## "YOUR AND MY INCOME TAX"

Who must file a return? Every single person having a gross income of \$750 or more; every married person, not living with husband or wife, and having a gross income of \$750 or more; and married persons living with husband or wife, who have an aggregate gross income of \$1,500 or more.

When must returns be filed? For the calendar year 1941, on or before March 16, 1942. For the fiscal year, on or before the 15th day of the third month following the close of the fiscal year.

Where and with whom must income tax returns be filed? In the internal revenue district in which the person lives or has his chief place of business, and with the collector of internal revenue.

How does one make out his income tax return? By following the detailed instructions given on the income tax blanks, Form 1040 and Form 1040A (optional simplified form).

What is the Tax rate? A normal tax of 4 per cent on the amount of the net income in excess of the allowable credits against net income (personal exemption, credits for dependents, interest on obligations of the United States and its instrumentalities and earned income credit in the computation of the normal tax net income; and a graduated surtax on the amount of net income in excess of the allowable credits (personal exemption and credit for dependents) against net income in the computation of the surtax net income.

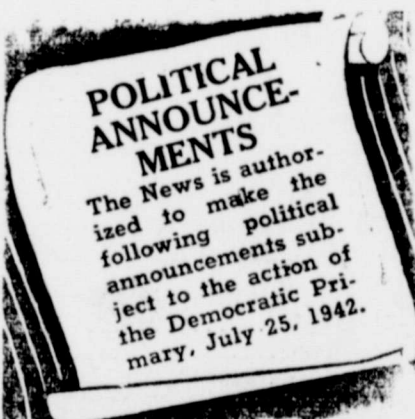
## WITH THE COLORS

A SUMMARY OF WORLD, NATIONAL AND STATE NEWS

### 56 BILLIONS

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—President Roosevelt asked an eagerly willing congress today to provide a \$56,000,000,000 war chest for the 12 months beginning next July with a \$9,000,000,000 increase in taxes that unquestionably will alter American ways of living for the duration. That's some chest!

### NAZIS IN DUTCH IN CRIMEA

London, Jan. 7, (AP)—The Russians were threatening the entire surviving German army of the Crimea on Wednesday night and were smashing forward in every other vital area along a vast battle line extending to the far northern Finnish front.

In the Crimea, the Soviet garrison of the Black Sea naval base of Sevastopol, formerly a city of German siege, had been converted into a central offensive body which in cooperation with Soviet forces landed north and south of the city, was moving toward envelopment of the Nazis.

### JAPS BLAST FILIPINOS

Washington, Jan. 7 (UP)—Japanese airmen have been raining death and destruction on defenseless towns during the month-long invasion of the main Philippine Island of Luzon, the War Department was advised Wednesday by Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Four towns have been destroyed, and many natives have been killed by airmen who swooped low over the helpless villages and machine gunned the people.

### COMMANDOS HIT NORWAY

London, Jan. 7 (AP)—A team of

British ships and planes raided Hellefjord on the Norwegian west coast between Bergen and Trondheim Tuesday, while British bombers pounded at targets in Germany, occupied France and the Netherlands coast.

### JAPS BOMB AUSTRALISLAND

Canberra, Australia, Jan. 7 (AP)—Long-range Japanese flying boats struck twice at the Royal Australian Air Force field at Rabaul Tuesday night and Wednesday, following up the feeler attacks made recently upon that South Seas outpost in the Bismark Archipelago.

### NOTED JAP ARMY AT SINGAPORE

Singapore, Jan. 7 (AP)—British forces Wednesday night were stubbornly contesting a renewed Japanese onslaught along a semi-circular west Malayan front which was spearheaded by the famous Japanese Fifth Division, veteran shock forces of a dozen campaigns in China.

### NAZI SKI ACES NABBED

Washington, Jan. 7 (UP)—The FBI tonight confirmed reports that 3 German ski experts, including a former Olympic champion, are being held as enemy aliens at Salt Lake City, Utah.

### NO STOP ON PLUGS, BATTERIES

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—Director Leon Henderson of the OPM civilian supply division said today his office did not intend to stop sale of batteries or spark plugs

for automobiles and trucks, despite a "flood of groundless rumors."

### 62 OIL FIELDS FOR WAR

Austin, Jan. 7 (AP)—The railroad commission today classified 62 Texas oil fields as those producing aviation grade petroleum suitable for the military use and ordered that no production be processed by refineries unless the maximum reasonable quantity of aviation grade naphtha is obtained.

### EIRE SAYS, "NO BASES"

London, Jan. 7 (UP)—Any attempt to obtain bases in Eire for an AEF, either by negotiation or force, will be resisted strongly because government officials believe that if such bases were permitted Dublin would be "flattened by German bombers within two hours," reports from reliable sources in Dublin said today.

