



Washington, D. C., May 1, 1942.

Dear Friends:

This has been a most momentous week in Washington. On Monday the President sent a message to the Congress relative to the seven steps he felt should be taken to prevent inflation. Tuesday night he elaborated on this message in his radio speech to the Nation. You probably listened to that speech. Earlier that day allow the Senate to pass over his plant seizure and labor control bill, because, as he explained, there was no use making the fight in the face of the President's opposition. Finally, on yesterday afternoon, the House Committee on Naval Affairs voted by a one-vote margin (13 to 12) to table (kill) the Vinson labor control bill, which would have extended the basic work week from 40 to 48 hours, and which has been pending for some time. This vote was undoubtedly the result of the President's statement that he did not feel that there was any necessity for any increase in the hours of the basic work week, even in war industries, and that he felt no legislation would be required to control wages even though he advocated legislation to control farm prices and all

other prices. I have great respect for President Roosevelt, but I cannot agree with the theory that labor is always right and can be trusted voluntarily to keep wages down, but that our farmers are an unpatriotic group who must be coerced by law to keep their prices down. I think that, as a whole, all groups of Americans are fair and loyal, but there are selfish and disloyal laborers, just as there are selfish and even disloyal farmers, bankers and manufacturers. For that reason, I think it perfectly proper that we fix all profits, prices and wages, but as I see it, the regulation should apply to all alike. I feel that the President made a mistake in not advocating the same treatment for labor as he advocates for the farmers and for capital. I think every group should be ready to make sacrifices for the Nation, and that every organization should be responsible for its acts. There was a time when our Government winked at the special privileges that big business enjoyed. While some business still struggles to retain their special privileges, practically everyone agrees that they are not justified. Neither are labor organization entitled to the immunity from responsibility for their acts that they now enjoy. Neither should any private organization, whether it be a labor group or a private corporation, have the right to deny American citizens the opportunity to work on war jobs because of failure to pay dues to some organization.

I realize that the President's suggestion that a ceiling be placed on farm prices at 100 % of parity, seems, on its face, to be very fair, but before agreeing to such a proposal, I would want to know what is to be done about a floor under farm prices. Labor has a floor under wages (the minimum wage law.) True, this law only guarantees a bare living, but that is all the parity formula does. Even if the farmer is guaranteed parity FOR RENT OR LEASE: Building for his cotton, his wages for his work will only be about one-half hat guaranteed to the industrial laborer under the minimum wage law, and many laborers receive much more than the minimum. I am glad they do. I don't want to lower their standard, and neither does the President, but I don't think that it is unfair under the circumstances for the farmer to demand that if he is to be limited to a bare subsistence price for his products that he at least be guaranteed that he will get that price. In other words, he should be given !
