

#### OPERATING THE CLUTCH

Learning to operate the clutch without jerking or jumping the car is not easy. But remember, only skilled drivers are smooth drivers. They understand the clutch and use it

correctly.

Try this procedure in your driveway or on an untraveled street:

Drive the car at crawl speed. In low gear and with the engine turning over slowly, you can control the speed of the moving car with your left foot on the clutch pedal. Find the spot in clutch movement where the car crawls at one mile an hour. Clutch movement at this stage will be very slight. The important thing is learning to locate the spot where the clutch goes out. This point controls movement of the car. Practice the maneuver described above. It sip you to mester the clutch.


