## What We Read In The Papers About The Army Camp

Major Gerald R. Tyler, who has been appointed area engineer in charge of the construction of the Killeen cantonment project, arrived in Temple Tuesday to assume his duties.

Major Tyler will have headquarters temporarily at Belton with Captain William J. Gray, the resident army engineer in charge of plans for the camp, at the offices which have been maintained there for several months.

### COMPETITIVE BIDS

The new area engineer has been assigned to the district engineer's office at Fort Sam Houston. The work will be under the supervision of the district office and Major Tyler said he had yet to report there.

The camp contract will be let under competitive bid. The project will be open for bids for at least a month after final construction order has been received from Washington. After this order is received, construction should start within five weeks, the major estimates.

Major Tyler, before he left civilian life was assistant to the chief engineer on the construction of the \$70,000,000 Pennsylvania turnpike, a 166-mile highway with seven and a half miles of tunnels built thru the heart of Pennsylvania.

Major Thomas G. Shaffer, advance representative of Col. A. D. Bruce, commandant of the tank destroyer center has set up temporary offices in the First National Bank building in Temple.

## Turnersville Boy Receives "Citation" Exceptional Bravery

Pvt. Leonard A. Daniels, nicknamed "Jiggs", son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Daniels of Turnersville, has received the following "Commendation" from the Headquarters of the Hawaiian Interceptor Command, under Brigadier General H. C. Davidson of the Air Corps.

The Citation reads:  
Headquarters Hawaiian Interceptor Command

24 December 1941  
Subject: Commendation.  
To: Pvt. Leonard A. Daniels:

1. On or about 8:00 a. m., 7 December 1941, you were compelled to submit to a surprise attack by an unscrupulous enemy in the form of an air raid. He struck with a suddenness that left no time to combat with the weapons on hand.

2. For the splendid attitude and exceptional bravery you exhibited under bombing and machine gunning, it is, I assure you, a pleasure and an honor to commend your heroic and courageous action under fire.

3. Japan declared war by killing and maiming many of our comrades in arms. There is only ONE ANSWER, and that is to PREPARE with ALL YOUR CAPABILITIES for the time when we can meet them on common ground. You know, and I know, that it is not a question of winning. The better we are prepared, the shorter time for our return to normalcy and the life as real Americans.

4. We will win, but REMEMBER WHEELER FIELD, and the spirit of that date will carry us on to victory.

## Red Cross First Aid Instructors' Course Going On

Curtis Lipsey, associated with the State Highway Department, is teaching a twenty-hour Red Cross First Aid Course to a group composed of representatives from various sections of Coryell County. This class meets Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evening from 7 until 10 o'clock in the county courtroom of the Court House at Gatesville, and is in cooperation with Dr. H. M. Haynes, chairman of Civilian Defense, as it relates to medical activities.

This basic course is required before persons are qualified to continue with the advanced course which culminate in being a Red Cross First Aid instructor. The goal set by the National Red Cross organization for Coryell county in First Aid is to train 1000 persons. To reach this quota, it will be essential to have these additional instructors teach community classes of men and women.

## FARM HOME OF MISS KATE CHAMBLISS IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Fire, Fire, Fire, Fire, Fire, Fire, Fire, Fire, Fire!

That's the number of fire calls this past week, and just a little more. There were 2 Thursday, 1 Friday, 2 Monday, 1 Tuesday a. m., 1 Tuesday p. m., and there may have been more. We just lost count.

Now, there was one serious one. The farm home of Miss Kate Chambliss was destroyed. This house was 3 miles west of Gatesville, and was supposed to have started from the flue. Tuesday morning about 10 o'clock. The contents and house, were a complete loss. The house belonging to J. O. Brown was insured, but Miss Chambliss had no insurance on her belongings and household equipment.

Now, a little figuring: 9 fire-calls, 20 men in the department; fire, 2 hours. We'll just say, that each of them get 30c and hour, and average fire, going, putting out, and putting up, is 2 hours, that would be in lost time, \$108.00 loss. This does not include equipment, wear and tear, tires, water, or any other costs. Most of these fires were "grassers", and our statistician has advised that these 9 fires caused a Grand Total Loss of close to \$500.00. Of course, this is "preventive," but a little "home prevention" would do a lot to offset this.

