm Security Administration to buy their own farms have only until July 6 to make application for these loans, warned FSA supervisor George C. Moore. A five-weeks period for accepting applications closes on that date.

No down payment is required of farmers to whom these loans are made large enough to cover this also, Mr. Moore stated.

Application blanks may be obtained at the FSA office located over the Coryell County News in Gatesville.

Tenant farmers, sharecroppers and farm laborers may receive loans under terms of the Bankhead Farm Tenant Act, but the supervisor said that farmers with an adequate supply of livestock and equipment free from indebtedness are given preference.

Farmers to whom loans are made are chosen by a committee of county farmers. Those who have previously applied for a loan but have not been selected may apply again. Successful applicants choose the farm they will buy. The loans are repayable over a 40-year period at three percent interest.

There have been twelve farms previously purchased in Coryell County under this loan. None of these farmers are delinquent, and all borrowers seem well pleased with their new homes, Mr. Moore stated.

Columbus, Ga., as well as Macon are fair sized manufacturing towns, and especially, Columbus, where they have towel and ticking factories and many others of all kinds, including show case and fixture plants.

Fields in all these states, are just patches, and you can just close your eyes and sing "Down in da Corn Field", and that'll just about get it. Negroes seem to do all the farm work, and we imagine they get a good part of the rest of the work to do.

Everyone of us are taking the trip okeh, even to the "little boss". The only thing he demands is his bottle, and that must be around every four hours.

We've evidently been misrouted, anyway, we're not making the time we've previously figured on. We've swung away down south, and the loop has evidently added several hundred miles to it. We have just turned our first thousand miles, in Jones county, Georgia.

At Warrenton, Ga., they were having a celebration, and placed a granite rock on the square for many of the former residents of the county, who were pioneer settlers. Got one of the newspapers from that town, but as yet have not had time to look over it and find if there are any names familiar to our folks at home. From the looks of many of the farm homes in Texas, they must have been modeled after those in these three states. They have the usual front with a short sloping front part of the gable, and a longer slant in
