Pvt. William Kotis Dies in "Jeep" Crash; King Injured

Last Thursday night or early Friday morning, Pvt. William Kotis of the Reconnaissance Company of the 893rd Tank Destroyer Battalion was killed, and Sgt. Raymond D. Nichols received a fractured knee, very serious eye injury, in addition to additional bruises and lacerations. Pvt. Odell B. King escaped with minor injuries, including a hand and skin bruises.

The jeep hit an elm tree and the men were thrown out. The car, also was badly damaged.

Three more men from Coryell county are listed by the American Red Cross as "missing, interned or captured" in a report received by Carl McClendon.

These are Sidney V. Evans, son of Mrs. Jessie B. Evans of Leon Junction; Sam H. Gribble, son of James M. Gribble of Gatesville Rt. 1; and Willard H. Whatley.

There may be others, but this list comes from the Red Cross, which provides for support or other help for their families.

Intensive Scrap Metal Campaign Is Open in County

An intensive campaign to collect scrap metal in this area and throughout the entire state, according to D. M. Puckett, district engineer, Texas Highway Department, who is in charge of the Texas Roadside Development program. This scrap can be collected on the right-of-way lines along state highways. The state highway department trucks will pick it up as they return to section warehouses evenings, and then will be made available to the government for shipment to mills.

753rd Was "One" Yesterday and Celebrated It

Yesterday, Monday, June 1, was a birthday.

It was the birthday of the 753rd Tank Battalion, the first tank unit to make Camp Hood its "home."

With Major Joseph G. Felber commanding, the celebration started at 9:00 a. m. with a review of the entire outfit, and with a program for the day as follows:

9:45—Addresses, including Major Felber, Capt. Charles B. Davidson, giving a history of the organization, Major C. Gandy of Gatesville welcoming and inviting the men to Gatesville to complete their celebration; with the climax coming from Brigadier General A. D. Bruce, Camp Hood commandant, who said:

"You (referring to the organization) are one of the most important developments in the army, and have been performing a double service: 1. as a tactical unit, and 2. as a demonstrating combat method unit.

"Here," he continued, "you are demonstrated against the 893rd Tank Destroyer Battalion, and in actual combat these two forces will work together as a unit just as in a football game, with the tank destroyer running interference for our offensive action."

"You have performed your duties well, under a splendid officer personnel, and we know inaction against the enemy you are going to account for yourselves in a splendid manner."

In closing, the general said the Japs and Germans have played fighting, "been entertained fighting, in other words, everything they do is for fighting," and they are hard to crack. We must be trained to kill, and train to kill, because that is what they are trained for, and you and we are going to beat them."

7:30—Camp open to inspection by visitors.

5:00 p. m.—Mass movement of battalion to Gatesville for barbecue supper.

8:30 p. m.—Street dance and entertainment.

DIGEST OF WAR NEWS

Africa—

The conservative British said the situation in the Libyan desert was "not unfavorable." The RAF alone had knocked out 400 enemy vehicles in the last 48 hours. Gen. Sir Claude Auchinleck was more buoyant and his staff reported that Rommel's tanks might have been drawn into an explosive trap. "Well done, Eighth Army," said the British commander.

Germany—

The Royal Air Force Sunday sent 1,250 warplanes to the German engineering and railway city of Cologne and dropped 6,000,000 pounds of bombs on the great center with the result that it will be crippled for months. It was the greatest raid in all aerial warfare, and observers thought it might prove the curtain raiser to an invasion to smash Hitler's domination of Europe.

China—

China's Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek opened a big-scale attack against the Japs in Anhmei Province about 200 miles west of Shanghai, and, aided by guerrillas, the Chinese were hammering at the gates of the province's largest cities. The Japs, meanwhile, landed forces near the town of Kanmen on Yuhwan Island, northeast of Wenchow Bay in Chekiang Province, and attacked the defenders under naval cover. Fighting raged there.

Russia—

"Important enemy lines" on the Kalinin sector northwest of Moscow were taken, the Russians said, and about 1,00 Nazis killed and wounded on the battlefield. Only local encounters were reported on the more quiescent Kharkov front in the Ukraine. The Kharkov operation was considered a success, with German reserves having been drained and an offensive against Rostov thwarted.

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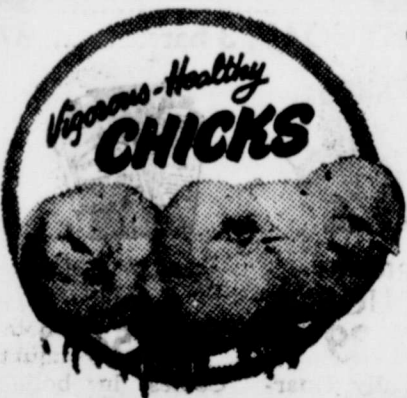

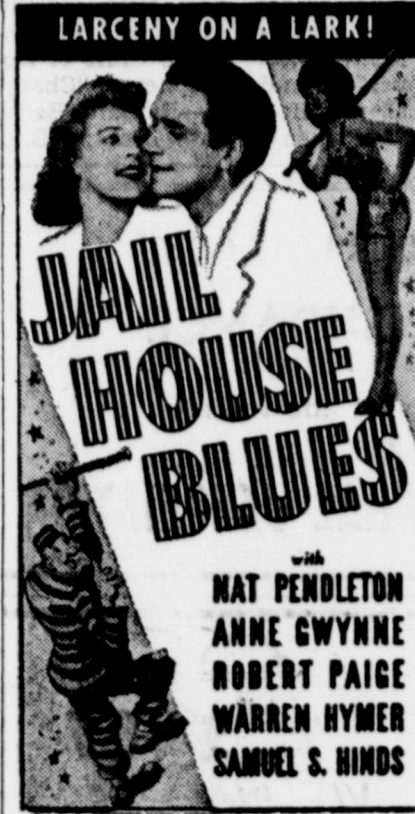
