I shall mail this tomorrow, and if you like I will write again and let you know my observations because Mayor La Guardia will be here and I'm going to enlist to do my share-The way I feel, and everyone else I've talked with would like to be in Germany where this all originated.

We have had the only free country and this had to happen. We'll all "finish" it this time.
