Other officers elected were: Rev. J. L. Spears of Marlin, temporary clerk; and Rev. W. R. Hall Jr. of Fairfield, press reporter. Rev. Andrew Byers of Taylor, former pastor of the Turnersville Church, continues his office of stated clerk.

Presbytery is made up of the ministers, and one Ruling Elder from each church within the bounds. Elders at Taylor representing Coryell County churches were: A. T. H. Dreyer, Gatesville; John Hobin, Turnersville; and C. T. Brim, Prairie View.

Monday, the real work will begin at Gatesville Public Schools and this past week has been spent in registration, assignments and books and the home work will begin Saturday night, as assignments are made for Monday.

Mr. and Mrs. Flentge were the only attendants from Gatesville at the convention.

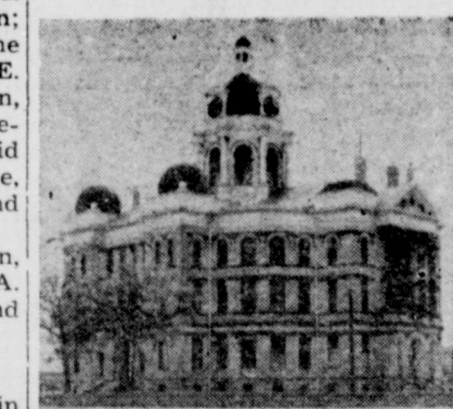
Mr. and Mrs. Flentge didn't give a story of the convention's proceedings which have been aired plenty in the daily press as well as spasmodically on the air lanes.

The car of Anderson Griffin (Colored) was destroyed by flames Tuesday morning about 6:30 o'clock near the old Roller Mills in north Gatesville.

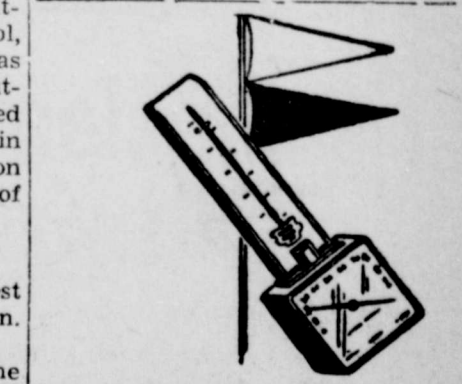
Cause of the fire was unknown, and reports were that it was partly covered by insurance.
