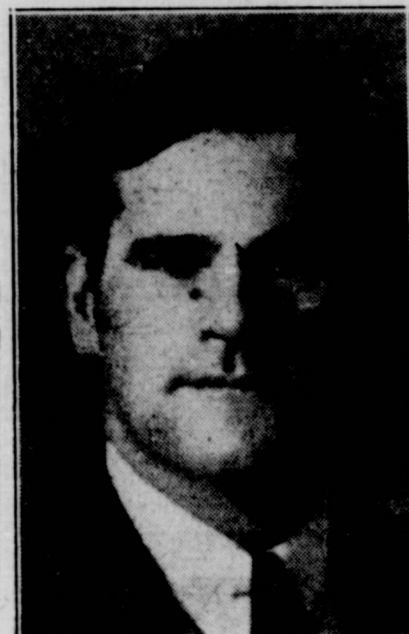

Members of the Coryell National Farm Loan Association will hold their Annual Stockholders' Meeting on August 1st, 1940, 9:30 a. m. at the Palace Theatre Building in Gatesville, Texas, it is announced by M. Blankenship, Secretary-Treasurer.

The meeting is for the purpose of electing two directors and for any other business that may come before the meeting.

An interesting program is being arranged for the meeting. Mr. W. J. McAnnelly, Vice-President of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, and Mr. S. R. McWhirter, Supervisor, will be present and address the meeting.

There will be a free picture show for you and your family. The building is air-conditioned, has comfortable seats, and we are expecting you to come and bring your family. We are expecting both a profitable and pleasant meeting.

The Coryell National Farm Loan Association was organized in 1917 for the purpose of furnishing the farmers money at a low rate of interest and over a long term of years. Before the Association was organized the average farmer paid from 8 to 10 percent interest and the average loan ran from three to five years. Since the Association was organized millions of dollars have been furnished to farmers of Coryell County through this Association.

At the present time there is over 800 Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner borrowers through the Coryell N. F. L. A. Loans amounting to approximately \$2,474,540.00 are now outstanding and being serviced through this association, and the borrowers are receiving this money at the present time at 3 1/2% interest. During these 23 years the Association has remained in Class One, and the stock has never been impaired, which reflects a credit on the members of the Association and the directors who have served

throughout the years. The present Board of Directors is comprised of the following: M. W. Murray, president; Edgar Franks, vice-president; V. R. Lockhart, C. D. Shriber and W. W. Bamburg.

## Menus

You can give piquant flavor and zest to a simple salad by using a dressing that is skillfully blended and unusual in flavor.

**Peanut Butter Salad Dressing**

- 1 tsp. corn starch
- 1-2 tsp. mustard
- 1-2 tsp. salt
- 1-3 cup cup peanut butter
- 2-3 cup water
- 2 tbs. lemon juice

Mix the dry ingredients together. Add the peanut butter and the water. Cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture thickens. Add the lemon juice and cool. Serve on banana, orange or mixed fruit salad.

**Currant Dressing**

- 2 tbs. currant jelly
- 1 tbs. lemon juice
- 2 tbs. salad oil
- 1-4 tsp. salt

Melt jelly and add the rest of ingredients and beat thoroughly.

**French Dressing**

- 1-2 tsp. salt
  - 1-8 tsp. pepper
  - 3 tbs. olive oil or substitute
  - Speck of cayenne
  - 1 tbs. vinegar or lemon juice
- Mix the dry ingredients. Add the oil and vinegar, or lemon juice alternately, beating until thick.

**Mayannaise Dressing**

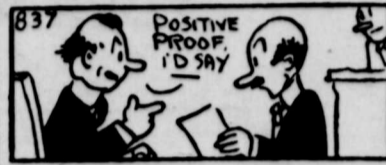
- 1 egg yolk beaten
  - 1-2 tsp. sugar
  - Speck of cayenne
  - 2-3 tsp. salt
  - 1-4 tsp. mustard
  - 1 tbs. lemon juice
  - 1 tbs. vinegar
  - 1 cup olive oil or substitute
- Mix the dry ingredients. Add to the egg yolk. Beat well. Add the vinegar and lemon juice gradually while beating. Add the oil,

drop by drop at first, beating well between each addition. After about half the oil is in, the remainder may be added more rapidly. The mixture should be thick and smooth when finished.

