out the County Budget, I would be the one to see to that. I honestly think that each community regardless of where it is or who it is that they should get their portion of road work. I would do my very best to do some road work in every community. I don't think that the money that is paid into the Road and Bridge Funds from Ireland should be applied on the Topsey road. I think Topsey should get its tax money back on their roads, and I don't think Evant's money should be applied on roads at Levita and visa-versa. GEN. A. D. BRUCE, C. J. FITZGERALD EXPLAIN PROBLEMS OF "EVACUEES"

Gen. A. D. Bruce, commanding officer of Coryell's Camp Hood, Wednesday in the city hall auditorium talked to farmers, ranchers and land owners in the Camp Hood camp area from a "military point of view" and C. J. Fitzgerald, project manager in charge of acquisition for the camp area spoke on the "acquisition" angle for the War Department.

Gen. Bruce stated that there had been a general misunderstanding as to the time of the opening of the camp and that part of it must open now. The latest date for people to be ready to move was May 1. Work must be done by the Army in building roads, camps, bridges, moving fences, and this authority is now in some sections, and not later than May 1 to all.

"Broad military requirements, generally speaking the army will need the fences, tanks (earthen) and one dwelling on each farm. Nothing is to be taken unless okehed by proper authorities. Sheep and livestock, at this time are the biggest problem, and a committee is to be appointed by County Judge Floyd Zeigler to work out details regarding these.

Gen. Bruce also said, all plowing should be stopped now. Every person won't have to move at one time.

Regarding local cemeteries, General Bruce said these should be moved, and if not by the families, the moving would be contracted for, and they would be moved to cemeteries which would be kept up, and the moving would be supervised by government officials, if contract was made.

Mr. Fitzgerald said owners and others should come to his office at 716 E. Main for all matters pertaining to the "real estate" end of the evacuation.

He also said, Federal Land Bank appraisers had appraised the land, this appraisal had been reviewed by a Federal Land Bank supervisor and then by a War Department appraiser.

Improvements, he said, up to a certain point HAD been released to the owner, but this has been stopped. In case they are eventually released again, the owner will be given first opportunity to buy them at "salvage" prices. If the owner does not want them, then bids will be advertised for, and

they will be sold to the highest bidder.

He said the War Department had no money for helping farmers and renters to move out of the district.

This is a summary of what came from General Bruce and Mr. Fitzgerald.

N. Foote of the Coryell County War Defense Board, stated that trucks had been secured, and were being secured to help move people out of the section, and that this was being done just as fast as possible, but that there was a limit to what his agency could do, and that they were being taken care of as fast as they could possibly be handled. He also stated, that farms, ranches and other property was listed in the AAA office, which farmers could look over if they were looking for locations.

It was brought out that the army would not need barns, windmills, pens, chicken houses and such improvements, and that they may be removed after options are signed and cleared at Mr. Fitzgerald's office. Under a "take order" granted by the Federal court at Waco, nothing can be moved from the area until an option covering the property is signed. This "take order" property whether it is optioned or not, if it is in the area.

Because of the constant need of water, the army will need every water tank and well, plus all casing within wells in the area, but not the windmills.

Questions as to the exact limits of the camp can be had at Mr. Fitzgerald's office. Mr. Fitzgerald stated: "So far as I know, there is no chance for re-appraisal of any of this land."

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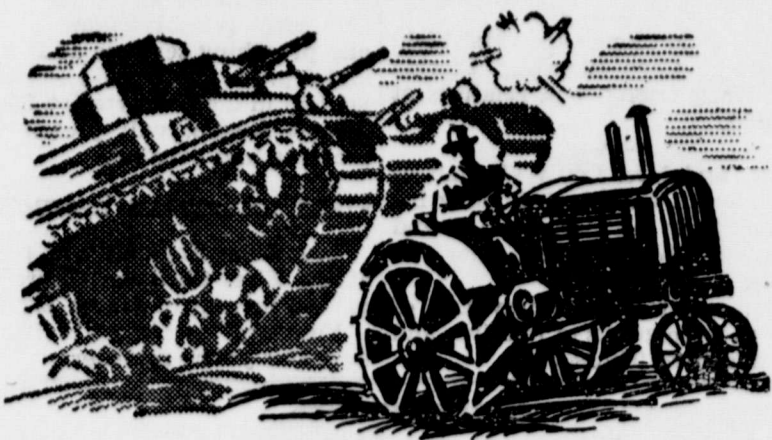

