FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN

Here in Washington we have just celebrated Thanksgiving. I can not but feel that our own State has followed the proper course in setting aside the last Thursday in November rather than the earlier date. In the future there will be no question as to the date of Thanksgiving. The Congress has passed a specific law fixing the date on the last Thursday in November beginning next year. At the same time I think that we are certainly justified in setting aside two or even more days to give special thanks for the blessings God has seen fit to accord our great land. I realize that we are all prone to find fault with the way things are going. That is an American custom, and I am

thankful that we have the right to find fault and to express our dis-satisfaction. There are very few spots on this globe today where men are free—free to think to speak and worship as their conscience dictates.

I think we are too prone in our thanks giving to over look or underestimate the transcending value of these freedoms. Most of us are so preoccupied with our daily tasks of earning a living for ourselves and our loved ones that we become immersed in our material problems and are prone to forget the spiritual values without which men deteriorate to the level of mere beasts of burden. We are likely, in our desire to assure our families of freedom from material want, to forget the age-old Biblical injunction that man cannot live by bread alone. We are likely to make our Thanksgiving merely a day of thanks for abundant food and good living. Certainly we Americans have causes to be thankful for the adequate food, the comfortable homes, and the warm clothes we enjoy. Hundreds of millions of human beings in Europe and Asia are denied even the most basic physical needs.

But our grounds for Thanksgiving go much deeper. No American Thanksgiving would be worthy of the name if it did not bring home to us a deep and prayerful appreciation of the blessing of freedom in a free land—if it did not bring us a fuller recognition of the inspired work of the framers of the American Declaration of Independence and of the Constitution of the United States—those two immortal documents that assure to every American citizen the rights and liberties that are so envied by the less fortunate citizens of other lands.

And surely, no American, no matter how bleak his personal prospects at the moment, could let Thanksgiving Day pass without breathing a prayer of gratitude that our great free land is not involved in the destruction of human life that is going on all about us. I hope that some Americans also saw fit to add a prayer for Divine guidance for those representatives of the people who must daily make the decision that are so charged with good and evil for our people and for the people all over this world for generations yet to come.

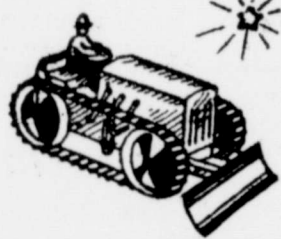

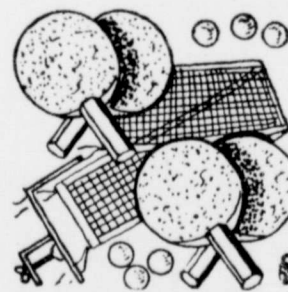

**AXIS SIGNS AGAINST REDS**

Berlin, Nov. 25 (AP)—The German-fathered anti-Comintern pact,

getting a five year renewal and seven new Axis-satellite adherents, was hailed ceremoniously Tuesday as a demonstration of continental solidarity against Moscow, London and Washington.

The new members are Bulgaria, Denmark, Finland, Croatia, Rumania, Slovakia and Nanking-China. The old ones are Germany, Japan, Italy, Spain, Hungary and Manchukuo.

**6,000,000 NAZIS LOST**

London, Nov. 25 (UP)—The Moscow radio said tonight that "actual losses based on indisputable figures" in the eastern campaign were nearly 6,000,000 Germans and 2,122,000 Russian troops.
