Paul C. Colgin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Colgin is written up in "Texas Agriculture" published by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, a magazine printed at Richardson, Texas. Mr. Colgin is State Wheat Loan Supervisor of the AAA.

The article says that thru Mr. Colgin's efforts mainly, a well deserved reduction in wheat insurance rates has been secured.

The new rates, he says, apply only in cases where the granary is separate and apart from any other structure on the farm, and the granary can be used only for the purpose of storing grain under the loan. General usage of the granary as a barn will not merit this rate reduction, it is said.

Mr. Colgin has been a county agent, dairyman and for the past several years has been at College Station in some capacity. He is well known by all Coryell county sportsmen as a former star footballer with GHS.

At a special called meeting of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce, a committee was named to name a new president of the Chamber of Commerce, and it was composed of J. Hurl McClellan, Andrew Kendrick and Bythel Cooper. George B. Painter was named President, at a breakfast Thursday morning. Joe Walker, former prexy resigned "due to business reasons".

Another shift was made, with Byron Leaird Jr., being named Chairman of the Good Will Committee, replacing Mr. Painter, and Bill Nesbitt was named as a new director, and was put on the Good Will Committee.

At the meeting, a resolution was passed to name a special committee to take care of all army camp work in connection with the prospective camp near Gatesville, and a committee goes today to confer with Architect D. L. Lewis at Valley Mills. Those forming this committee are Louis Thomson, Chairman, J. Hurl McClellan, Floyd Zeigler, and Robert W. Brown.

The idea is to get the officials to designate this Gatesville-Valley Mills highway as a part of the camp, as an outlet west. Washington, Aug. 20 (AP)—Jesse Jones disclosed Wednesday that he was ready to put part of the RFC's huge bankroll behind Russia's armies in their struggle with the invading Nazis.

DEMO'S OPTIMISTIC OVER REDS

London, Aug. 20 (AP)—Official optimism in Washington and London over Russia's chance in the struggle with Germany is based on three assurances given to President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill by Harry Hopkins during their Atlantic conference, it was reported reliably Wednesday night.

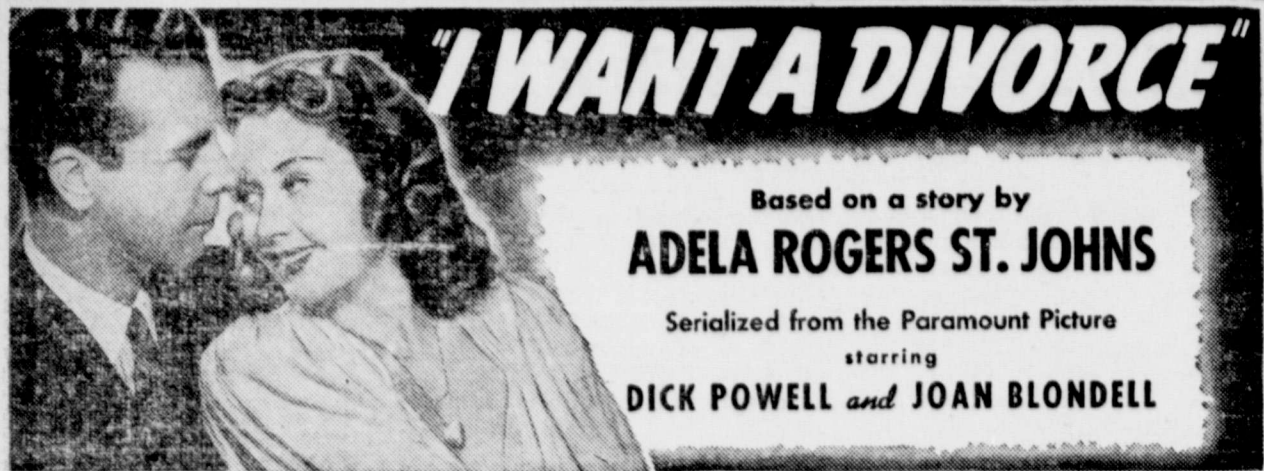

"Yes, sir," he agreed. "I always wished that I'd been born about a hundred years ago. That pioneer stuff would have been my meat."

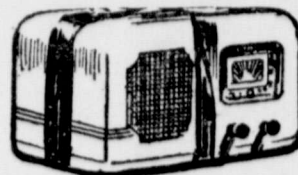
As he set another log on the chopping block, Jerry urged him to rest. "You must be getting tired," she remarked.

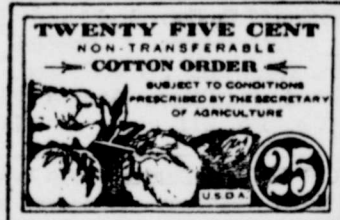

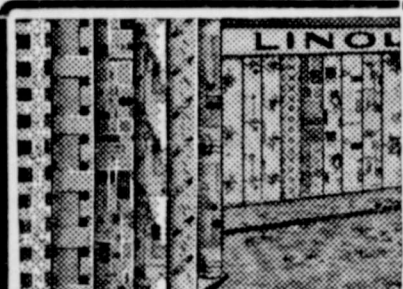