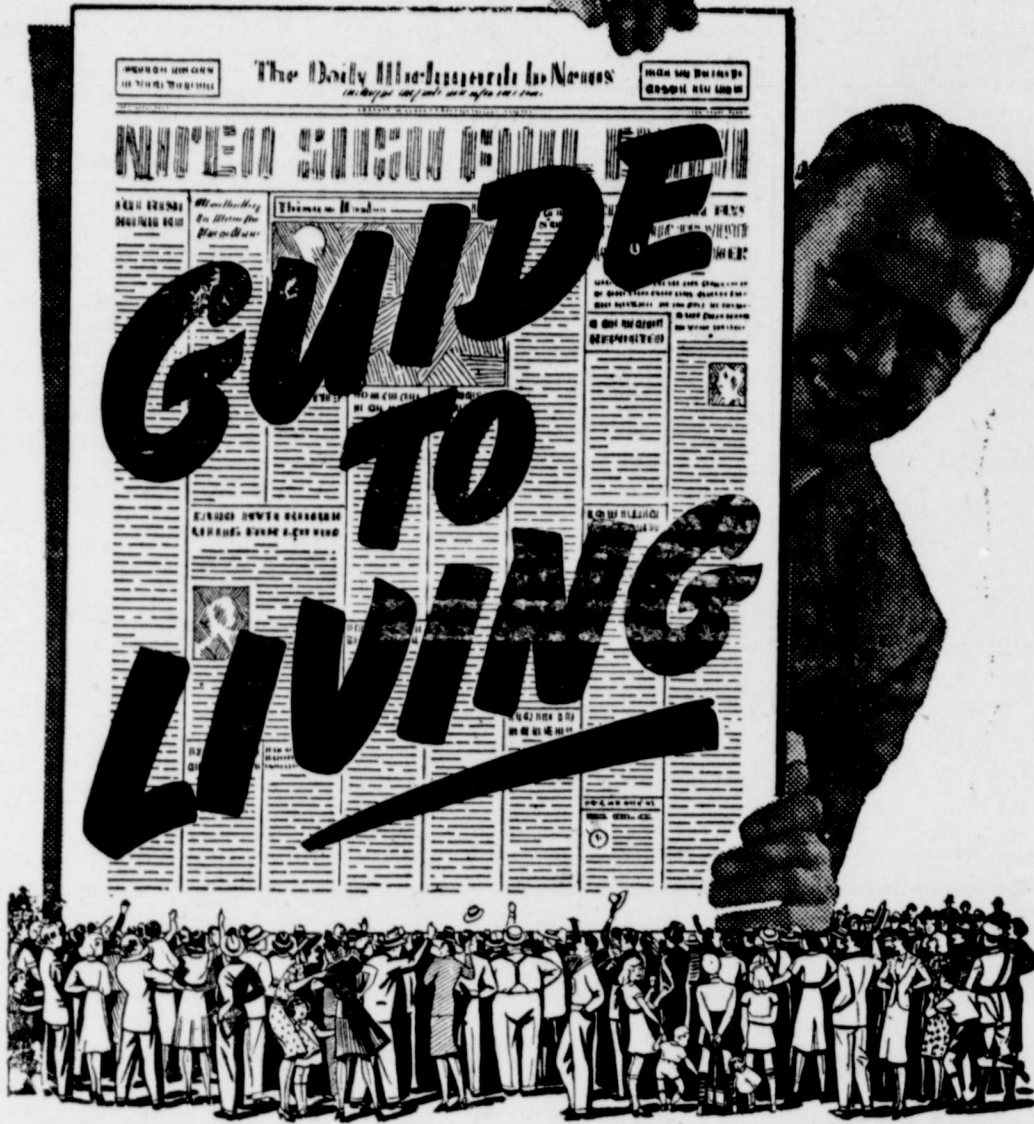

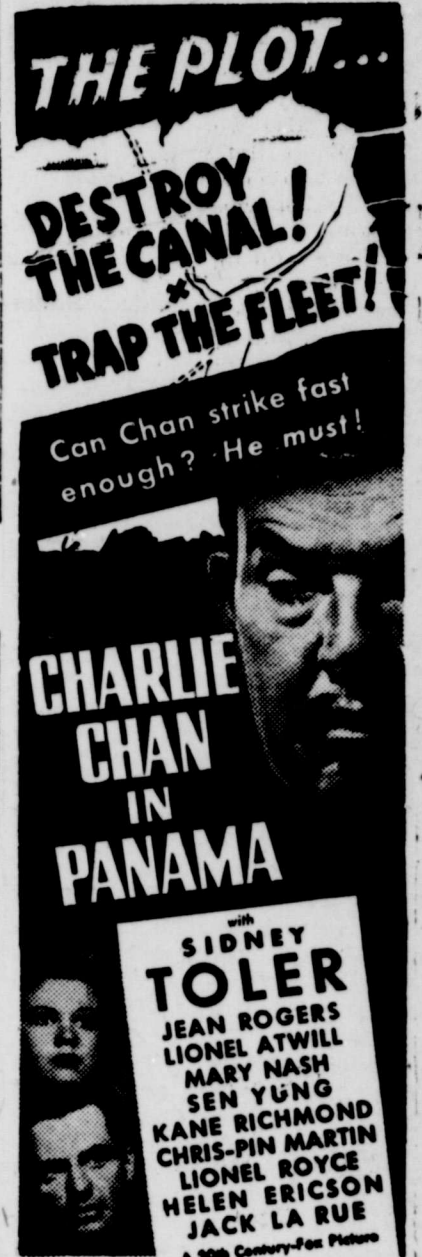

Declaring "The United States and its people are lovers of peace" and "we want no part in any European war," Senator Tom Connally of Texas, in a radio broadcast by electric transcription from Washington Tuesday night, July 3rd, asserted: "The most imperative duty of the American people and of their servants in Congress is to adequately arm and prepare our nation in self defense that our security may be secured."

"We have treasures that may well attract the ambition and the greed and the avarice of military master and conquerors, who may seek to dominate the world," Senator Connally stressed, adding: "We are determined that none of them dominates the United States of America."

"Our security requires defense within as well as without," Senator Connally continued, saying: "All un-American activities must be stamped out. The fifth column must go."

Explaining inability to return to Texas this summer as has been his custom, Senator Connally said:

"My post of duty is in Washington. Congress is in session. The most important and vital concerns of the American people are being considered. I think Congress should remain on duty. I shall remain on duty as long as the emergency requires."

