W. R. Poage, Representative eral Bureau of Investigation in an all out war on spies and saboteurs seeking to undermine the security of the state and nation, will be the guest speaker at the mobilization conference for peace officers which opens at 9 a.m. today at the

Raleigh Hotel, Waco. Congressman Poage's subject will be "The Citizen's Duty in National Defense" which is scheduled for 10:30 today.

W. M. Acers, Acting Special Agent in charge of the San Antonio Division of the FBI, stated that nearly 200 officers are expected to attend the conference.

Officers to attend will include Chiefs of Police and members of their departments, Sheriffs, and their Deputies, Railroad police, City Marshals, Constables and others.
