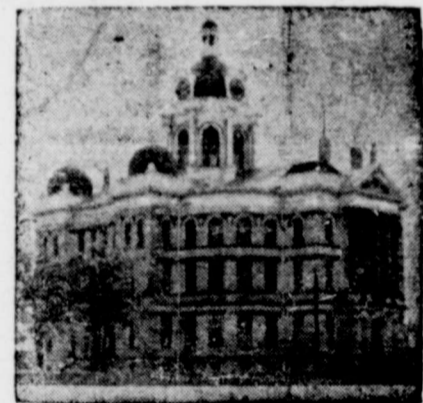
Here's a couple of Vandiver boys, who are in the service at Ft. Bliss, and a little story about them.

BIG SHOTS MEET

Bern, Switzerland, Jan 19 (AP)—Adolph Hitler and Benito Mussolini conferred Sunday, it was reported here in authoritative diplomatic circles, but where they met or what they accomplished was unknown.

Speculation, however, was that German aggressive action in a new direction, independently or to bolster Italy, is imminent.

U.S. VOICES REGRET

San Francisco, Calif. Jan. 19, (AP)—Two American sailors who cut a swastika flag from the mast of the German Consulate here waited action by naval authorities Sunday, while the State Department expressed regret to Germany over the incident.

Legionaires are reported to have made bond for the men.

LAVAL BACK WITH PETAIN

Vichy, France, Jan 19. (AP)—Pierre Laval began a comeback in the Vichy Government Sunday as Chief of State Marshal Philippe Petain announced he had talked with his former Foreign Minister and Vice-Premier and that their misunderstandings have been dispated.

Laval was the French official, reportedly favoring German plans and forms of government. Petain was Pro-English.

BRITISH CHASE WOPS TO ERITREA

Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 19 (AP)—Apparently satisfied with their deep offensive in Libya, Italian Northern Africa, the British reported Sunday they were striking heavily at Italian East Africa all along the Sandy Sudanese front after recapture of Kassala.

A part of British officers and non-coms have pushed 400 miles into Ethiopia and are reportedly organizing the overthrow of Italian control of this Italian controlled country.

WILLKIE CARRIES NOTE

Washington, Jan. 19 (AP)—Wendell Willkie will take a personal message from President Roosevelt to Prime Minister Churchill of England.

Roosevelt and Willkie had a 30-minute chat Sunday, after Willkie had conferred with Hull.

U.S. FACTOR IN TWO WARS

Tokyo, Sunday, Jan. 20 (AP)—Lieut. Gen. Kazuma Suzuki today

described the United States as "the decisive factor" in both the European and Asiatic conflicts. He spoke before an assembly honoring Admiral Kichisaburo Nomura, the new ambassador to the United States.

SUEZ CANAL BOMBED

Berlin, Jan. 19, (AP)—German bombers were reported Sunday to have reached out another 1,000 miles from advanced bases, presumably in Italy, to drop explosives on "militarily important objectives" in the vicinity of the Suez Canal.

Also, Nazi dive-bombers were said to have delivered another smashing attack Sunday on the crippled British aircraft carrier Illustrious at Valletta, Malta.

O'DANIEL KILLS A BUFFALO

Austin, Jan. 19, (AP)—Governor O'Daniel who never claimed to be a huntsman, Sunday joined a distinguished company of successful, modern-day hunters—having bagged a prize bison on the run and admittedly done a good job of hunting.

The buffalo will be eaten today at his inauguration as Governor of Texas for the second term.

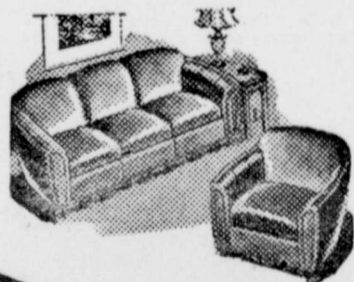

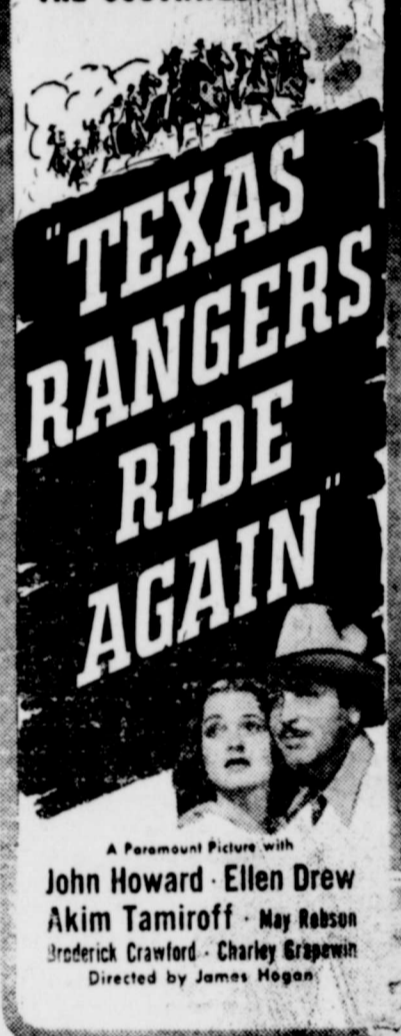

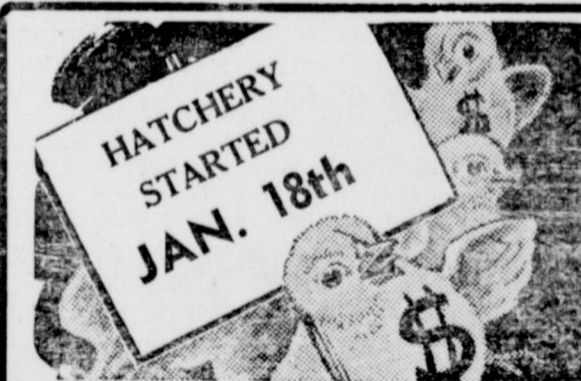
