#### **Colonel Mayberry** Lions Guest at **Wednesday Meeting**

Colonel H. T. Mayberry, Commander of the Officers Training School which will open in Gatesville May 4, was the guest of the day at the Wednesday meeting of the Gatesville Lions'

Colonel Mayberry, outlined the reason for the Officers Training Schools, saying that these men come here from various tank destroyer battalions from all over th USA, some of which are possibly alfleady slated to go overseas. 


