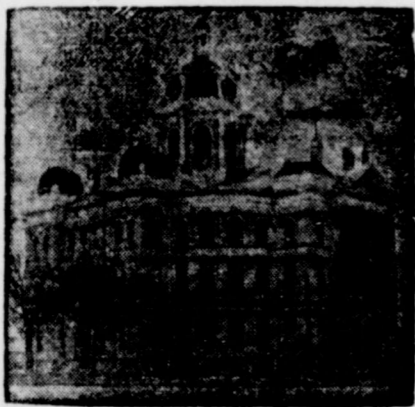

County Criminal Court Makes "Profit", 's Fact!

"The — county criminal court netted the county a profit of \$1863.78 during the fiscal year August 1940 to August 1941. The judge and "solicitor" made a report to the county commissioners Monday which revealed that during the year 400 cases were tried. The fines amounted to \$2,461.50 and prosecuting fees and other fees due the county, \$902.28 making a total of \$3,363.79.

"The fixed charges for operating the court are as follows: Judge, \$600; solicitor \$600, Clerk \$150, sheriff \$150, total \$1500.

"So, total collected: \$3363.78 less expense, \$1500; net \$1,863.78."

Now, that didn't happen in Coryell county, or may be it was bettered here. This happened in Gatesville, North Carolina, and is the first time we've ever heard of a court of any kind making a profit. This, ought to be referred to the Collector of Internal Revenue as another source of Income Tax. Also, Congress might take note.

CALCIUM ARSENATE FOR BUGS

Recommended for cotton bugs and leafworms on cotton is calcium arsenate, which should be applied at 5 to 7 pounds per acre. Further information can be had from the County Agent's office. These proportions are suggested: 1 part Paris Green, 1 part flour, 5 parts hydrated lime.

"Well, this is Monday evening and we got a short time to write. I received your copy of Friday's paper and sure was glad to read the news of good old Coryell.

Well, I will write you a few things, how things are here. First we learn to do everything with a snap here. We recruits get up at 4:30 every morning, shave and clean our rifles, also our leather goods—all in about 20 minutes. Then we go to breakfast or Morning Chow and then do our add jobs, that is, each squad has a job sweeping the deck, cleaning the bulkheads, policing around the barracks and shining the brass work. My job happens to be shining the brass, and when they say shine, that is really what they mean. Then, we get our rifles and cartridge belts about five and take physical exercise.

After that, we go to the drill field and try to learn to march. I think we are learning very fast, but our Instructor told us that we looked like a bunch of feather merchants or cattle and a few more words I won't write. We drill on a long sand field, that is, as long as we do good, and if we don't we go to the beach and drill

TWO RED TOWNS LOST

(By The Associated Press)
Russia officially acknowledged Monday the loss of two important towns in the Ukraine to the Germans, but the Red armies simultaneously demonstrated they still have their power by hurling strong counterblows against the Nazis on the central and southwestern fronts.

FDR-HULL STUDY AXIS MOVES

Washington, Aug. 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt came back to the capital Sunday from his momentous conferences with Prime Minister Churchill and immediately began mapping specific methods for achieving closer anti-Axis collaboration among the United States, Britain and Russia.

JAP-EAST INDIES PACT

New York, Aug. 17 (AP)—New trade talks between Japan and the Netherlands East Indies are progressing so smoothly that resumption of normal trade relations is expected next week, a Domei, Japanese dispatch quoted by the British radio said Sunday night.

O'DANIEL TO HELP F.D.R.

Washington, Aug. 17 (AP)—Senator W. Lee O'Daniel said in a speech prepared for radio broadcasts by transcription in Texas Sunday that he had been trying to see the President ever since he arrived in Washington, but had not because "for some reason or other he left town the day before I arrived and had not returned, up until the time this program was prepared."

SHIPYARD SEIZURE UP TO FD

Washington Aug. 17 (AP)—An executive order for the Government to take over the strikebound Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock Company was understood Sunday to be lying on President Roosevelt's desk at the White House.

FRANCE ASKS U.S. "FRIEND"

Vichy, France, Aug. 17 (UP)—An appeal for the United States to recognize France as liaison agent between the Axis new order in Europe and the Western Hemisphere appeared Sunday in an officially approved editorial in the authoritative newspaper LeTemps.

10,000 NEGROES ON BOAT?

New York, Aug. 17 (AP)—Three women were trampled to death and sixty persons were injured in the rush Sunday when 10,000 pleasure-seeking Negroes were stampeded by rumors that their \$1.25 Hudson River excursion tickets were bogus.

ALLIES WARN IRAN

London, Aug. 17 (AP)—British and Russian envoys at Teheran were authoritatively reported to have issued a second warning to the Iran (Persian) government that the "excessively large number of Germans" in that vital middle east land were a continuing cause of alarm to London and Moscow.

SALES TAX ON MANUFACTURERS?

Washington, Aug. 17 (AP)—Senator Vandenberg, republican, Michigan, proposed today a 5 percent manufacturer's sales tax to raise approximately \$1,250,000,000 in new revenues, and asserted there was "substantial support" for the proposal within the senate finance committee.
