GATESVILLE MAN WINS HONOR AT CAMP BOWIE

After the completion of firing of the Thompson Sub-Machine Gun by his company this week, Capt. W. D. Singleton, Commander of Headquarters Company of the 755th Tank Battalion, announces that of the 179 men firing the weapon, Pvt. Cecil J. Cantrel had the high score. Pvt. Cantrel is from Mexia, Texas. Pvt. Cantrel's score was 96.

Close behind Cantrel was Alton J. Guirdy, Port Neches, Texas with a score of 94.

Sgt. Vladus Poshkus, Nashau, New Hampshire; Henry J. Dulock, West, Texas; and C. S. Jones of Gatesville, Texas tied for third in the company with a score of 92.

This weapon is a 45 caliber shoulder weapon and the course fired on the range at Camp Bowie was, 10 rounds single shot and 15 rounds automatic fire. A perfect score would have been 100.

1. Seek no aggrandizement, territorial or other.
 2. No territorial changes that do not suit freely expressed wishes of people concerned.
 3. Right of people to choose and maintain the form of government they wish.
 4. Equal trade on equal terms and access to raw materials which are needed for economic prosperity.
 5. Economic collaboration of all nations so as to secure for all improved labor standards, economic advancement and social security.
 6. After destruction of nazi tyranny, to establish a peace giving all nations the means of dwelling in safety in their boundaries which will afford assurance to the people that they may live out their lives in freedom from fear and want.
 7. A peace that should enable all men to transverse the high seas and oceans without hindrance.
 8. Abandonment of the use of force, and disarmament, thereby relieving the people of the crushing burden of armaments.
- President Roosevelt met Prime Minister Churchill somewhere in the Atlantic, along with high army navy, air and other officials from both countries.

SMOLENSK FALLS. ODESSA NEXT

(By Associated Press)
The Red Army officially acknowledged abandonment of Smolensk on the central front Wednesday night and German reports indicated the hour of disaster was drawing nearer for Russians in the western Ukraine.

VICHY HUNGRY. DRY

Vichy, France, Aug. 13 (AP)—The reshuffled Petain regime tackled Wednesday one of the sorest problems confronting France—food supply.

CAN'T SHOOT 'EM. CAN'T SEE 'EM

London, Aug. 13 (AP)—Great Britain's new weapon, the American-made fortress bomber, is spreading fear and contributing to an awkward spirit of revolt in Germany and Occupied Europe, say dispatches.

They fly so high you can't see 'em, hear 'em or shoot 'em.

PROPERTY BILL FLOPS

Washington, Aug. 13 (AP)—Another segment of the administration's defense program struck a congressional reef Wednesday when the House rejected a compromise version of legislation empowering the President to draft munitions or machinery and supplies for their production.

8-HOUR LAW SUSPENDED

Washington, Aug. 13 (AP)—Following a precedent of the World War, President Roosevelt Wednesday suspended the 8-hour day law for about 75,000 mechanics and construction laborers employed by the War Department. It applies to air fields, troop cantonments and other construction works necessary for defense. Time-and-a-half for all over 8.

VETO FROZEN COTTON, WHEAT

Washington, Aug 13 (AP)—Congress completed action Wednesday on a bill to prevent the government from marketing its stores of cotton and wheat in any move to curb undue price increases, but Agriculture Department officials

predicted that President Roosevelt would veto it.

EXTENSION BILL OKEHD

Washington, Aug. 13 (AP)—Leaders of the Senate nonintervention group conceded Wednesday that there was little they could do to prevent final Senate approval of the Army extension bill, and Democratic Leader Alben Barkley of Kentucky predicted it would be sent to the White House Thursday.

The measure was passed by the House Tuesday night by the single vote margin of 203 to 202.

THEY MET: FD. CHURCHILL

Somewhere in the Atlantic, the President and Mr. Churchill met and made up a set of rules similar to Woodrow Wilson's 14 points. They were a sort of statement of policy, with no definite action stated, only to fight Hitlerism to the finish, and let all free peoples have the sort of government they wish without any coercion. The two contended their countries sought no territory or domination, wanted to help the small nations.