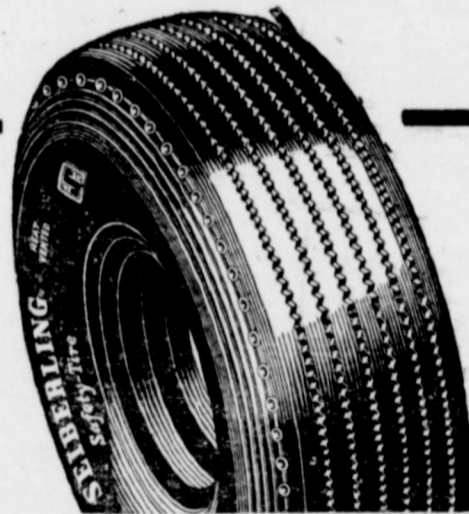

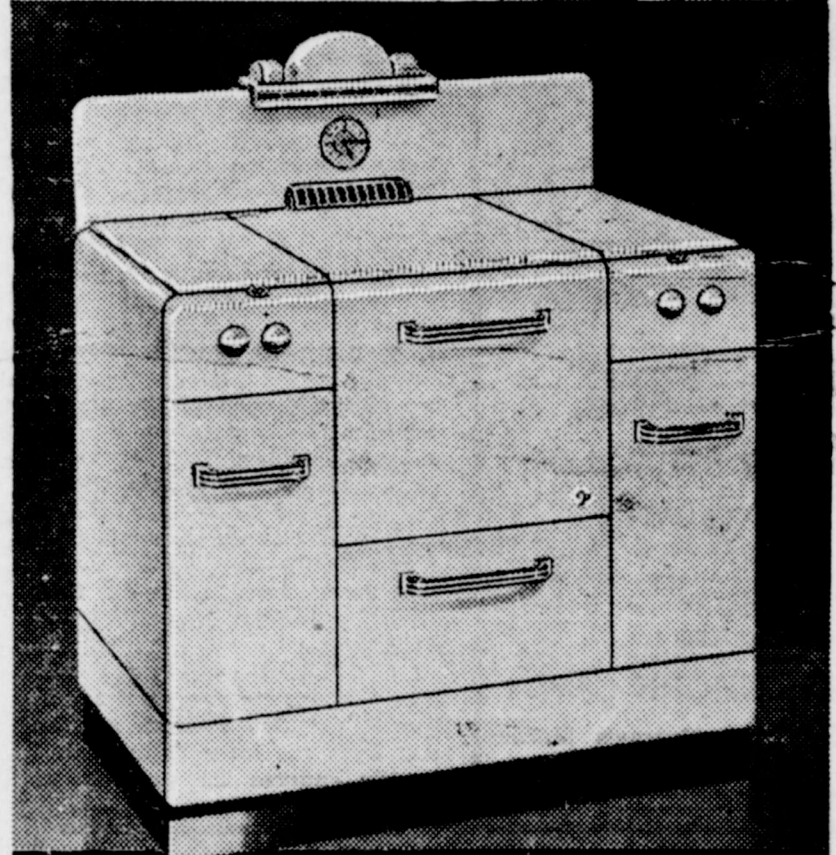

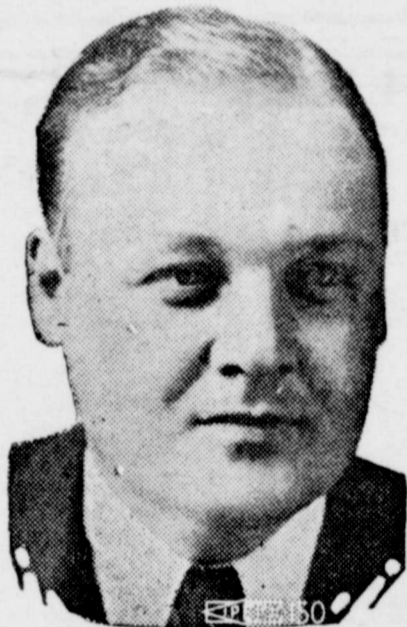

## RUNOFF FOR GOVERNOR

The political column "State Viewpoint" in the July 8 issue of The Austin American predicts de-

finitely that there will be a runoff in this year's race for governor.

Key to the way the political tide is flowing were the respective appearances of Ernest O. Thompson

and Lee O'Daniel in Waco, according to this column. "O'Daniel's crowd this year was 60 per cent of what he had when he opened two years ago, even though it was his only scheduled speech this year," "State Viewpoint" says.

"Thompson had three to four times as many listeners at Waco as he had there two years ago. Enthusiasm was much greater than anything the anti-O'Daniel candidates, including Thompson, developed two years ago."

The strength of the other opposition candidates is analyzed by "State Viewpoint" in these words: "The past few days have brought reports to Austin that the Fergusons have made impressive gains at a good many points, and are rallying a steady and substantial return of the old faithful. Now, these votes come out of the biscuit pan of two years ago.

"Harry Hines has definitely-aligned and well-organized groups. He will get a broad statewide spread of the votes of merchants and small business men, and of if those who particularly consider the church background of a candidate.

"And Jerry Sadler, who has fought hard against the sales tax, and who has been unsparing in his attack on O'Daniel is lining up votes.

"Thompson at Waco made the high point of the showing against O'Daniel. Thompson found there's not only anti-O'Daniel votes, but anti-O'Daniel sentiment waiting to be whipped into action. The sharp contrast in O'Daniel's losing half this number in the two-year comparison, when he was making his only speech this year, and Thompson's great increase, marked a definite milepost in this year's campaign.

"It ended the two or three weeks of defeatist—"what's the use—no chance to stop Lee—why bother to vote?" response.