### U-BOATS GET 2 MORE

Hoboken, N. J. Jan. 21 (UP)—A German sub which blasted a torpedo into the American freighter City of Atlanta before dawn off Cape Hatteras Monday, rose to the surface and played a searchlight on the helpless sailors struggling for their lives.

Also, a submarine sunk a Latvian vessel, the Ciltvaira near the cape early Monday.

### "NIPS" SAY LOSS 15

Tokyo, Jan. 22. (Domei Broadcast caught by UP)—Admiral Shigetaro Shimada, navy minister, reported to the imperial diet today the Japanese navy since the outbreak of the Pacific war has sunk 62 enemy warships, including 7 battlewagons, and has heavily damaged 14 other enemy fighting craft.

Nip losses have been listed as only 15, none of them larger than a transport or a destroyer, sunk. Hope it's baloney.

### SOLIDARITY IN S. A.

Rio De Janeiro, Jan. 21 (AP)—Argentine and Chile swung into line with the other 19 American republics tonight in a declaration

of intention to sever diplomatic relations with the Axis.

### CONNALLY POPS OFF

Washington, Jan. 21 (AP)—The state department hastened to emphasize tonight that Senator Connally, democrat, Texas was not talking for the executive branch of the government when he expressed hope Argentina would change her president unless the latter changed his mind about breaking off relations with axis powers.

### RAILROADS GET 10%

Washington, Jan. 21 (AP)—The ICC granted today an increase of approximately 10 per cent in railroad passenger fares, except for special rates to military or naval forces on furlough and certain extra fares applying to particular trains.

### NELSON "CLEANS OUT" OPM

Washington, Jan. 21 (AP)—Asserting that "debating societies" were out, Donald M. Nelson, generalissimo of America war production, announced a revised war-industry set-up today with key men given sweeping authority to "get the job done".

### NIPS BACKED UP, BATAAN

Washington, Jan. 21 (AP)—A smashing counter-attack which drove the Japanese with heavy losses out of the positions they had won from General Douglas MacArthur's main force, and daringly successful lunge by Filipino guerrillas against an enemy airport were added today to the saga of the Philippine defense.

### JAPS BLAST AUSSIE ISLES

Melbourne, Australia, Jan. 21 (AP)—Mass Japanese air attacks for the second straight day on allied islands off the Australian mainland—the usual prelude to landing attempts—cause Prime Minister Curtin to warn his countrymen tonight that the peril was "nearer, clearer and dealer than ever."

### SOVIETS NEAR SMOLENSK

Moscow, Jan. 22 (AP)—The exultant red army early today had rolled the remnants of three or more German divisions 7 miles beyond recaptured Mzhaisk, and are now headed toward Smolensk, 160 miles ahead. That is "30" for the widely Nazi heralded "Battle of Moscow". Temperature is 40 below.

