The '42 program is different from any previous year, and growers need to attend these important meetings.

FINNS SAY "NO"

Washington Nov. 12 (AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull indicated to his press conference Wednesday that he believed Finland, in turning down the United States' suggestion it consider a Soviet-Finnish peace, was evading the real issue. Try the National Defense Mediation Board, with this "strike".

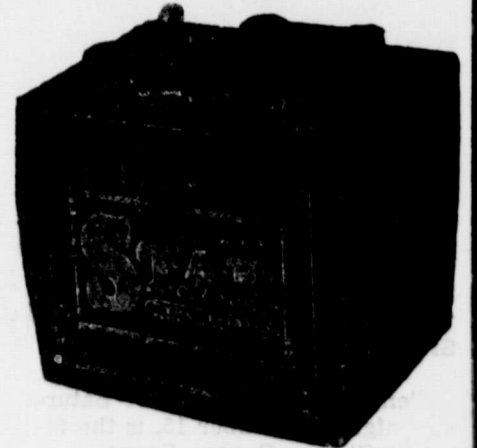

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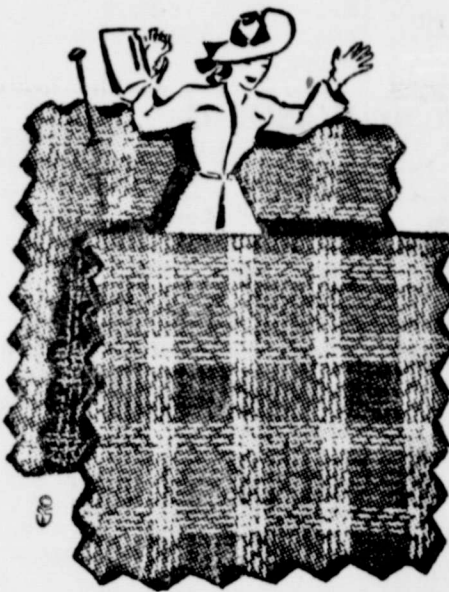
