4. Equal trade on equal terms and access to raw materials which are needed for economic prosperity.

5. Economic collaboration of all nations so as to secure for all improved labor standards, economic advancement and social security.

6. After destruction of nazi tyranny, to establish a peace giving all nations the means of dwelling in safety in their boundaries which will afford assurance to the people that they may live out their lives in freedom from fear and want.

7. A peace that should enable all men to transverse the high seas. and oceans without hindrance.

Abandonment of the use of force, and disarmament, thereby relieving the people of the crushing burden of armaments.