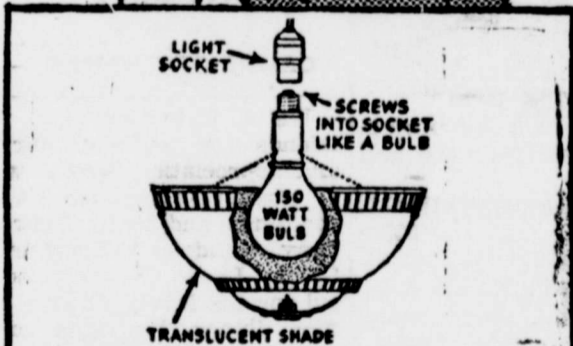

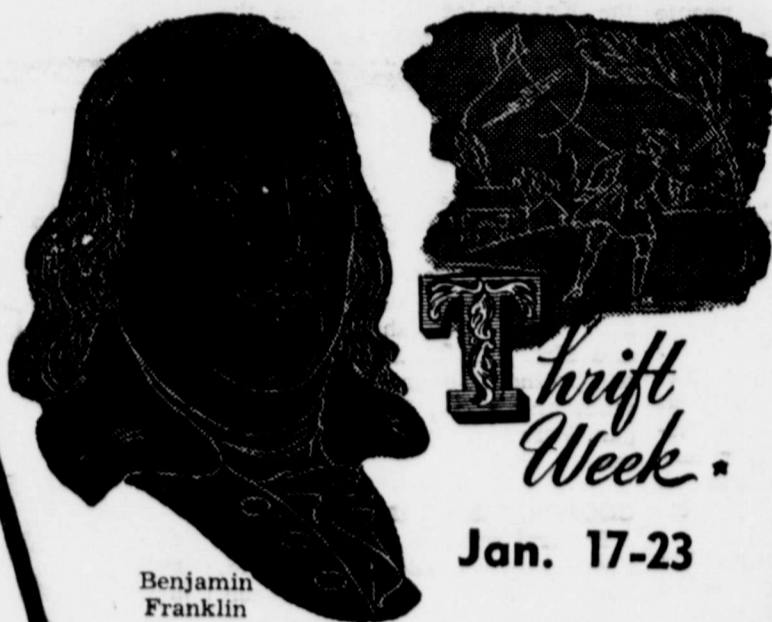

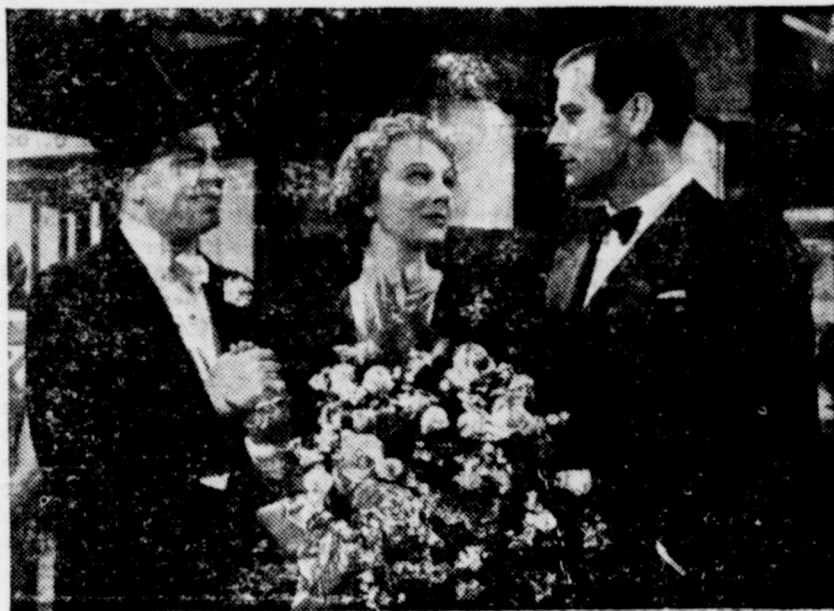

## COUNTY-WIDE GARDEN BEING PLANNED, ALSO WPA CANNING CENTER

Even with tin scarce as they say it is, the WPA Canning Center is going to be in operation again this year, according to WPA School Lunch Supervisor, Ozella V. Hargis, of Gatesville.

Cans will be filled, Miss Hargis advises, and furnished to schools on a prorated basis. Thirty-five number 2 cans per child should be adequate for a school year supply, and one acre of ground will raise enough food for 100 children. Canned fruit, must be donated by school patrons if there is to be any fruit, because the garden doesn't have it.

Some schools have fresh vegetable plots, and they are used in the lunch rooms.

From the Division of Information, Office of Emergency Management, Dallas, the following release is sent out:

### "TIN ORDER TIGHTENED"

Tighter restriction on tin deliveries to small users are contained in a new amendment to the tin priority order, M-43. The amendment cuts from 5 to 3 tons the amount that may be delivered monthly to regular customers with out specific priorities authorization. It provides also that the customers cannot receive more than five tons of tin a month from all suppliers, and requires that he file with his purchase order a certificate of compliance.

## "YOUR AND MY INCOME TAX"

To make it easier for taxpayers to meet the increased taxes required by the National Defense Program, the Treasury Department is offering for sale two series of notes, both dated August 1, 1941, and maturing August 1, 1943.

In January of each year two new series will be provided so that a tax payer can always purchase notes during the entire year in which he is receiving his income for use in payment of taxes due the following year.

All notes are sold at par and accrued interest. When presented in payment of income taxes they will be received at par and accrued interest up to and including the month in which such taxes are paid. Interest will not accrue beyond the maturity of the notes. If not presented in payment of in-

come taxes, they will be redeemed for cash under certain specified conditions at the purchase price paid for the notes. In other words, the taxpayer, if he redeems the notes for cash, gets back just the amount he paid.
