Announcement has been made that Cecil P. Coston, Hico, Texas, has been appointed division manager of the Central Texas Division of Community Public Service Co., succeeding W. D. Nuckols who passed away recently following a heart attack after 14 years of service with the company.

Mr. Coston, at 36, is a veteran employee of Community Public Service Company and its predecessor company, having started in August, 1927, as a member of a construction crew when the company's highline system in Central Texas was being built. He was promoted to district lineman at Clifton later in the same year and in September, 1938 was made local manager at Walnut Springs. In September, 1929, he was promoted to the position of district manager at Hico, which post he has held until his present advancement.

Born in Cranfills Gap, Mr. Coston is a native of Bosque County and has lived in Central Texas all of his life with the exception of a brief period spent in Mexico as an employee of an American-owned oil company. His father, Dr. T. C. Coston, of Clifton, is a widely-known and respected member of his profession.

NAVY BEGINS CONVOY

Washington, Sept. 17 (UP)—American warships are conveying as far as Iceland ships of all flags carrying war supplies to Britain and its allies, Secretary of Navy Frank Knox said Wednesday.

NAZIS THREATEN FRENCH

Vichy, France, Sept. 18 (AP)—The German conquerors Wednesday night warned all Parisians that they were liable to be shot as hostages unless attacks on Nazi soldiers cease, and the police in the occupied zone early Thursday pressed house-to-house searches for hidden arsenals.

3 SWEDISH SHIPS SUNK

Stockholm, Sweden, Sept. 17 (AP)—Three of Sweden's best modern destroyers exploded and sank Wed. in a series of mysterious blasts in Harsfjaerden, a fjord south of Stockholm long used as a naval proving ground and anchorage.

R.A.F. FLEET INVADES FRANCE

London, Sept. 17 (AP)—More than 300 British fighters escorted bomber squadrons over northern France Wednesday to bomb the big power plant at Bethune.

4 SINKINGS CLAIMED

Berlin, Sept. 18 (Thursday) (AP)—German speedboats in the English Channel pounced on a British

convoy Tuesday night and sank four ships of 25,000 tons, German military reports said early Thursday.

REDS REPULSE NAZIS

(By Associated Press)
A continued Soviet counter-offensive along the center, in which the Germans were reported thrown back heavily in two undesignated sectors after having suffered an earlier and major defeat before Smolensk with 10,000 Nazis killed or wounded, was claimed Wednesday by the Russians.

LEGION VOTES ALL-OUT EFFORT

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 17 (UP)—The American Legion Wednesday reversed a 23 year stand against creation of a second American Expeditionary Force and demanded repeal of the neutrality law in an all-out effort to defeat Hitler.

RED PARACHUTISTS IN IRAN

Teheran, Iran, Sept. 17 (AP)—Hundreds of Russian parachute troops and strong mechanized forces occupied the strategic outskirts of Teheran Wednesday and both Russian and British staff officers entered the capital to forestall any friction with the Iranians.

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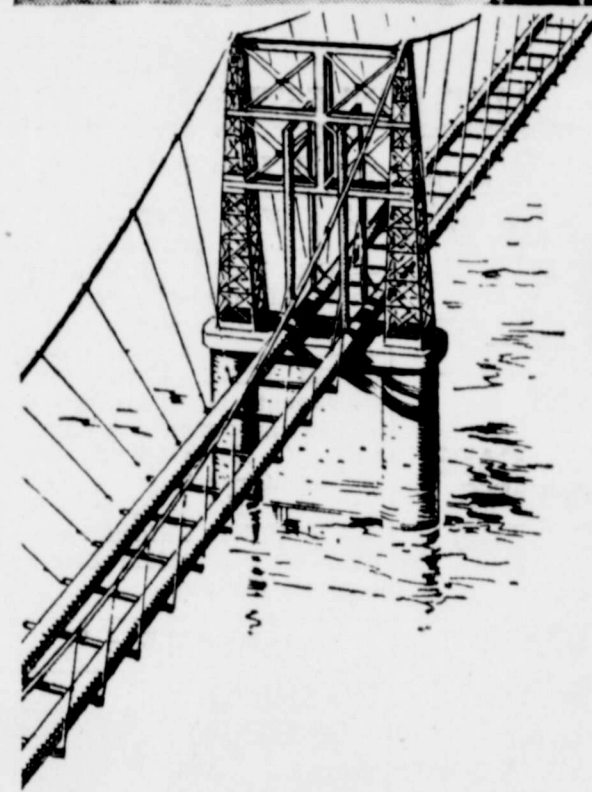

