Supt. R. N. Winship Is Lion Speaker At Wed. Luncheon

Wednesday noon, Gatesville Lions Club were given a double treat, when Superintendent R. N. Winship of the State Juvenile Training School spoke, and Coach Clinton White presented a picture in technicolor of the NTSTC-ETSTC Lone Star Conference Game, which was a bang up game, and a beautiful film.

Supt. Winship, didn't make a "speech", according to his own statement, but did talk himself into the friendship and confidence of the bigger than usual collection of Lions. The attention of this body to Mr. Winship's remarks was nothing short of remarkable.

Mr. Winship said his whole purpose at the school was to rehabilitate as many of the boys at the school as possible, and that that didn't mean all of them. Eighty percent of them, he said, came from homes "from the tail end of civilization" or from broken ones, and they were not Boy Scouts or Sunday School Boys, and that he did not want to make "prison bait" of them.

He continued: I did not come here to wield a big stick and fire a bunch of people, and so far, only one man has been fired; the others resigned their positions. I only brought one employee, and that one is the Assistant Superintendent J. R. Ham. Only employees are going to be used who can do the job, and politics will not enter into their selection.

"The Southern States" he stated, "were far behind in this sort of rehabilitation; far behind the Western and some of the Eastern and Mid-Western states. As for the boys "running" the same situation would arise during any change, similar to the just past change, and communities in and near Gatesville should not be alarmed, as the boys will be in hand, and will be disciplined. He said, "we are going to keep them corralled and this will be done with the plan that is being put into effect now. Bad ideas cannot be taken out of a boy's head without putting a good one in its place, and he is not going to let the few boys that cannot be reached prevent the ones that can be reached from being rehabilitated."

A house-to-house canvass on food production and a sign-up of pledges to increase the production of foods needed in this nation and those nations resisting aggression, will be made, according to B. F. Vance, AAA official.

Increased production will be asked on milk, eggs, hogs and other food products, and it is expected the farm plan, which has been used in the past to inform farmers as to their allotments and probable payments and to encourage soil-building work, will be revised to include a complete survey of food production and a pledge of greater production.

Poage Helps FBI In All-Out Fight Upon Saboteurs

W. R. Poage, Representative from the 11th Congressional district, joining hands with the Federal Bureau of Investigation in an all out war on spies and saboteurs seeking to undermine the security of the state and nation, will be the guest speaker at the mobilization conference for peace officers which opens at 9 a. m. today at the Raleigh Hotel, Waco.

Congressman Poage's subject will be "The Citizen's Duty in National Defense" which is scheduled for 10:30 today.

W. M. Acers, Acting Special Agent in charge of the San Antonio Division of the FBI, stated that nearly 200 officers are expected to attend the conference.

Officers to attend will include Chiefs of Police and members of their departments, Sheriffs, and their Deputies, Railroad police, City Marshals, Constables and others.

Representing Gatesville and Coryell County will be Chief of Police Preston Jones, Pleas A. Walker, City Secretary Eiland Lovejoy, Sheriff J. H. Brown, Deputy Sheriff Ted Lilljedahl, County Attorney C. E. Alvis Jr., Constable George Hodges, Mayor C. E. Gandy, and possible others in law enforcement positions in Coryell county.

Colonel Homer Garrison, of the Texas Department of Public Safety will give a 30 minute address, speaking on "Law Enforcement's Task in National Defense", 11:15 a. m.

After the speech by Congressman Poage, the roll will be called (the officers will register) and then the meetings will be secret, with only members. Technical problems of law enforcement, identification, war safety, bombing, and other possible trouble will be depicted by lantern slides, all ending with a sound motion picture "Men of the FBI".

F.D.R. MAY ASK PLENTY

Washington, Sept. 10 (UP)—Speculation grew Wednesday night that President Roosevelt's mementous World Wide Broadcast on foreign policy Thursday night may include a call for repeal of the neutrality act or the use of convoys to safeguard lend-lease shipments to nations resisting the Axis.

ALL DEFENSE NEEDS LISTED

Washington, Sept. 10 (AP)—The supply priorities and allocations board Wednesday instructed its executive director, Donald M. Nelson, to work out a complete schedule of the nation's military and civilian requirements in an effort to solve the problems of shortages of materials and of expansion of production facilities.

RUSSIES GET 31 NAZI SHIPS

Moscow, Sept. 11. (AP)—Mighty Red counter blows have crumpled three German drives on the vital

central fronts and Soviet defenders are standing firm on the approaches to Leningrad, Kiev and Odessa, Russian front dispatches said early Thursday.

