HENRY CLARK TO SPEAK HERE SAT.: FOR SENATOR

Henry Clark, candidate for State Senator will speak in Gatesville, Saturday, July 13, at 4:30 p. m.

Mr. Clark will discuss, among other things, the main issues in his campaign. Mr. Clark comes from families of frontier days, the Clarks having come to Erath county in 1856, and his mother's people the Keahey's came to Erath county in 1858. One of his grandfathers died in Erath county during Indian days, and the other grandfather was killed by the Indians. Henry Clark was born in 1881, and is fifty-eight years old.

Mr. Clark has been in the legislature before, and when there he put over many acts of useful legislation, the main one of which was the creation of John Tarleton College into a State Institution.

Mr. Clark has been a ranchman and farmer all his life, and is conversant with every feature of those two vast industries. There is not a word in the farmer's or ranchman's vocabulary that he does not thoroughly understand, hence his every heart beat is in unison with all the interests of those two classes. If sent to the State Senate he would be constantly on guard to their every interest.

Texas is the largest state in the union, and is allowed the least truck tonnage. He is thoroughly convinced that this should not be the case, and that trucks should be allowed a reasonable increase in their tonnage.

Mr. Clark will discuss why a non-tax payer, that is a man that pays very little, or no taxes to the state and county, would be dangerous as a representative or a senator in the State Legislature. He will have to give arguments to sustain his statement on this point. He may compare a Commissioner's Court to the great Legislature of the State of Texas.

In Mr. Clark's discussion of the Social Security, which has become a part of our fundamental law, he will go into great detail in giving his idea of how this money can be raised, and at the same time not be a burden on the man who pays the taxes to support this state government. This he will do, with caution and in a way that he can not be misunderstood, for he realizes full well the burden under which the tax payers are laboring.

Henry Clark is for AMERICANISM in every sense of the word. He will stand for and fight for the great institutions of America his money and his life.

MUSICAL ENTERTAINMENT AT PIDCOKE TONIGHT

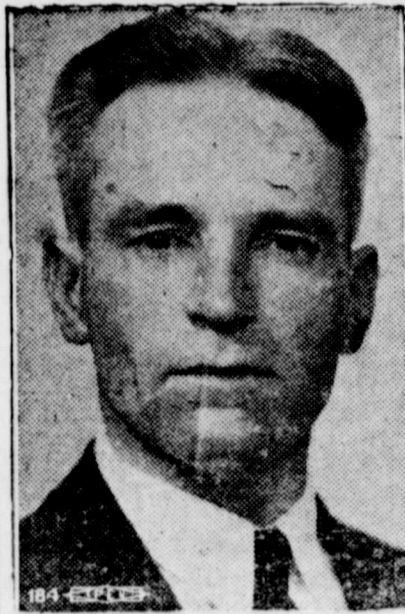

In the evening, he was followed by O. H. Cross, of Waco, candidate for Congressman from the 11th District of Texas, who also spoke to a crowd.

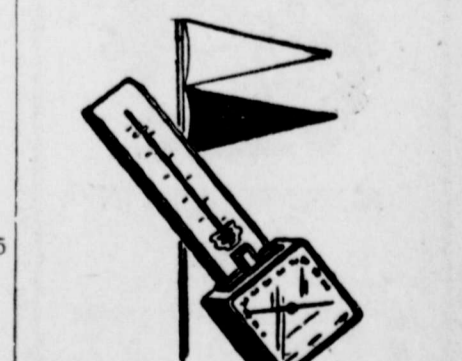
County Population Listed As 20,225: Only 226 More

