Gen. Bruce Says "Firing" Starts Between 20th & 1st

And, what General A. D. Bruce means by "firing" is that those "big 'uns" are going to be throwing "steel" and not blanks.

The order is signed by Major George H. Tilson, Major, CE, Range Officer.

Range guards will patrol the area at all focal points to keep people out when the firing begins.

The firing will open in the area occupied by the 893rd Tank Destroyer Battalion, and will be in a southeasterly direction. After this, firing will be from the Killen area, and the firing will be in a northerly direction. NO BLANKS will be used. Until the date of actual firing, continual notices will be carried in the News as a protective measure for anyone who should happen to be in the area during the firing, and firing hours will be announced.

This, we are told, is no sham to get anyone "just to move", but actual battle shells will be used — NO BLANKS.

Navy Relief Drive Opens Sunday Thru Saturday Next



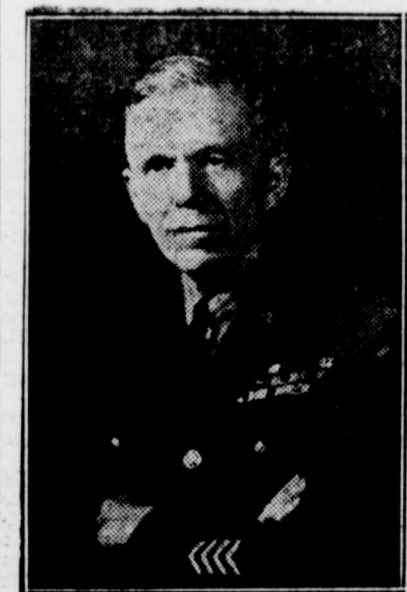
Howard Compton, local chairman of Navy Relief Drive, announces the week of April 19 to 25 is the week for this drive in Coryell county.

The 753rd Tank Battalion, Camp Hood's second contingent of fighting men, will have open house Monday and Tuesday, according to Major J. G. Felber, commanding officer.

Major Felber said that visitors would be permitted to inspect the tanks and other equipment and would be given rides in the tanks. Thanks, Major, we'll take it!

Colonel Mayberry Lions Guest at Wednesday Meeting

Colonel H. T. Mayberry, Commander of the Officers Training School which will open in Gatesville May 4, was the guest of the day at the Wednesday meeting of the Gatesville Lions' Club.

Colonel Mayberry, outlined the reason for the Officers Training Schools, saying that these men come here from various tank destroyer battalions from all over the USA, some of which are possibly already slated to go overseas. They will go thru this school, the first of its kind, to work out the best defense against tanks, and the best tank offensive. Using TD units against attacking tanks, is declared to be the best way to stop the tanks. These problems will be worked out and tried here, according to the doctrines worked out by the army officials.

In other words, Gatesville's ability to handle these officers will play a part in the rapid development of these powerful units, and for that reason, Jim McClellan who has been assisting in "billeting" (getting rooms) these men, urges that all who will, volunteer to "move over" and make room for about 40 more officers, since the billeting department is about that short of the required number of rooms.

Back to Colonel Mayberry, the tanks, he said, were not as speedy or maneuverable as the TD units, and the latter's guns moving like they can, can do the job.

Thus Ceddie's first day in the ancestral seat of the Earls of Dorincourt comes to a most auspicious close.

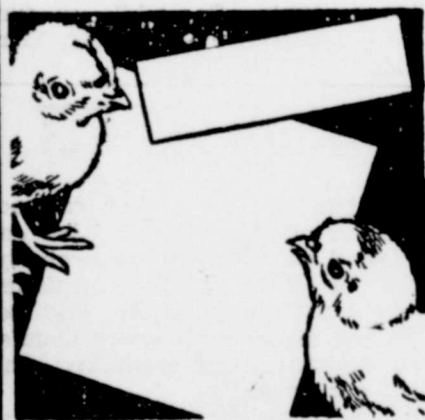

is on, "America is aroused". We will stay aroused, fully realizing that were it not for the protection of the men and women in the military service today, we, who are outside of the military service would soon be, well, just plain slaves in mind and body; and we are convinced that such would be our lot as long as we might live. This Country is made up of strains of blood from every European nation; but we are now just plain Americans. We do dedicate the lease on the property now standing in our names, together with our lives, to the proposition: that no gang of Japanese sneaks can again throw bombs on 3000 or more Americans without giving the Americans at least a sportman's notice; and further, that no gang in Germany and in Italy can say, "Hurrah for the Savages" at our expense. Tokio forgot that when they had an earthquake a few years ago we gave them many millions bushels of wheat free; Germany forgot that it was America who induced the French and English to cease

collecting reparations from Germany, which act cost us many billions of dollars; Italy forgot that the American doughboys pressure on the German lines in France kept Austria from pounding the everlasting life out of them in 1918. Let us plant the Stars and Stripes over the Capitols of each of these three peoples; and may that Flag wave there until we alone are convinced that it will be an incident these gangs will never forget; and will remember to tell their children about it as they bring them into the world. There is no alternative, The Soul of America must not die; and it will not, if we do our full part.

