## Your Income Tax In a Nut Shell

WHO? Every single person with a GROSS income of \$800 or more; also those married but not living with husband or wife; married persons having aggregate GROSS income of \$2,000 or more.

WHEN? For calendar year, or on or before March 15; for fiscal year, on or before 15th day of 3rd month following close of fiscal year.

WHERE? Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Texas.

HOW? On form 1040-A and 1040, income tax blanks, which have instructions.

WHAT IS TAX? 4 per cent of normal income, after deducting exemptions and credits; a surtax on the surtax net income in excess of \$4,000; and a defense tax of 10 per cent of the combined normal tax and surtax.

DEDUCTIONS ALLOWED Real estate taxes on personal residence; State gasoline tax 4c per gallon; taxes paid on long distance phone calls and telegrams; dues paid labor unions; interest on borrowed money; car license; poll tax.

NO DEDUCTIONS FOR: Federal income taxes; social security deducted from your salary, fines; depreciation on homestead.

### DUCE'LL STICK TO ADOLF

Rome, Feb. 23 (AP)—Premier Benito Mussolini, in an unheralded broadcast to the Italian people, defended Sunday the Fascist regime's handling of the Libyan campaign, announced the arrival of German air and armored detachments in Sicily and Libya, and declared that Italy, whatever happens, will march with Germany to the end. ### NAZIS RAID WIDE AREA

London, Feb. 23 (AP)—Strong squadrons of German fighters and bombers roared across Dover Strait Sunday in what the Press Association, a British news agency, view as the start of the Nazi Luftwaffe's spring air offensive.

### BULGAR ROADS CLEARED

Sofia, Bulgaria, Feb. 23 (AP)—Police halted all automobile traffic in the Sofia district Sunday and began a nation-wide hunt for Bulgarians spreading anti-German leaflets. These were among accumulating signs of impending Nazi military entrance into this country.

"THE pen is mightier than the sword" only when the pen is free. You hear much talk of dictatorship and total central power these days. You need not fear it so long as men can write what they think and report what they see.

If you suspect a dictator—a "Strong Man," is approaching, watch his nation's newspapers. If they are healthy, unsuppressed, vigorous, it is a safe sign. So long as the ballot remains and you keep your right to choose how, when and where you shall spend your money, you need only a virtue press to protect you.



But remember that the press can be attacked in many ways.

"Secret" government withholds news at its source—or distorts it with lies and false information.

Taxes can destroy the press. "Regulation" of advertising can discourage merchants and pro-

ducers from offering their wares through the cheap and simple method of notices in the press; advertising helps pay the cost of gathering and distributing other news. Even so seemingly remote a thing as high telegraph rates can stifle the newspaper which must get you today's news today.

Thus, when you see blood on a "Strong Man's" sword, make sure it is not newspaper blood.



This is no plea for the rights and liberties of newspapers for their own sakes. There is probably as much or more material reward for publishing a dictator-controlled paper as for printing an independent newspaper.

I warn you to watch for your own sake. The moment your free newspapers succumb, the light goes out on your individual liberty.



You'll know no longer the difference between straight fact and the fancies of your "Leader." You'll hear nice things, get sugar-coated "urgings" in your papers. But you'll never have the chance to make up your own mind—about a candidate for office or an article in a store. Your mind will be made up for you, by the simple process of giving you only one side—the dictator's side—of the news.

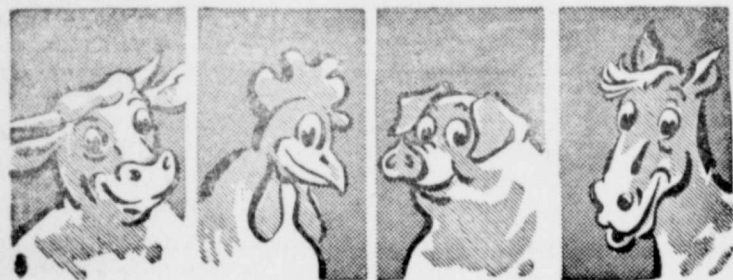

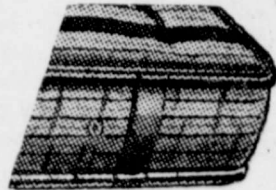