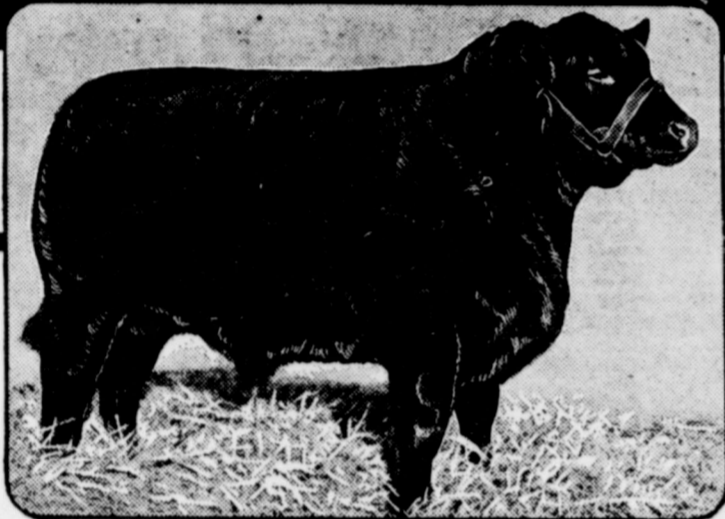

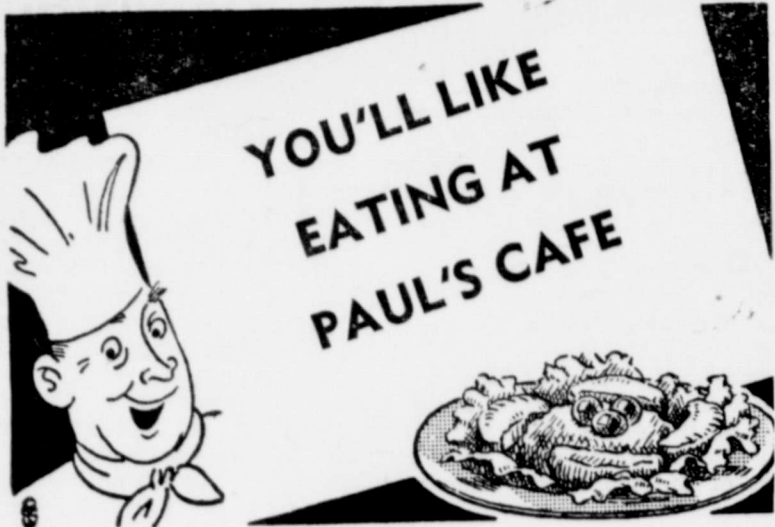

CHILDREN URGED NOT TO FLY KITES NEAR ELECTRIC LINES

With the coming of spring and the kite flying season, Community Public Service Company issues its annual appeal to the children not to fly their kites in the vicinity of electric power lines.

"Kite flying is great sport and lots of fun for the children,"

states C. H. Wallace, power company manager, "but it can turn into tragedy if the kites are allowed to come in contact with the power lines. Every year scores of lives are needlessly lost in the United States, because children used wire for kite strings or came in contact with power lines while trying to recover kites tangled in wires. We solicit the help of parents and school teachers in seeing that children of this community are warned of the danger in order that similar accidents can be prevented here."

To be on the safe side, Mr. Wallace recommends that the following precautions be observed by kite flyers:

Fly kites in open fields as far away as possible from power lines and traffic.

Don't use metallic wire or string. This is extremely dangerous as wire is a conductor of electricity and the string may fall across a power line.

Don't use metal kite sticks or wooden kite frames braced with wire.

Don't fly kites with wet strings or in wet weather. Water is a conductor of electricity.

Don't try to retrieve a kite caught in the wires by climbing poles, poking sticks, or pulling on the tail. You may come in contact with a live wire.

If you see a kite caught in an electric power line, call the office of Community Public Service Company. A trained lineman will remove the kite as soon as it is possible to do so.

SCHOOLBOY KILLED WHEN KITE STRIKES HIGH VOLTAGE LINE

Jerry [redacted] 10-year-old grade student, met instant death by electrocution here late yesterday afternoon, when the wire string of a kite he was flying came in contact with a high voltage power line at the rear of a vacant lot near the [redacted] home on West Fourth Street. An ambulance crew and power company employees, called to the scene immediately after the accident, applied artificial respiration for three hours but were unable to revive the victim, who apparently received the full force of 6,600 volts.

Jerry and several companions had been flying the kite for about 45 minutes when it dived suddenly and allowed the wire string to fall across the 6,600-volt line that passes up the alley between Third and Fourth Streets. There was a flash at the moment of contact and
