HOUSE PASSES 7 BILLION
Washington, March 19 (AP)—By a vote of 336 to 55 the house approved the \$7,000,000,000 appropriation for help to England tonight and sent it on to the senate where the leadership has hopefully arranged for its passage by next Tuesday.

F.D.R.'S LABOR BOARD SET
Washington, March 19, (AP)—An eleven-man board, headed by Dr. Clarence A. Dykstra, was created by President Roosevelt Wednesday to serve as a mediator in labor disputes which might threaten the progress of national defense production.

The board will be known as the national defense mediation board and will be called upon to act only after the regular conciliation services of the Labor Department have failed to bring about settlements between labor and industry.

YUGOSLAVIA 1/2 WAY AXIS
Belgrade, Yugoslavia, March 19 (UP)—Germany's long secret negotiations to win over Yugoslavia to the Axis ended successfully on Wednesday afternoon.

Here's the dope: Germany guarantees Yugoslavia's frontiers and

territory integrity; all signers to the Tri-Power pact—including Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria—must abide by this guarantee and thus may not violate Yugoslav frontiers; Yugoslavia remains free from all obligations prescribed in military clauses of the Tri-Power pact; Yugoslavs to get Aegean Sea outlet; Germany to transport thru its territory war materials, wounded and medical supplies; both companies to harmonize policies; Yugoslavs to stop anti-Nazi propaganda.

ITALIANS MOWED DOWN
Athens, Greece, March 19 (AP)—Seven new attacks by closely-packed ranks of Italians against Greek positions wrested from the Italians in their recent futile 7-day offensive have been smashed and the field left littered with dead, the reports were Wednesday.

RAW DEAL FOR FARMERS
Washington, March 19 (AP)—President Roosevelt and his agricultural assistants faced a revolt Wednesday by Senators who fear the farmer is getting the short end of prosperity promised by the national defense rush.
Sen. Bankhead asked: "Would-

not you like to see the farmers strike for a year?"

"I certainly would", Senator Smith of South Carolina replied.

WORST RAID, '41 IN LONDON
London, March 20 (AP)—German bombers blasted at London in the heaviest raid of the year Tuesday night and early Wednesday, scattering hundreds of high explosive bombs that caused uncounted deaths in the City's most thickly populated districts.

F.D.R. TAKES CRUISE
En Route With President Roosevelt, March 19 (AP)—President Roosevelt traveled southward by train Wednesday night for a short vacation cruise in southern waters after making a final check on foreign affairs, defense and labor problems in a series of White House conferences.

BILLS AT AUSTIN
These were introduced: making it unnecessary to have a poll tax to vote; excluding tips from social security.
Passed in House: Woman jury service. On the House floor: bill to limit doctor's liquor prescriptions and drug store stocks.

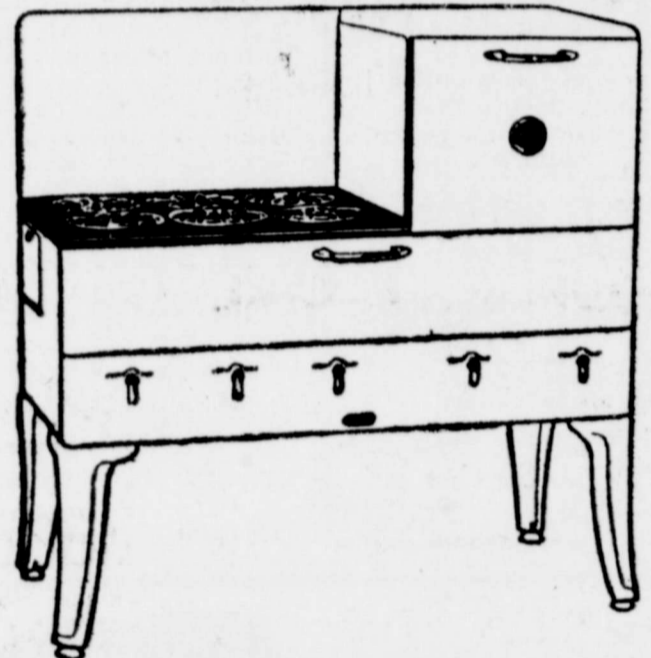

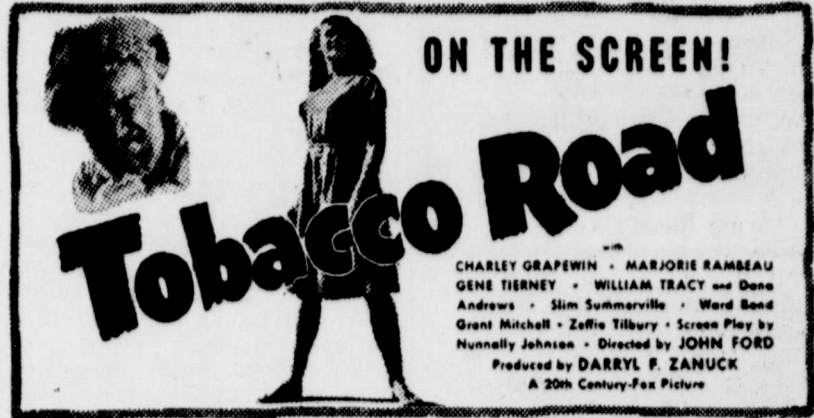

FARMERS TO GET MONEY FOR PLANTING TREES IN 1941

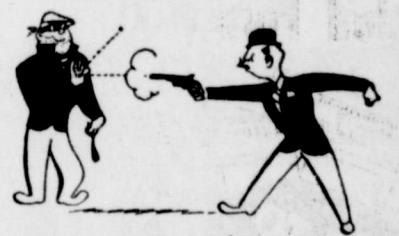
Every farmer in Texas should be familiar with the AAA's 1941 provision for payment of \$15 to each farmer for the planting and

maintaining of trees. The payments can be earned over and above regular soil building allowances.

Along the coast windbreaks of tamarix, or ever-green salt cedar may be planted, also pine, and the rate of pay is \$4.50 per acre.

On the plains hardwood deciduous trees are used, and the pay there is \$6 an acre.
