"Secret" government withholds news at its source-or distorts it with lies and false informa-

ducers from offering their wares through the cheap and simple method of notices in the press; advertising helps pay the cost of gathering and distributing other news. Even so seemingly remote a thing as high telegraph rates can stifle the newspaper which must get you today's news today.

This is no plea for the rights and liberties of newspapers for their own sakes. There is probably as much or more material reward for publishing a dictator-controlled paper as for printing an independent nowspaper.


