If you've passed 36 since that date however, you are liable for Selective Service training.

Registrants should keep in touch with their Local Board, and immediately notify it when he changes address and moves from one place to another the law says.

Also, be very careful in filling out the questionaire which is mailed; this will save both you and the Local Board plenty of trouble. If you are in doubt as to the answers, ask a member of the Advisory Board. It's their job. Too, if you think your classification is wrong, see the local Government Appeal Agent.