"It showed there's going to be a runoff."

These comments by an observer writing in the midst of the capital city's political atmosphere are included here as an interesting commentary on the Texas political situation. The writer of this column does not necessarily share these viewpoints.

If the Austin observer's prediction of a runoff is realized, former Gov. Dan Moody in all probability will take the stump against the re-election of O'Daniel. Moody was urged by friends to make the race himself this year but refused.

In refusing, he told the State Committee in Austin that there is desperate need for a change in administration in Texas. If he decided to speak against O'Daniel, he will give his reasons for a change is necessary.

### The Platforms in brief:

**SADLER:** A tax of two and one-fourth cents per barrel on oil, one cent per 1000 cubic feet of natural gas, increase of 22 cents a ton on sulphur and an advance in the corporation franchise tax.

**FERGUSON:** A gross receipts or gross income tax of one half per cent, with \$5,000 exemption.

**THOMPSON:** A nickle a barrel additional tax on oil, a one cent per 1000 cubic foot tax on natural gas, and increased levies against sulphur.

**O'DANIEL:** A sales tax which he calls a transaction tax, which would levy one per cent on sales.

**HINES:** An increase in the production tax on oil to a total of four and one half cents a barrel and an increase of one-fourth cents per 1000 cubic feet in the production tax upon natural gas.

**NOTES:** Col. Ernest O. Thompson has donated \$583.33 to the State old age pension fund. It was the Commissioner's salary for the month of June and included \$3.30 Thompson paid out of his pocket to offset discount in the warrant. Harry Hines has purchased more radio time than any other candidates for governor during the last two weeks of the campaign. He is speaking at noon each day over the Texas quality Network. Mrs. Ferguson has utilized the radio less than any of her opponents. Sadler speaks each Wednesday evening for thirty minutes. O'Daniel and Thompson each have bought noon and evening time over the leading State network.

One of the most flagrant examples of political deception in Texas is the attempt of various candidates for the Railroad Commission to inject the pension issue into the race.

Hoping to capitalize upon the acknowledged sentiment for the payment of old age pensions, several candidates for this position have based their entire appeal for votes upon promises to help pay the pensions.

The payment of the old-age pensions is a task for the governor and the legislature to solve. Only by legislative action, arising from proposals from the executive branch of the government or from proposals made by members of the legislature, can money be raised to pay the old age pensions.

The Railroad Commission race will have no effect upon the final outcome of the pension issue. Voters should cast their ballots in this race upon basis of a candidate's qualifications to handle the difficult oil, gas and transportation problems of the state, not as a candidate promises to help pay pensions to the old.

Pierce Brooks, Olin Culberson and Ross Hardin are setting the pace in the Railroad Commission

race with extensive campaign organizations and ample radio time.

Most observers feel that two of these three contenders will be in the certain runoff, but the possibility of a darkhouse slipping into the August contest must not be discounted.

Senator Olan R. Van Zandt, William H. McDonald, Clyde E. Smith, John Pundt and Walton R. Hood have large followings in various sections of the state. Their friends contend that the final showing of these candidates will be a surprise.

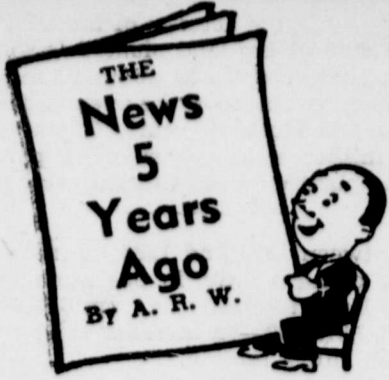

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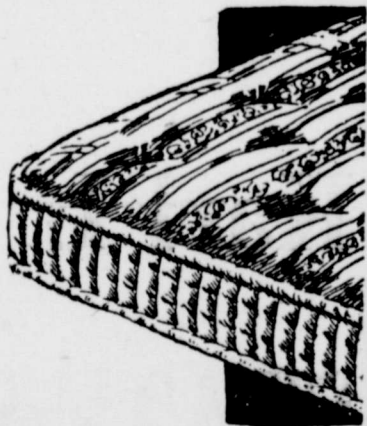