Now the War Department has placed in this County a large number of troops in training. The Government has called upon us to aid in providing healthy recreation centers for these men; these centers intend to keep the morale of the soldier high; and to give them a place to rest from their daily grind. The Citizens Committee accepted the call, and has leased the Sadler and the Compton buildings for these centers.

These buildings will be equipped with bath rooms, divers items of furniture, reading and writing materials, and other equipment to make these centers places where the boys can be entertained in a normal, healthful way. And from these centers the soldiers and privates and officers, will spread out to visit our homes and all public places of interest to them. Thru the Federal Security Act, and the Citizens Committee, divers sub-committees have been appointed to see after every feature of this project. Temple and Lampasas will also have these centers; and we can not afford to do less than they do.

The Finance Committee, composed of Mrs. Turk Brown, chairman, Dawson Cooper, J. F. Patterson, and E. W. Jones, Jr., will see you and take your contributions toward the budget necessary to raise to sustain these recreation facilities for the soldiers stationed in our county. The first budget covers 12 months. The rents have to be paid; and we are called upon to immediately equip these buildings for service. As we turn in our contributions from

month to month we can remember that our boys are being so cared for elsewhere, we can remember that our contributions will make the struggle a little more comfortable for just such soldiers as our own, — Sonny Hair, J. R. Saunders, Harry Voss, A. C. Bates Jr., Truman Blanton Byron McClellan, Jack Straw, Ray Byrom, Cam McGilvray, Bobbie Thomas, Rev. Werner's three sons, and Owen Glass' two sons, and many many more. In their names, we appeal to everybody to take a share in this call. Whatever we give will, after all, not be a sacrifice. The sacrifice is being made by those we intend to aid. And this committee assumed that every American is willing to serve in any military capacity. We certainly will; and we say, let us fold our tents, grasp the sword go forth and do battle in every way we can against our enemies. They have not only suppressed the peaceable minorities in their own countries; but they now seek to destroy us. May God forbid!

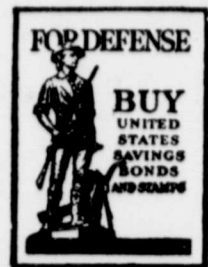

DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE MEDAL
The Distinguished-Service Medal is awarded to persons who, while serving in any capacity with the Army of the United States, distinguish themselves by exceptionally meritorious services to the Government in duty of great responsibility, and to all enlisted men of the Army to whom the certificate of merit had been granted under the conditions of previously existing law. It was instituted in 1918. On the medal the coat of arms of the United States in bronze is surrounded by a circle of dark blue enamel bearing the inscription "For Distinguished Service." On the reverse is a scroll for the name of the recipient. It is suspended by a bar from a watered-silk ribbon, composed of a band of scarlet, a stripe of dark blue, a band of white, a stripe of dark blue, and a band of scarlet.

893rd Replaces Telephone With Radio

Due to the temporary absence of telephonic communication with our headquarters in Temple, our communication platoon was called upon to establish a system to offset the ever increasing correspondence which would normally be settled by picking up the telephone. With the thought in mind that "necessity is the mother of invention", our technicians evolved a setup which is working wonderfully well.

The set now being used is a SCR 177b radio set. Although the set was originally designed to communicate 100 miles by code, 70 miles by tone, and 30 miles by voice, its range has been increased a hundredfold by experimenting with various types of antenna systems in conjunction with mild cursing. However, the set-up at Temple is quite different. There, through the courtesy of Lieut. Cross, our Battalion Communication Officer, we are using his "ham" station which is located

in the Tank Destroyer School Building.

This set also uses two receivers. One receiver ranges from 150 to 1500 kilocycles which includes all commercial radio broadcasts, and the other receiver ranges from 1500 to 18,000 kilocycles.

The power unit which supplies our power for transmitting and also charges our two storage batteries which are used for our receiver, is a PE-49-c gasoline driven motor generator.

This radio set is classed as portable, but tearing it down and putting it together is a good half-day's job for six experienced men. The set is not standard for our organization, but was shipped to our Battalion by the Signal Corps for experimental purposes. Needless to say, the experiment was a complete success!

In charge of this gigantic undertaking is Lieut. Maxwell D. Cross. Lieut. Cross is flanked by a staff of highly trained radio technicians which include Tech. Sgt. Harry O. Johnson, Staff Sgt. Al-

bert Joren, and Sgt. Clarence Nixon, all of whom were employed as radio engineers, and who owned and operated their own "ham" stations prior to entering the Army. Sgts. Joseph Battista and William Ayers are the operators who complete this skilled unit, and all are to be commended for having worked night and day to establish communication with our headquarters in Temple.