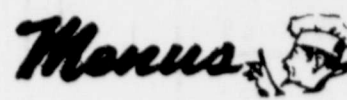

VITAMIN VEGETABLE SALAD

Wash, small, tender, inside leaves of spinach until absolutely free of sand. Peel carrots and cucumber. Wash and shred cabbage. Scrub green pepper, radishes, celery and several cauliflower buds with vegetable brush. Place all these vegetables in ice water for an hour to get crisp. Wash lettuce, watercress and pasley, place in refrigerator to chill. Just before serving time place lettuce and watercress in large salad bowl. Add tomatoes, peeled and sliced very thin, and beets, peeled and grated. Drain chilled vegetables, dry thoroughly between towels. Slice cucumber and radishes very thin; grate cauliflower buds and carrots; add to contents of salad bowl together with shredded cab-

bage and spinach leaves. Chop together peeled onion, parsley, green pepper and celery. Combine with mixture in bowl. Moisten all with French dressing, tossing lightly with salad fork until vegetables are coated, but not soaked, with the dressing. Serve immediately.

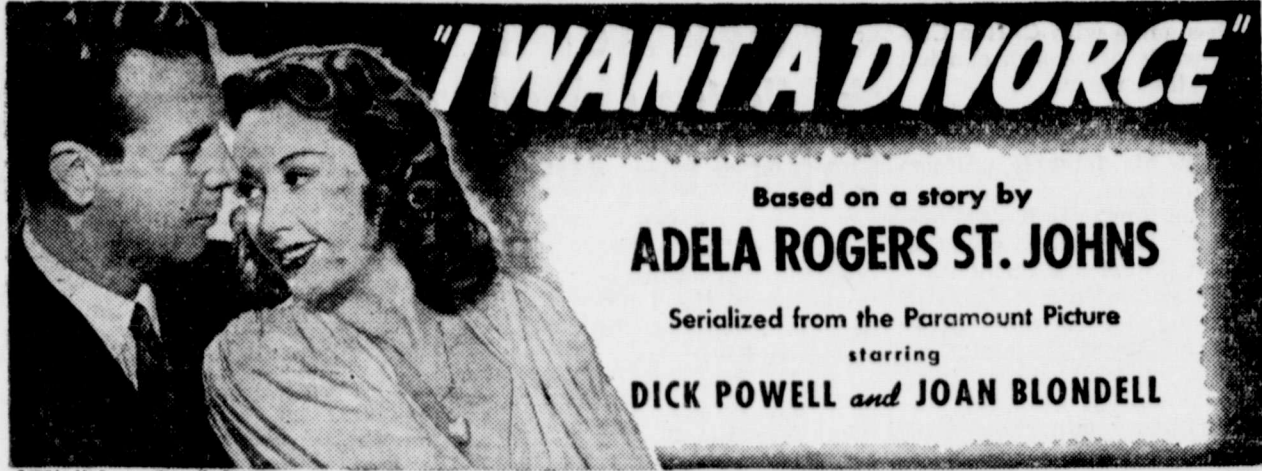

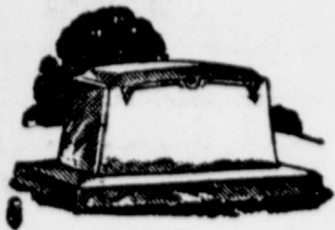

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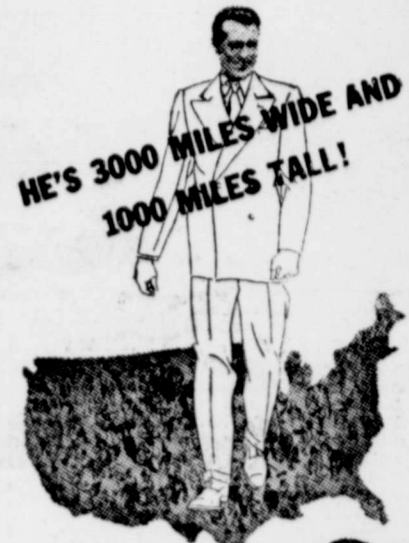
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
