NAZIS KILL DUBLINITES

Dublin, Eire, June 1. (UP)—The Eire Government Sunday night officially accused the German Air force of the severe air attack which killed at least thirty-five persons and injured 120 others in Dublin early Saturday.

FIGHTING ENDS IN IRAQ

Cairo, Egypt, June 1 (AP)—All fighting in Iraq between the British and Axis-inspired rebel forces of fugitive Rashid Ali al Gailani ended at 8 a. m. Sunday under terms of an armistice reached Saturday, Iraq sources here announced.

WHEAT MEN ARE FOR QUOTA

Washington, June 1 (AP)—The Agriculture Department received authority Sunday to tell farmers how much wheat they can sell or

feed this year and to collect a penalty of 48c a bushel from those who do not comply.

Growers are assured of a government crop loan for wheat at 85 percent of parity, or about 97c a bushel, compared with last year's loan rate of 56 per cent.

HUGH WALPOLE DIES

London, June 1 (AP)—Sir Hugh Walpole, the British novelist, who wrote almost a book a year from the age of 25, died of a heart attack early Sunday. He was 57.

JERSEY CITY'S BIG FIRE

Jersey City, N. J. June 1 (AP)—Fire Chief Frank Ertle Sunday estimated at \$25,000,000 the damage caused by the roaring Hudson river front fire which left four Jersey City square blocks in smoldering ruins.

BRITISH SAVE 15,000

London, June 1. (AP)—Britain has abandoned Crete to the Germans and their Italian helpers, ending twelve days of the war's most frightful slaughter.

ITALIANS DAMAGE TOBRUK

Rome, June 1 (AP)—A munitions dump was blown up at Tobruk, harbor defenses raked by bomb fire and a small munitions boat sunk in Italian air attacks on the surrounded British garrison in North Africa the Italian high command reported Sunday.

MOPPING UP IN CRETE

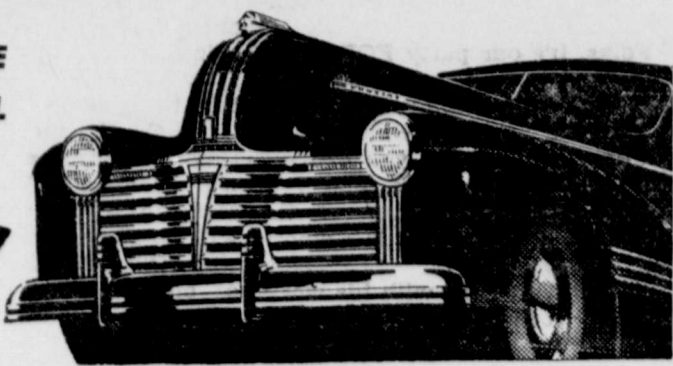

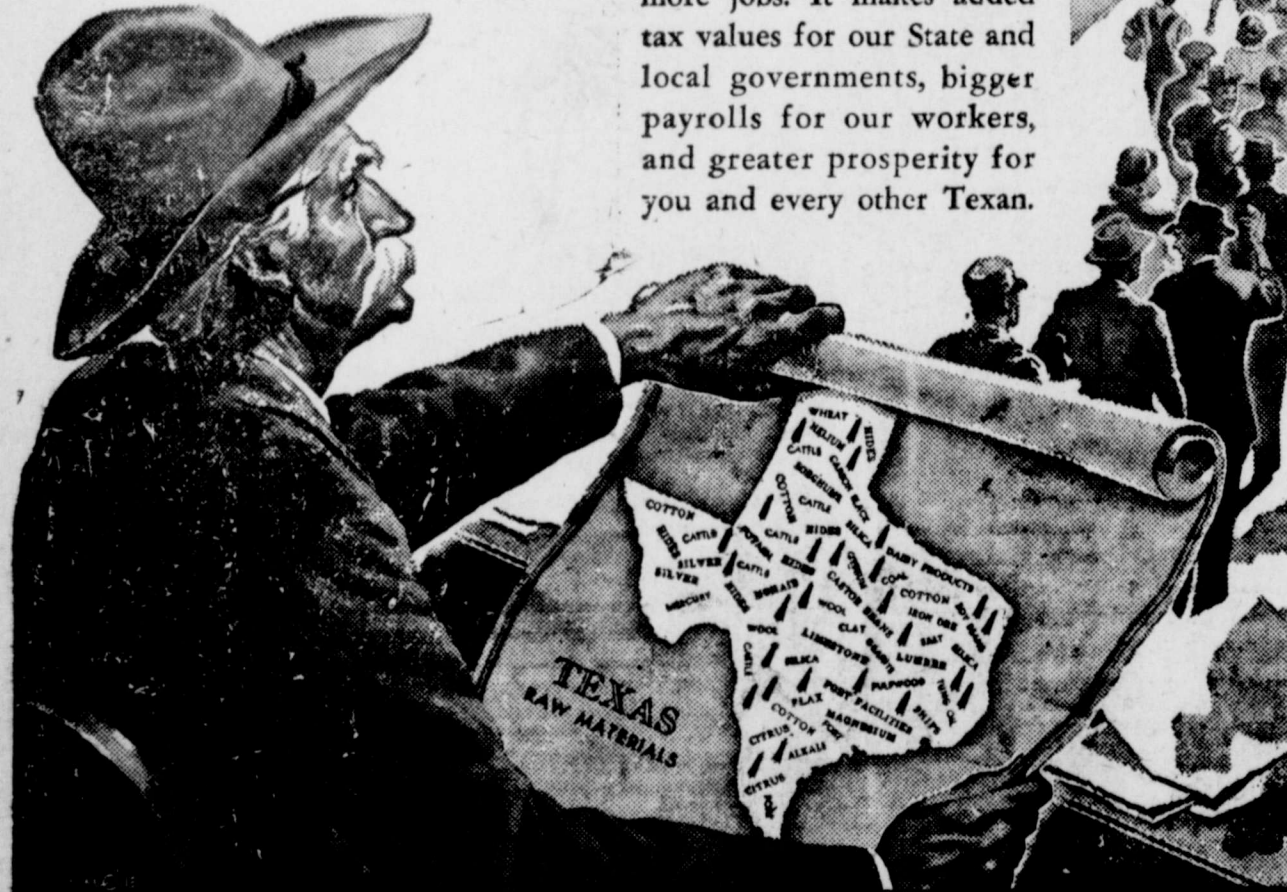