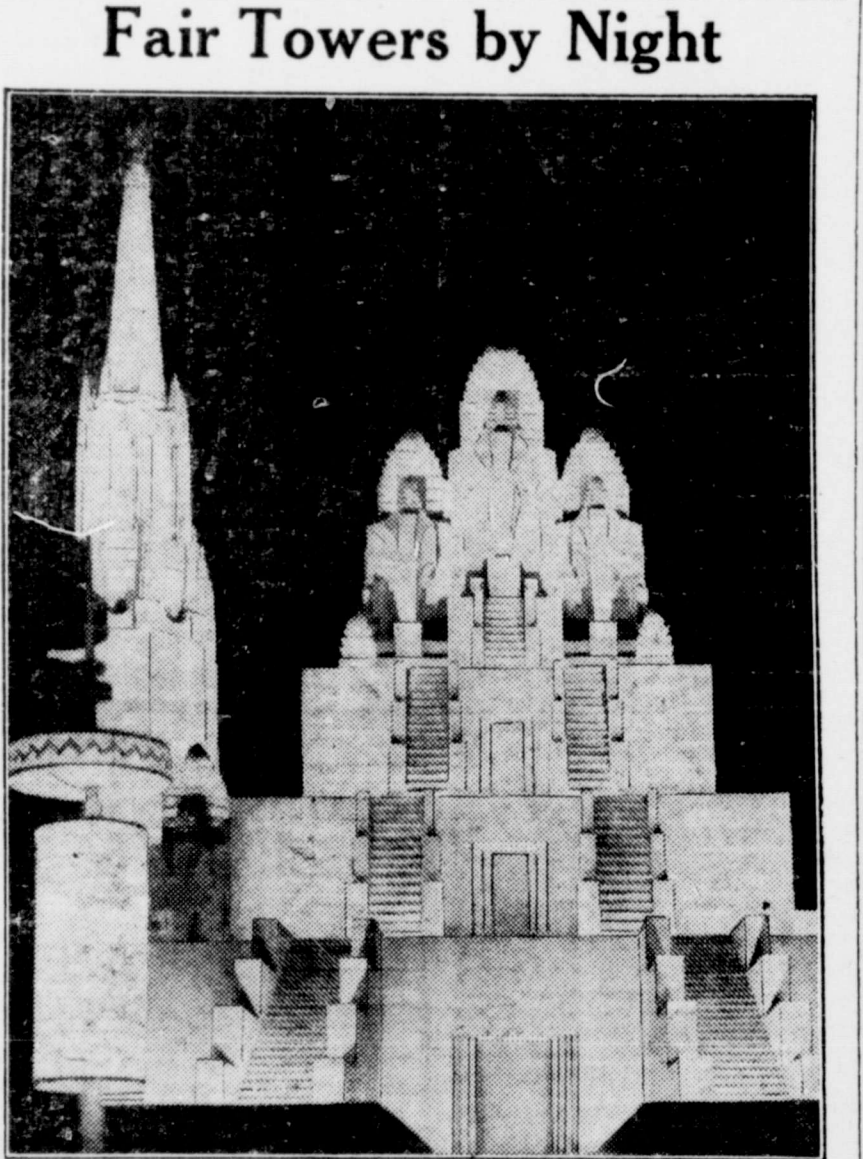

So Duncan walked away, and George-Anne watched him go with the mingled emotions of a racketeer and a girl in love.

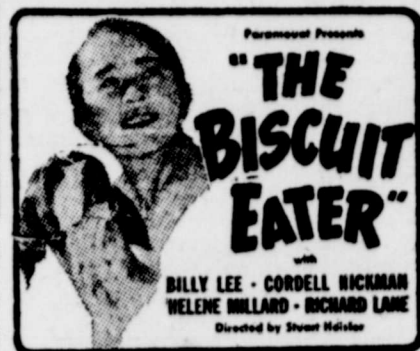

THE BAT CAVE

Of all the treasure deposits, legendary and otherwise, found in the Coryell Hills, the Bat Cave, near Pidcoke is the most valuable. Here in the hills overlooking the Cowhouse River is a cave, the portal of which somewhat resembles the portals of those other supposed mines that have inflamed men and womens minds. Mut the treasure here is not gold nor silver, nor any other metallic mineral. It is a treasure not sought after enough by the agriculturalists of this section. It is a treasure, that if worked out, and properly applied, will produce tangible results.

It is not known if this is an ancient prospector's shaft or whether the cataclysms that shook the crust of the earth while it was taking form, left this vent leading

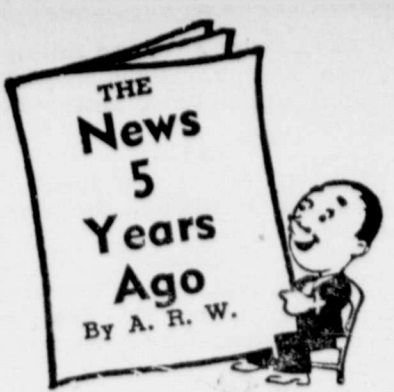
into the bowles of the earth. Anyhow it is the home of countless thousands of little hairy night prowling bats. In the early evening they may be seen faring forth to secure their food by catching the tiny insects that infest the night air. In the early morning these little mammals, or birds, or whatever they are, may be seen returning, by the thousands, to their night dark home in the subterranean chambers of the earth. There they remain till darkness again hovers over the hills when they fare forth again in search of food.

