## U. S. DECLARES WAR ON JAPS: 3,000 DEAD OR HURT: PRESIDENT SIGNS "WAR RESOLUTION: AT 3:15 P. M. MONDAY

A radio flash at 3:15, announced that President Roosevelt had signed the "War Resolution" made by both the Senate and House of Representatives, and at that time (the signing) the United States and Japan were officially at war.

Japan began a "treacherous and unprovoked" war on the United States Sunday with simultaneous naval and air attacks on Hawaii, Guam and the Philippines, pushing the U.S.A. to the verge of the formal entry into World War II, which was declared Monday, as above stated.

Officially announced loss of two warships and 3,000 persons dead and wounded in Japan's raid on Hawaii was fresh in the minds of the legislators.

The President said that yesterday was "a date which will live in infamy". "As commander-in-chief of the army, I have directed that all measures be taken for our defense

### PRESIDENT'S WAR MESSAGE

Here's the text of the President's war message:

"To the Congress of the United States:

Yesterday, December 7, 1941—a date which will live in infamy—the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan.

The United States was at peace with that nation, and at the solicitation of Japan, was still in conversation with its government and its emperor looking toward the maintenance of peace in the Pacific.

Indeed, one hour after Japanese air squadrons had commenced bombing in Oahu, the Japanese ambassador to the United States and his colleague delivered to the secretary of state a formal reply to a recent American message. While this reply stated that it seemed useless to continue the existing diplomatic negotiations, it contained no threat or hint of war or armed attack.

It will be recorded that the distance of Hawaii from Japan makes it obvious that the attack was deliberately planned many days or even weeks ago. During that intervening time, the Japanese government has deliberately sought to deceive the United States by false statements and expressions of hope for continued peace.

The attack yesterday on the Hawaiian islands has caused severe damage to American naval and military forces. Very many American lives have been lost. In addition, American ships have been reported torpedoed on the high seas between San Francisco and Honolulu.

Yesterday the Japanese government also launched an attack against Malaya.

Last night Japanese forces attacked Hongkong.

Last night Japanese forces attacked Guam.

Last night Japanese forces attacked the Philippine Islands.

Last night the Japanese attacked Wake Island.

This morning the Japanese attacked Midway Island.

Japan has, therefore, undertaken a surprise offensive extending throughout the Pacific area. The facts of yesterday speak for themselves. The people of the United States have already formed their

opinions and well understand the implications to the very life and safety of our nation.

As commander-in-chief of the army and navy, I have directed that all measures be taken for our defense.

Always we will remember the character of the onslaught against us.

No matter how long it may take us to overcome this premeditated invasion, the American people in their righteous might will win thru to absolute victory.

I believe I interpret the will of the Congress, and of the people when I assert that we will not only defend ourselves to the uttermost but will make very certain that this form of treachery shall never endanger us again.

With confidence in our armed forces—with the unbounding determination of our people—we will gain the inevitable triumph—so help us God.

I ask that the congress declare that since the unprovoked and dastardly attack by Japan on Sunday, December 7, a state of war has existed between the United States and the Japanese empire."

### DAMAGE IN PEARL HARBOR

In Pearl Harbor (Hawaii) one old battleship has capsized and several other ships have been seriously damaged. One destroyer was blown up; army and navy air fields were bombed with the resulting destruction of several hangars and a large number of planes.

### OTHERS DECLARE WAR

Besides the United States, the following countries of the world

have declared war, and more are coming in momentarily: Great Britain, Costa Rica, Netherlands East Indies, Canada, Nicaragua, British Borneo and others.

### THAILAND CAPITULATES

Thailand capitulated, after 300 Japanese troops had landed at Sabak, a short distance from that country's border.

Two U.S. battleships, the Oklahoma and the Pennsylvania were sunk at Pearl Harbor, and the rest of the fleet steamed out to chase the supposed aircraft carriers which brought the Jap dive bombers near enough for the attack.

According to the Japs, 50 or 60 U.S. planes have been shot down in air combats over Clark field, in the Philippines, and another 40 over Iba, 80 miles north of Manila.

Paratroops, Japs, were beaten off in a Philippine province, and troop ships attempting landings in Malaya were driven off by direct hits by U.S. Hudson bombers.

Other U.S. ships reported unofficially to have been sunk were the U.S. aircraft carrier Langley and the destroyer U.S.S. Preston.

It is not known locally how many Coryell county boys are in this area, but one relative is known to be there, a brother of Harry Jones of Gatesville was on the U.S.S. Oklahoma.

### ISLANDS TAKEN, OR ATTACKED

Guam, Wake and the Midway Islands have been attacked, but details are lacking. Two hundred marines, all that remained in China—have been interned by the Japanese near Tientsin.

Of the 3,000 casualties, half of them are believed to be dead.