### SPAIN-VICHY "PEPPED UP"

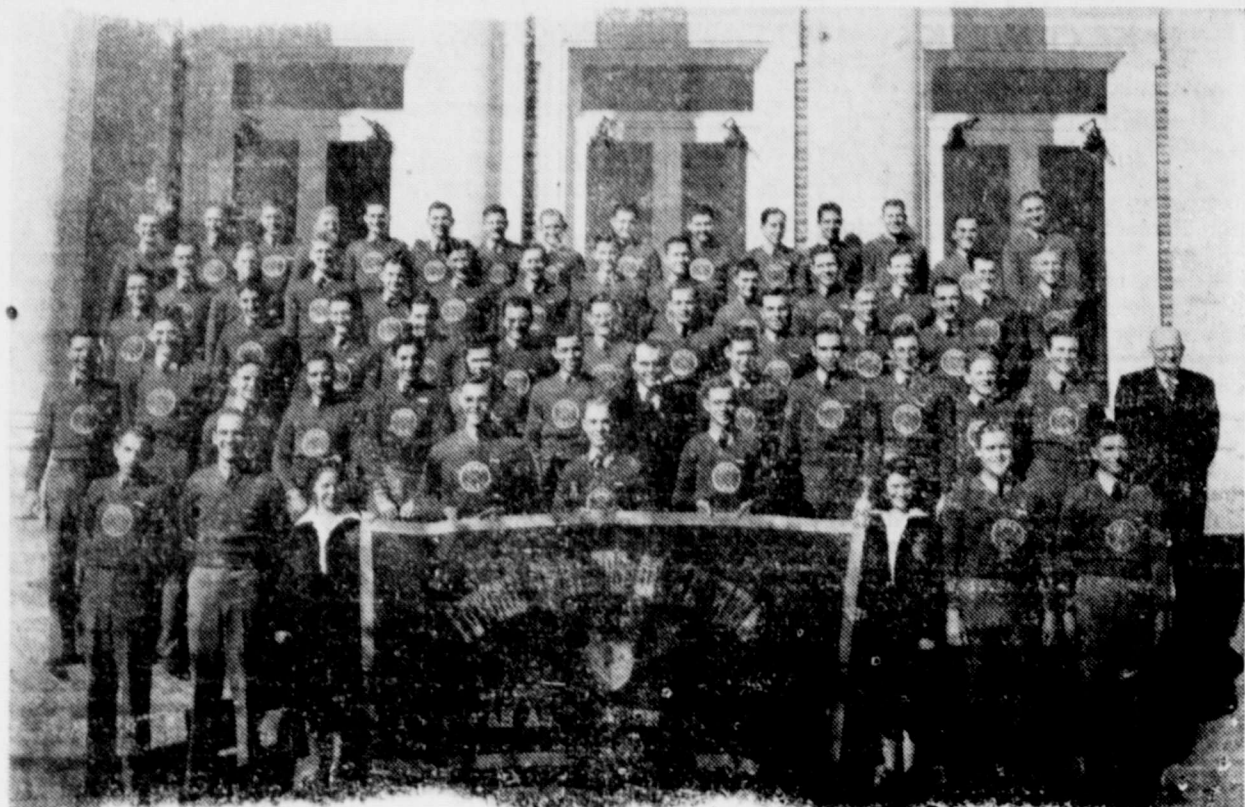
Washington, Jan. 7 (UP)—U.S. entry into the war has stiffened Spanish and Vichy French resistance to closer collaboration with the axis, the senate foreign relations committee were told today, coincident with moves to strengthen this nation's hand in Turkey and Russia.

### SLASH IN AGRICULTURE

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—President Roosevelt's proposal to slash about a third of a billion dollars from federal outlays for farmers won tentative acceptance today from farm-minded members of congress.

THOMPSON, W. M.

Funeral services for W. M.

Thomson, who died at his home near Gatesville Thursday, January 1, were conducted at the Baptist Church at Pidcoke Friday at 2:30 p. m. by the Revs. H. L. De-

Vaney of Waco, pastor of the Schley Baptist Church, and B. F. Reynolds of Pearl. Scott's of Gatesville were in charge.

William Marshall Thompson was born at Tompkinsville, Ky. August 1, 1867. His ancestors were of the sturdy pioneer stock, who settled in the Ohio and Cumberland River valleys of Kentucky and Tennessee in the early colonial days.

Mr. Thompson removed from Macon county, Tennessee to Coryell county in 1903, moving to the Sol Basham farm on Cowhouse Creek, known as the Mosley Crossing farm. In 1905 he moved to the Dallas Edmondson farm near Pearl, Texas. There the Thompson family resided until 1914 when they moved to Pidcoke, Texas, near which place Mr. Thompson lived until 1938. He then moved to the Schley community near Gatesville, at which place he resided until his death on January 1, 1942.

In 1907 Mr. Thompson married Miss Lucille Stewart, who preceded him in death in November, 1939. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. C. C. Moore of Tompkinsville, Ky. and Mrs. K. E. Moore of Boles, Ky.; four children, Mrs. Karl Howell of Izora, Montus Thompson of Pidcoke, Milton Thompson of Austin and S. E. Thompson of Gatesville; and nine grandchildren.

Mr. Thompson was converted to Christianity at the age of 16, and had lived a consistent exemplary life up to his decease. He was quiet and kind in his disposition and was very patient under the most trying circumstances. He was always interested in the progress of his community and could always be counted on to do his part in any movement that meant the betterment of his community and home.—Contributed.

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

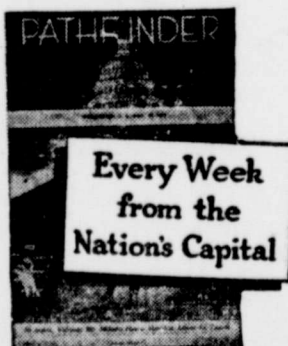
