Hearing On Site For Hospital Held Monday

Citizens interested in the location of the proposed County-City Hospital met yesterday at 3:00 p. m. with County Judge Floyd Zeigler and the members of the Commissioner's Court to object to a purported recommendation to the Commissioner's for the location of the hospital.

A committee had recommended a location west of Gatesville on U. S. 84, and the objections were not raised on any specific location, except, that it should be in the city limits.

Mayor C. E. Gandy in a statement before the Court stated the city would furnish water free in the city limits, and also there would be no sewer charge to the hospital.

No decision as to the reception of the objections was given by the Court.

PHOTO COURSE TO BE TAUGHT IN BAYLOR JOURNALISM DEPT.

Introduction of news photography courses and complete equipping of photographic darkrooms to make Baylor University's department of journalism the center of the field in the Southwest was announced by President Pat M. Neff. The innovation is being directed by Prof. A. Clarence Smith, formerly of University of Oklahoma and Kent (Ohio) State University, in the department headed by Prof. Frank E. Burkhalter. Smith began his work in news photography instruction as early as 1933 and is considered the dean of photography instructors in schools of journalism of the nation.

Equipment in the darkrooms has been donated by a Waco friend, Mr. Neff said, and is termed by Smith as among the best for the purpose in the nation.

Texas Poultry Head Advises Preparing Turkeys

A. H. Demke, Executive Secretary, Texas Poultry Federation advises, "Let's Start Fattening Those Turkeys Now!"

Which is good advice. Turkey raisers in this county will, and should, expect a nice market on turkeys during the coming season, and will get it, in most instances, if the quality of their turkeys demand the price, and come up to the expectations of the consumers.

Mr. Demke, advises in a release that if we expect to accomplish this, we should have already started fattening these turkeys, and he suggests September 15 as the starting date.

Range turkeys, he continues, are probably infested with internal parasites, and should be given worm treatment before, starting to fatten them. Mr. Demke also advises to avoid "grippers" who travel the country offering remedies in trade for turkeys, and suggests buying these remedies from some reputable local dealer, of which there are many.

After treatment, he advises, sell. (Continued on last page)

Bus Inspection Looks Like Tank Concentration

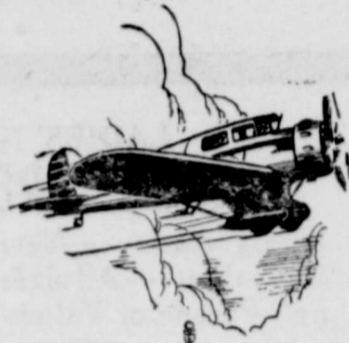
The tanks went rolling along here in Gatesville, when two State Highway Patrolmen looked over the entire squad of some forty or more school busses from every part of the county.

Pilot's Persiflage: Or, Air Chatter

(Note:—This column is designed to give you an authoritative "flying language". It is the technical names and terms used on both private, municipal, and service airports, factories, fields and shops. We'll give you just a little at a time, and you can clip them for further reference.)

Aerdone: An airplane model for purposes of experimentation and research: a glider.

Aerofoil: A thin wing-like structure, flat or curved, designed to obtain reaction upon its surfaces from the air thru which it moves; the wings of an airplane.

Aeronaut: The pilot of an airship.

Aeronautics: The science of flight, either in airships or airplanes.

Aeronef: Motor-driven balloons.

Aileron: A small surface, usually situated at the outward end of the trailing edge (back part of wing), the operation of which turns an airplane about its longitudinal axis; causes an airplane to tilt sideways.

Aircraft: Any form of craft designed for use in navigation of the air—airplanes, balloons, dirigibles, helicopters, kites, kite balloons, ornithopters, gliders, etc.

Airdrome: A flying field with adjacent hangers and workshops.

Airplane: (sometimes spelled **Aeroplane**) a heavier-than-air aircraft of the pusher or tractor type rising from or alighting on the ground, having wings, stabilizing surfaces, rudders and a power plant for propulsion thru the air. (See also **Seaplane**).

Air Screw: See **Propeller**. (will follow later.)

Airship: A term used to designate all lighter-than-air aircraft, in distinction for flying machines, which are heavier than air.

Air-Speed Meter: an instrument designed to measure the velocity of an aircraft with reference to the air thru which it moves.

Altimeter: An aneroid barometer calibrated to indicate linear units, mounted on an aircraft to continuously indicate its height above the surface of the earth.

Anemometer: An instrument for measuring the velocity of the wind or air currents with reference to the earth or some fixed body.

LAST HAMILTON-GATESVILLE TRAIN TO BE OCTOBER 13, INSTEAD OF SAT.

Extension of service on the Gatesville-Hamilton Cotton Belt branch until midnight, October 13 has been announced in a telegram received by L. M. Shepardson, of the Waco Chamber of Commerce traffic manager, from Superintendent K. M. Post of Tyler, according to a story in Sunday's Waco News-Tribune.

Service was originally scheduled on this line to be discontinued Saturday night, September 28 at mid-

night. The railroad is open for sale, at junk or salvage prices, according to a ruling from the Interstate Commerce Commission, but it is very unlikely that there will be a purchaser, who will want to take over the operation of the road. All Coryell and the intermediate points between Gatesville and Hamilton will be penalized by the discontinuance of this line, it is said.
