## Registration of residential rent-

 al property by landlords will be-gin Monday, Nov. 16 in the Kil-leen-Temple defense-rental area, which means Gatesville, too.

Each house, apartment or similar rental accommodation must be
registered if it is either rented registered receiving one or two roomers must register such accommodations at this time. If rent is received from more than two, the person receiving such rent will register later
as a rooming house operator. A person may rent a house and in
turn rent rooms; if so, he registurn rent rooms; if so, he regis-
ters his rental units since he is also a landlord.
Registration forms are in tri plicate-one for the rent direc-
tor's office, one for the landlord and one for the tenant.
When the statement is received at the rent office, it will be in spected, and if in order as to cent and charges, with respect
March 1 , the carbon copies wil ne sent to the landlord and te tained in the office.
Instruction to the tenant are in
the reverse side of his copy and wise instructed by the area ren
