## Call No. 22 Is Out For Army Service Here August 13

You've seen a lot of the Army, this week, but that's not as much as these boys will see, since Uncle Sam's calling them for service, beginning August 13, and they are Karl Schenewolf Jr., Earl Morrow Scott and Homer Clayton Laxton, who will report to the induction station at Dallas.

The new registrees, who signed July 1 are integrated in with the old registrant, which means that every fourteenth man of the October 16 registration beginning with order number 628, a new registrant has been placed. These will be examined and called with the eligible men of the first registration.

Of the 1843 classifications completed by the Local Board only 3 appeal to the Board of Appeals have been made, 18 have requested to appear before the Local Board for a rehearing on their classification, 12 of which have been sustained and 6 reclassified; 71 men have been inducted, 17 rejected at induction station for physical defects, 4 have been cancelled due to death and 8 are delinquent. As of July 31, there are 339 tentative Class 5 awaiting physical examination for final classification.

Washington, Aug. 6—Congress is up in arms against President Roosevelt's veto of the \$320,000,000 federal highway aid and road authorization bill. The Senate voted, 57 to 19, Wednesday to override the veto.

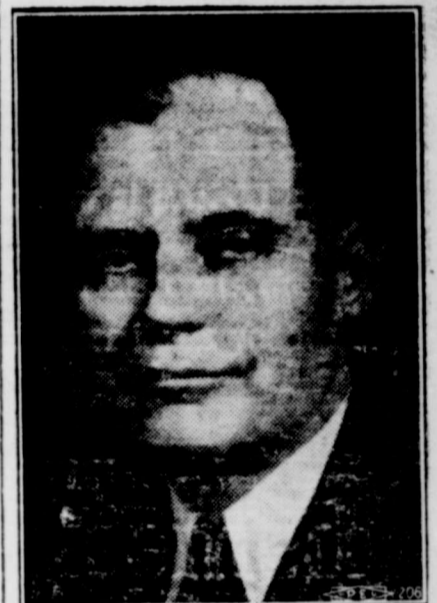
Somehow, this man don't follow any cut-and-dried kind of speech in the senate. He calls his shots as he sees them, but he doesn't see them like the "general run" does.

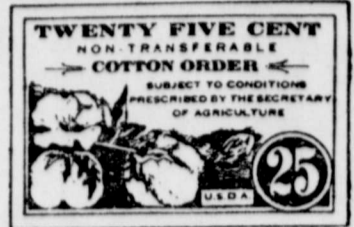

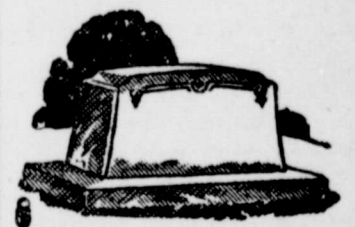
**LOCAL PEOPLE ASSISTING

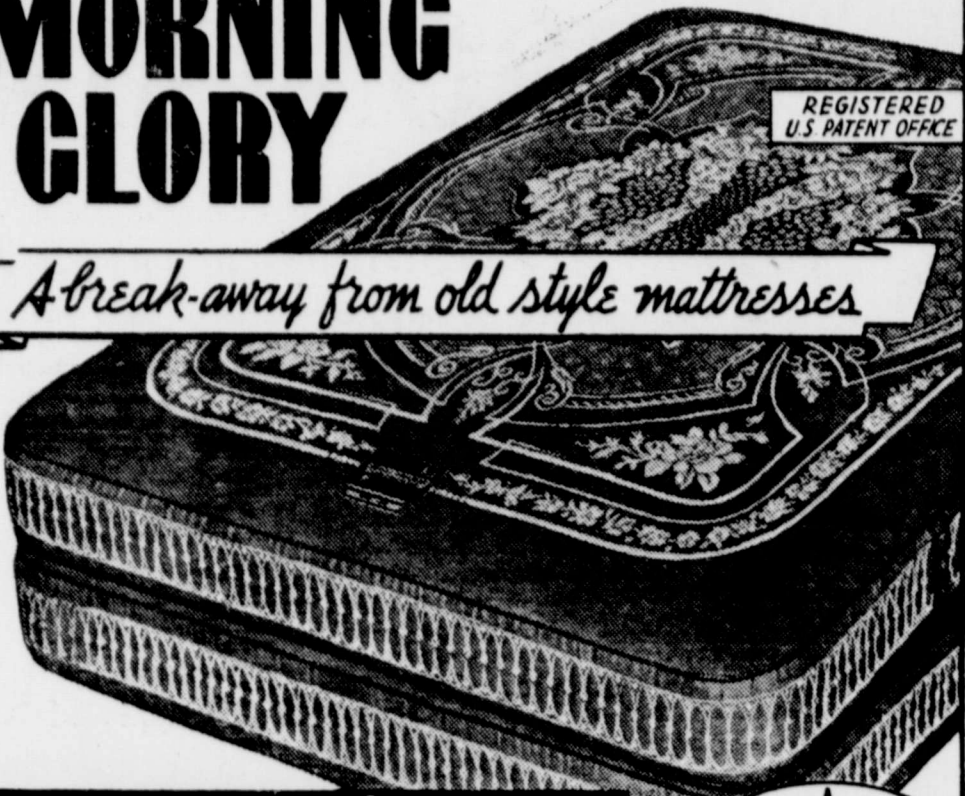
