Five Die and Three Hurt in Head-On Auto Crash

Four persons are dead and four are in hospitals as the result of a head-on auto collision nine miles northeast of Brownwood on U.S. Highway 67 early Friday morning. Among the dead are Mrs. W. C. Magness, 60, of Comanche, mother of Mrs. H. A. Sullivan of Gatesville, and Corporal Richard G. Woolverton, 22, of Stephenville, who was a member of Company D, 142nd Infantry, Camp Bowie, and cousin of Mesdames Raymond Ward and Fred Chamlee of Gatesville.

Seriously injured is Miss Treva Magness, 25, of Comanche, civilian employee at Camp Bowie and a sister of Mrs. Sullivan. There were two others who died and three others who were injured.

The accident occurred when the car in which the four soldiers, returning from Stephenville, passed a large motor van and then hit the car in which the four civilians were going toward Comanche.

Funeral services for Mrs. Magness were held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock in Comanche. Three sons and three daughters survive.

Woolverton's body was sent to Stephenville for burial. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse C. Woolverton of Stephenville, and was a graduate of John Tarleton College.

Miss Magness died late Saturday, and funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in Comanche.

NAZIS THREATENED, LIBYA

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 30. (AP)—The most confident British communique in the 13 day old battle of Libya declared Sunday that imperial forces had thrust to the Gulf of Sirte beyond Bengasi, slicing across the Axis supply line far west of the main desert battlefield, while already trapped German and Italian divisions were being mopped up inside a vast double encirclement.

New York, Nov. 30 (AP)—Marshal Petain left Vichy Sunday for Orleans, in occupied France to meet Adolf Hitler, it was reported by sources in close touch with the Vichy government.

Moscow, Nov. 30. (AP)—Counter offensive smashes were reported Sunday night to have blunted the claws of Germany's fiercest offensive on the Russian capital—both the frontal assault from Mos-

cow's northwest and the encirclement drive on the southeast.

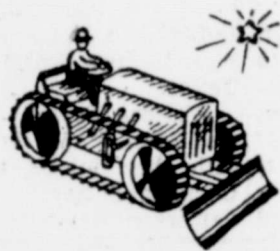

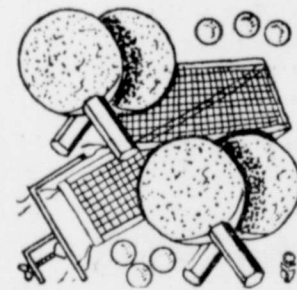

"I'll need it," was his grim reply.

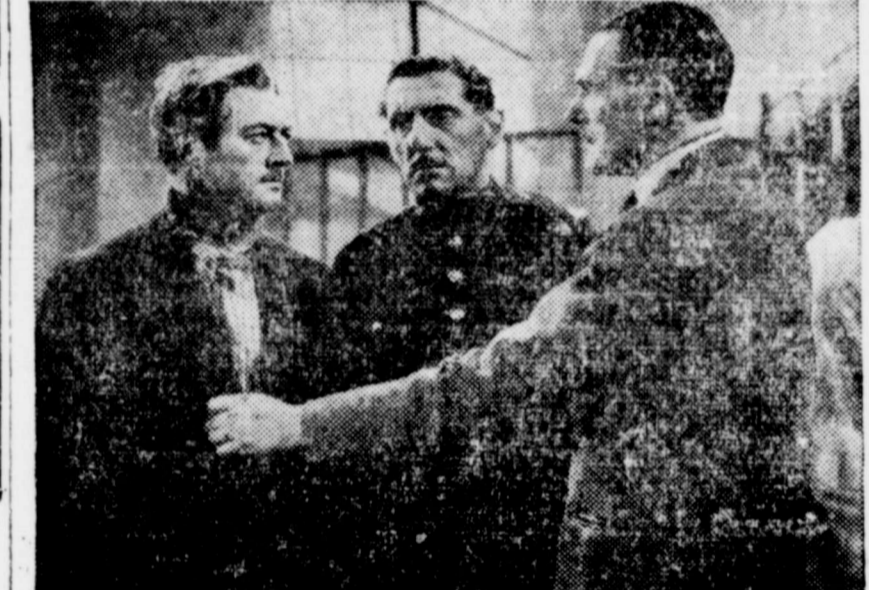

HORNETS SHOW "SCRAP" TO NET TIE: CROWD SMALLEST IN YEARS

Half of the stands at McGregor's Wood Field were vacant, when Gatesville High School Hornets tangled with the McGregor High School Bulldogs Thanksgiving Day, and the Hornets came off with an earned 6-6 tie, both teams playing on just about an equal basis thruout the contest.

Capt. White, Caruth, Fry and Wilkinson stood out for the Hornets, tho we could keep going on and name the boys from end to end, including Brown, Davis, J. Fry, Cross, Gholke, Roberts, Wittie, Post and Perkins who played with an injured shoulder.

McGregor's luminaries were equally as numerous, but naturally, looking thru Gatesville eyes, they were not as conspicuous, but included Naler, Roe, Cousins, and that boy Poss, Spencer, Arbuckle, and big Guinn. Johnson, substituted and Jenkins performed nicely.

Well, here's how it happened: Hornets kicked, ball going over goal, and was brought back to 20. Two line plays only made 2 yards. Cousins at LE fails. Poss punts from 20 to Fry on 40 and he returned to 52. Post for J. Fry. J. Fry makes 2. Fry drops 6 as line leaks, and he fails to get started. Fry punts from 45 to Roe on 20 who is downed in tracks. Poss takes on long LE run for 15 and 1st D. stopped by Wilkinson. Spencer hits C for 3. Poss gets off on long RE run and is knocked out of bounds by Gholke, but makes 1st D. Poss makes 1 at LT Spencer makes 1-2 at C. Caruth drops Spencer for 8 yd. loss on LE run. Poss punts from 40 to 20 to Fry, who returned to 30.

