## Grand Jury Makes Report To Judge: G-J Association

To the Hon. R. B. Cross, Judge of the 52nd Judicial District:  
Now comes your Grand Jury for the July term, A. D. 1941, of the District Court of Coryell County, Texas, and respectfully submits the following report. We have been in session 7 days and have interviewed 106 witnesses, as a result of our work we have returned 20 true bills, of which 16 are felonies and 4 misdemeanors.

Our session has been very pleasant in every way, and we wish to thank the various officers of the court and all individuals who have contributed to the comfort and convenience of our session.

This Grand Jury has undertaken the task of organizing for Coryell county a Coryell County Grand Jurors Association. Our unanimous decision to enter upon the organization of such an association was prompted by the consideration that the citizenry generally does not take an active and supporting interest in law enforcement and criminal reforms. Organized pressure groups usually exercise their influence for some private benefit or gain, but it will be the purpose of the Grand Jurors Association to include in its membership all citizens who have ever served on a Grand Jury in Coryell County, and it will be the purpose of this group to exercise its influence in strictly non-political matters for the purpose of assisting state and county officers in the discharge of their duties, and for the purpose of doing what is possible toward bringing about criminal reforms of recognized merit and desirability.

Probably at an early date a meeting will be called of all former Grand Jurors of Coryell county for the purpose of perfecting a permanent organization as outlined above and we call on all former Grand Jurors for their suggestions and cooperation in this undertaking.

A very vital matter that has been called to the attention of the Grand Jury, is the fact that many people of the county have become very careless in allowing their livestock to roam unattended upon our public roads and highways. This condition has led to several serious collisions and no doubt will continue to put our travelers in peril as long as this situation (Continued on back page)

## August Foods Good On Food Stamp Plan Are Announced

Foods for August, which can be bought with the Blue Food Stamps are: Fresh pears, plums, prunes, apples, oranges, peaches; and enriched wheat flour, fresh vegetables including potatoes, corn meal, shell eggs, raisins, dried prunes, hominy (corn) grits, dry edible beans, wheat flour, self-rising flour, enriched self-rising flour and whole wheat (graham) flour.

Pork and pork lard have been dropped from the list and vegetable shortening also.

## HEAD-ON CRASH SUNDAY AT 4:00 TAKES FOUR LIVES: OTHERS IN SERIOUS SHAPE

Four were killed and three others injured, one critically, when automobiles in which they were riding collided seven miles east of here on a bridge on Greenbrier creek on U. S. 84, shortly before 4 o'clock Sunday.

Those dead are: Lloyd L. McElroy of Odessa, and a former Wacoan, who received a broken neck, fractured skull and broken right leg.

M. L. Williams, Cora Williams, and Charlie McGregor, all negroes of 1423 S. 2nd, Waco. McGregor died at 10:15 p. m. in a Waco hospital.

Seriously injured are Oliver Riser, negro of 2200 S. 9th, who is critically injured.

Leola Roser, negress, of the same address received a broken arm and fractures to both legs and oth-

er cuts. Pauline Hughnes, negress had a broken collar bone and possible internal injuries.

Condition of the two women was said to be serious.

State Highway Patrolman T. R. Gallamore, who investigated the crash with Sheriff Jim Brown of Coryell county and Constable Billy Wheat of McGregor, said the vehicle occupied by the six negroes was apparently being driven on the wrong side of the road.

McElroy, headed toward Waco, applied his brakes in trying to avoid the collision. His car went into a sidewise skid and the machine carrying the negroes struck McElroy's auto in the middle of the right side, according to Gallamore. The negroes were headed toward Gatsville. Both vehicles were almost demolished.

### JAPS ON QUICK DRIVE

Chungking, China, July 27 (AP)—Japan is making feverish preparations for an opportunistic move in either of two directions, south into Thailand or northward into Russia's Siberia, operatives of the Chinese intelligence services reported Sunday.

Berlin, July 27 (AP)—DNB, official German News agency indicated a German advance to within 45 miles of Leningrad Sunday as other German war reports told of Nazi planes dropping hundreds of thousands of pounds of demolition and incendiary bombs on Moscow.

