### J. N. COWAN DIES OF INJURIES RECEIVED IN CAMP BLAST

J. N. Cowan, age 62, of Gatesville was burned fatally in an explosion at an Eastland tourist court early Wednesday and died in a hospital at Ranger shortly before noon the same day. He told officers before he died that the explosion, which blew out one side of a tourist cabin, occurred as he struck a match to light a stove.

Mr. Cowan was an evangelist who for the last 11 years, had conducted a Bible forum program over radio station KFPL at Dublin. A former resident of Robstown, Mr. Cowan moved to Gatesville recently. His survivors are his widow, of Gatesville; four daughters, three sons, and two brothers, Will Cowan of Gatesville and Paul Cowan of Corpus Christi.

#### ENVOY'S VISIT LAST STRAW

Tokyo, Nov. 6 (UP)—Saburo Kurusu, Jap diplomat, was flying to Washington today for a final desperate effort to adjust Japan's relations with the United States and thus avert what newspapers described as a possible Japanese-American clash in the Pacific Ocean.

#### JAP SURPRISES WASH., D.C.

Washington, Nov. 5 (AP)—Administration leaders have decided to hold Congress in session indefinitely because of the crisis in Japanese-American relations.

#### MAYBE THEY'LL DO IT?

Washington, Nov. 5 (UP)—President Roosevelt Wednesday called on his Congressional leaders for quick approval of Senate legislation virtually scrapping the Neutrality Act, which isolationists charged would send American sail-

ors to watery graves, pilots of violent deaths and soldiers "into blood baths of Europe, Africa and Asia." It should have been done last week.

#### NAZIS ON BLACK SEA

(By The Associated Press) The Germans claimed Wednesday night that their central offensive in the Crimea had broken thru to the Black Sea over the 5,000 foot-high Yaila Mountains somewhere between Kerch and Sevastopol, but there was no evidence of progress of consequence for their drives directly upon these major ports.

A strong improvement in the Russian position about Moscow was plainly suggested by both German silence as to that theatre and by a Soviet declaration that the Nazis had been halted everywhere along the central front and were

urgently digging in, even emplacement tanks as stationary pill-boxes, in an effort to hold what gains they had made.

#### 19 DIE ENROUTE ENGLAND

Washington, Nov. 5 (UP)—The British Press Service announced Wednesday that nineteen Americans, on the way to Britain for service in the Civilian Technical Corps of the RAF, are missing from a ship which is presumed to have been sunk in the Atlantic.

#### U-BOATS NEAR CANADA

Toronto, Canada, Nov. 5, (AP)—German submarines are operating within sight of the Newfoundland coast, Navy Minister Angus Macdonald declared, two having been attacked and one possibly sunk last month by a Canadian corvette and a coastal common plane in the Belle Isle Channel.

Actual construction of the long awaited County-City WPA Hospital begins today.

Recently, a WPA work order had been received by notification from the state office at San Antonio, and the culmination of two or more years work is being realized by citizens of Coryell county.

Construction of the building, as well as preparation for the construction takes two WPA contracts or orders and work on both will start today.

Assistant Superintendent Burney Warren for the WPA will be in charge of the construction and yesterday, workers were being signed and certified for jobs on the new project.

First thing that will be done will be the demolition of present buildings, and cleaning off the lots on North Lutterloh for the actual erection of the building.

The outlay on the hospital will be \$20,294 in WPA funds and \$29,190 in county funds for the building, and \$2,650 and \$1,915 for the county in "ground" works, walks, curbs, and other improvements.