Cousins leaks thru and stops Hornets for 1. Jenkins stops Hornets, no gain. Hornets drop 5, using hands on offense. Roberts out, Gholke in. Fry quick-kicks from 25 to 15, returned by Cousins to 20. Fry for Gholke. Cousins hits tackle for 4. Pass, Cousins to Poss, incomplete. Wilkinson off, Roberts in. Poss punts from 30 to 25. Fry fumbles, but recovers. Post makes 1. Davis makes 4 on reverse, as quarter ends, MHS 0, GHS 0.

Second Quarter

J. Fry for Post. Fry punts from 25 to 35. Wilkinson for Roberts. Spence attempts to pass, and loses 15, when stopped by Capt. White. Poss fakes punt, hands to Naler, who makes 6. Roe for Naler. Poss punts from 20 to Fry on 35, re-

turns to 45. Fry passes over C to Wilkinson, incomplete. Fry to Gholke, slips thru hands, incomplete. Roberts for Gholke. Fry punts from 40 to Spence on 20, who is dropped in tracks. White stops Spencer for 10 yard loss, as he attempted to pass. Lengefeld for Morgan. Poss punts from back of goal to Fry on 45, returns to 35. Fry climbs over Hornets right side for 3. Perkins for J. Fry. Perkins on sweep, carries to McGregor's 10 and 1st D. Perkins makes 1. Backfield in motion and Hornets lose 5. Johnson for Poe. Haynes for Mize. Johnson stops Perkins for 6 as Hornet RE don't get him. Perkins stopped for none, and then Fry passes over, and ball goes over on 16. Mize for Haynes. Braziel for Perkins.

On spread, Spencer makes 2. Johnson takes on RE run for 10 and 1st D. Davis off, Morgan in. Caruth stops next play for no gain. Caruth and Morgan stop Johnson for 2. McGregor fumbles, and J. Fry recovers on 35.

Wittie for Wilkinson. Post for J. Fry. Fry to Wittie over C makes 10 and 1st D. Fry passes wide, incomplete. Davis for Braziel. Fry passes to Roberts, Jenkins intercepts on 12. Poss makes a foot. Poss quickkicks to Fry on 50 as half ends.

Third Quarter

Hornets kick, ball goes to Cousins on 20, fumbles, and returns to 33, recovered by Cross (?) for Hornets.

Fry fumbles, but Hornets recover and make 5. Fry, attempting to pass is stopped by Cousins for 8 yd. loss. Fry faking punt, passes, incomplete, and ball goes over.

Poss gets loose down side line, and carries to 10. Hornets penalized, but Bulldogs take gain instead of penalty. Poss stopped by Gholke, Naler carries over LE for touchdown. Wilkinson out, Roberts in. Poss fails to convert at C. Lengefeld for Gholke. MHS 6, GHS 0.

Hornets receive, ball to Roberts on 30, returns to 40. Perkins for J. Fry, Johnson and Haynes in, Roe and Cousins out. Perkins makes 6 around end. Both sides off-side. Fry fakes kick, passes, incomplete, and repeats. Fry kicks from 45 to Spencer on 20, returns to 32. Poss rams line for 2, stopped by Caruth. Gilmore also stops him on his side. Poss kicks to Fry on 35, returns to 45.

On spread, Perkins carries and makes 4. Spread again, Fry passes to Wilkinson for 12 and 1st D. Spread, Statue of Liberty Play, makes 3. Post and J. Fry for Da-

vis and Perkins. Wittie for Roberts. Spread, Fry carries from 40 to 20 on long RE run. J. Fry picks up 9. Johnson for Guinn. Perkins for Post. Wilkinson gets Fry's pass on the 4 yard line as the quarter ends.

Fourth Quarter

Fry takes to 1 yard line. Fry goes to 6 inch line, and then goes over for touchdown, MHS 6, GHS 6. White fails to make place-kick.

Hornets kick. Edwards for Gilmore; Morgan for Cross. Ball goes to Cousins on 20, returned to 35, and both off side, and they kick over.

White kicks, ball to Cousins, fumbles and Jenkins takes from 20 to 30. Pass carries ball from there to 35 before stopped by Roberts and another Hornet. Lee for Brown. Cross for Morgan. Naler fails at line. Caruth stops McGregor for 2. White stops Guinn on LE run after he makes 1st D. Ball on 20. Naler makes 1 at C. Caruth stops Poss over LT for 2. Pass makes 1 more over RG. Gilmore for Edwards. Brown for Lee. Poss fails, trying to make 1st D.

Fry makes 3 at LT. Spread and Roberts makes 4 at LT. Fry loses 5 attempting run. Fry punts from 5 to Naler on 50, returned to 38.

Spread, Poss makes 1st D. Morgan and Braziel on long end run stop Spencer for none. Braziel bats long pass intended for Roe. Braziel out, Gholke in. Cousins passes long to Arbuckle who lets it drop on goal line. 4th down spread, Poss carries, but both off side. 2 minutes to go. Pass, Post catches on 7 yard line.

Fry punts from back of goal to 30. Stopped by Roberts and Gholke 18 seconds to play. MHS ball on 21. Spencer passes incomplete when J. Fry knocks it down. Lee for Brown. Pass, fumbled by Gholke and caught by Arbuckle on 1 yard line, or closer, as game ends. MHS 6 — GHS 6