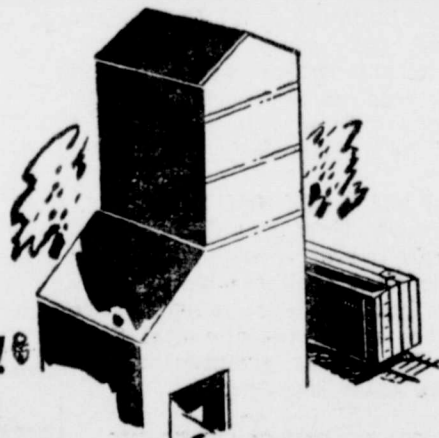

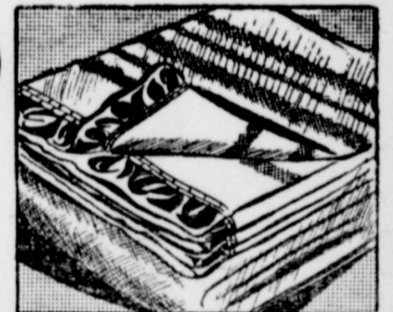

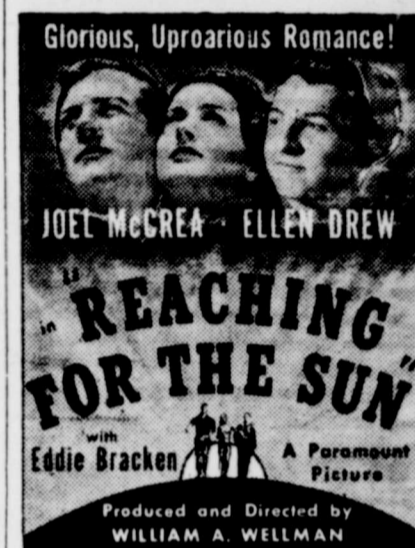

MEDITERRANEAN MIX-UP

Inside story on General Wavell's transfer to India, as told in diplomatic dispatches, is that Wavell had been quarreling with Churchill and had opposed political-military moves such as the campaign in Greece and Crete and the expedition to Solum. More important from the American point of view, Wavell had favored the evacuation of all British forces from the entire Mediterranean area. And U. S. military experts agreed with him—in fact, urged it.

So although in a sense General Wavell is being demoted, yet in other respects he will be in a position to command British forces from an area to which he had urged that British forces retreat.

For some time General Wavell had contended that Britain's position in the Mediterranean was indefensible. The British force of only 400,000 men in the Near East faced a combined Axis total twice as strong—400,000 Germans and Italians in Libya, plus 600,000 Nazis in Greece, Bulgaria and Rumania.

The latter figure has been partially diminished by transfers to Russia; but Wavell argued that the Nazi-Fascist armies could concentrate attack in one place while British troops had to spread out over a far-flung line from Libya to Syria and Iraq. Therefore he disagreed with Churchill on all military moves which had a political motive.

U. S. Worried Over Atlantic.

U. S. military and naval strategists sided with Wavell, were strong for the idea of a complete British withdrawal from the Mediterranean. The strategy behind this was twofold:

1. The British have lost 40 per cent of their original Mediterranean fleet. The losses at Crete were much worse than officially admitted, and even in the Syrian campaign naval losses were considerable. Therefore, American naval men, facing the probability of having to help the British fleet in the Atlantic, did not want the fleet further weakened.

2. The United States is more interested in what happens on the bulge of Africa around Dakar (opposite Brazil) than it is in the Mediterranean.

To this end, both General Wavell and U. S. strategists favored the idea of withdrawing British forces from

the Mediterranean entirely and establishing a new line of defense across the very center of Africa—from Port Sudan on the Red sea to Freetown on the Atlantic ocean.

This line of defense meant that about 1,500 miles of the hottest desert in the world would be between the Nazis and the British lines. Over such a desert it is difficult for tanks to operate without heating up; also it is difficult for the average bomber to carry a load over such distances. So it was expected that the Nazis would exhaust themselves in the deep, hot deserts of Africa.

Part of the plan contemplated a highway straight across equatorial Africa from Freetown and later from Dakar to Port Sudan.

Churchill Says No.

However, Churchill was flatly opposed. So were many other British leaders. They felt that the shock of withdrawal from the Mediterranean, traditional sphere of British influence, and from Suez which had been identified with the British empire for years, would be too much for the British public.

This debate occurred before the Nazi attack on Russia and before the British march into Syria. But after the slowness of Wavell's success in Syria, all these factors culminated in his transfer to India.

There Wavell can concentrate on defense of the most important part of the empire—if the Nazis creep up on the Indian border in South Russia. Also, he will not be in the Mediterranean, for the defense of which he had no great enthusiasm.

MERRY-GO-ROUND

It was a breathless day in Washington. The only breeze was kicked up by the little subway car running between the senate office building and the Capitol. Passenger Hattie Caraway, senator from Arkansas, clutched at her flying strands of hair.

Curly-haired Sen. Berkeley Bunker of Nevada, who succeeded to the seat of the late Key Pittman, never misses a senate session and is assiduously studying parliamentary procedure. Vice President Wallace has called him to preside during his absence more than any other senator.

United Service Organizations have had some big gifts, but none more touching than the savings brought in by one Harry Katz, who emptied on the desk 512 pennies, 44 nickels, eight dimes, and one quarter.

Displayed in the department of agriculture lobby are four practical pamphlets: "Cockroaches and Their Control," "Bedbugs: Causes and Cures," "House Ants," and "How to Control Fleas."

women. We believe that parents should give more consideration and show more concern over the type and character of the places they allow their children to frequent.

It has further come to the notice of the Grand Jury that in many instances stock thieves cannot be prosecuted and livestock cannot be recovered because of insufficiency of the identification. There are frequent obliterations of paint brands and crop brands, on sheep particularly, and this Grand Jury would commend to the stock raiser the practice of fire branding. Experience has shown this type of brand cannot be removed.

Our view, is that Drunk Driving still remains one of the chief law enforcement problems of our county. This is especially true since the Army Camp at Brownwood has vastly increased the traffic on our highways. All citizens should promptly report this violation to the officers before some life is lost or property destroyed.

We wish to thank the Hon. R. B. Cross for his splendid charge and counsel; the District and County Attorneys for their assistance, in our work; the Sheriff and his Deputies for his untiring work; the Bailiffs and officers of the court for their diligent response, and the Janitor for his concern over our comfort during the session. Since we have completed our work, we respectfully ask that our report be filed and that we be discharged.