How long this cave has been occupied by bats no one knows. Occasionally a man enters, to find that thru the ages that these little beasts or birds, have occupied this place, they have deposited countless tons of bat-guano, or bat dung, which is superlatively rich in the chemical elements that go to enrich soil and make it produce luxuriant crops of vegetation. If this guano were as eagerly sought after as is gold or silver, it would when properly applied to the soil, enrich and stimulate it to the production of abundant crops of fruit and grains.

Mr. L. Kemp, who lives on the Georgetown road south of Gatesville, and gets his mail on a rural route out of Killeen, tells some interesting stories about this bat cave. Once two men came to Mr. Kemp and secured a lease to operate the bat guano deposit on a commercial scale. One car of guano was shipped to Ft. Worth and disposed of. The contractors never look over the prospect with a view to mining the guano. They liked the prospect, and estimated that there were thousands of tons of guano deposited in those subterranean chambers. They leased the mine from Mr. Kemp and returned to San Aontonio, from whence they had come. After waiting a long time for them to return Mr. Kemp inquired of the attorney who had drawn the contract, and learned that a lawsuit had held up operations that they were unable to return to start operations.

One year Mr. Kemp kept a Mexican family on his farm. They were good workers, but when not at work spent most of their time in, and around the Bat Cave. One time a young Mexican came to Mr. Kemp with a collection of bones. Upon examination Mr. Kemp them to be human bones. He asked the Mexican boy for them, and they were given him. The Mexican then produced a human tooth. Mr. Kemp requested the Mexican to also give him the tooth. Whereupon the Mexican said he must keep it over night, but tomorrow would give it to Mr. Kemp. That night the Mexican kept the human tooth found in the bat cave. During the night the Mexican dreamed that the man to whom the tooth had once belonged, appeared to him and demanded that the tooth be returned to the place where it had been originally buried in the depths of the bat cave. Believing in the import of dreams, and other signs and symbols, the young Mexican in the early morning of the next day, obeyed the command of the ghost man, and returned the tooth to its original resting place in the cave.

This cave, according to Mr. Kemp, has been explored for several hundred feet, and has been found to contain an unestimatable quantity of bat guano. Many sightseers go there, and many tourists drive there to see this home of millions of little furry mammals. Of course this curious place has its lost mine stories; but it is most likely a cavern that was formed in the remost past, by the folding and buckling of the earth's crust while it was taking ginal form. This place is on the outskirts of the Burnet-Llano up-life, where there are many caves including the famous Long Horn Cavern, scattered thru the rugged hill country. Regardless of all of this palavar by me, it is on interesting place, worthy of a day or several days, of any interested man's time, for exploration.—Frank E. Simmons.

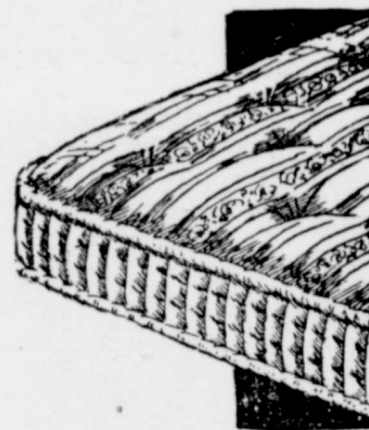

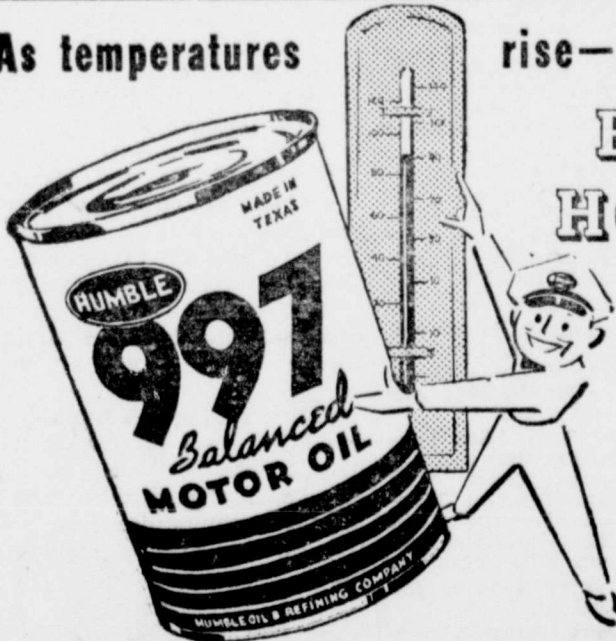