Thirty one Nazi bombers were downed trying to brea kthru Leningrad's defenses.

NAZIS LOSE CONFIDENCE

Berlin, Sept 11 (AP)—German military reports said Thursday that a number of Soviet field fortifications blocking the German advance on Leningrad had been destroyed in terrific dive-bombing raids.

Dienst Aus Deutschland, an authoritative commentary asserted that there would be no unnecessary sacrifice of lives to gain a swift triumph.

NEW BOARD NAMED

Hyde Park, N. Y., Sept. 10 (AP)—President Roosevelt on Wednesday appointed a 5-man board,

headed by Dean Wayne Lyman Morse of the U. of Oregon, to investigate issues in the threatened strike of 1,250,000 railroad employees.

FIRST DRAFTEE OUT

San Diego, California, Sept. 10 (AP)—Twenty-five selectees, led by W. Houston Wolfe, 34, an Atmore (Ala.) butcher, lined up Wednesday at the Camp Callan finance office, their last stop in the Army.

GOV.'S BOND PLAN OBJECTED

Austin, Sept. 10 (AP)—House and Senate bickering over procedure today left uncrystallized a legislative decision on what course to chart toward a solution of the road bond problem.

There was sharp criticism of quick committee approval of a senate bill embodying the recommendations of the governor as Joe Hill of Henderson complained the bill had not been given sufficient public hearing.

SIX-MAN FOOTBALL PRE-VIEW FOR 14TH DISTRICT AND PRE-VIEW BY MOHRMANN

Included in the District 14 six-

man football league are Oglesby, Flat, Pottsville, Copperas Cove, Pearl, Ireland, Lometa and Turnersville, which as usual is liable to present some stormy sessions in this new sport.

Historically, Coach Hedgepeth's Pearl Dragons copped the 1938 cup, taking the Ireland Cardinals in the play off. There were only four teams that year, the other two being Flat and Turnersville. Two more clubs joined in '39; Oglesby and Copperas Cove, and in '40 Pottsville and Lometa were admitted. In 1939 Turnersville's Buffaloes, coached by Virgil Jones, and featuring the great running back Huckaby won the flat by ousting Copperas Cove Bulldogs in a see-saw battle, 33-24.

'40's winner was Oglesby's Tigers, coached by Truett Shults who took the Flat Yellowjackets 19-9 in the playoff. Pearl, so far, is the only championship team to have gone thru any season undefeated, and that was the first year of the district.

Here's a brief preview of the '41 season's prospects:

Oglesby: With only one man from last year's champs returning, Billy Clearman, end, the Oglesby prospects are not in the least certain. Some good reserves were in camp last year, and the new coach, Coleman Carpenter, may be able to get a dangerous team out of the young and inexperienced prospects.

Flat: Down Flat way, they'll be able to put lettermen Williams, Blackshear, Whigham and Kennedy on the field, and have a limited number of reserves who may pan out. The Jackets are a threat, but, are definitely not a championship threat.

Copperas Cove: The Cove can count on several lettermen from last year, and this team is poked by most of the coaches as one of the favorites in this race. Faubian,

a great back and two fine ends are gone, but the replacements are liable to go somewhere.

Turnersville: Coach Virgil Jones' club should show considerable better than last seasons, which, in some quarters was a miserable season. Adding a year to the boys experience, and they'll be just as dangerous as the name Buffalo implies. They might be near the top.

Pottsville: Coach Rodney Love's boys had a rocky season last one, and were barely nosed out in one contest 0-6 by Oglesby, the champs and they took the Cove 24-6 late in the season. How they're going to show in '41 is a moot question, but, they'll bear watching.

Ireland: Coach Smith's boys with Lemmer, a big back with speed and power to burn, along with several others who will be back, look hot to these old eyes. They're a hard hitting outfit, and well, you just can't tell. It might be the Cards.

Pearl: New coach, new material. You know what that usually means on a gridiron. But, you don't know Pearl, if you think that means much. Too, to make matters worse, there's no Moseley for the Dragons. Unless both "news" work out, it won't be so hot for them, seems to us.

Lometa: Lometa's club finished in the cellar last year, but this is another year. However, reports from that locale don't seem to be too optimistic, but then, they're just as apt to hit a natural as anybody else. It might be Lometa.

All in all, this season, as all other 6-man seasons depend on what's the count when the final whistle is "blewed". So, coaches, teams, fans, it's anybody's Cup. Anybody's cup!
