## FHA HOUSING PROJECTS ARE OKEHD INFORMATION TO C. OF C. ANNOUNCES

Information was received Thursday morning by the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce that Federal Housing Administration had approved both in Washington and Dallas a building program both in Gatesville and at the Gatesville end of Camp Hood for new residential buildings.

In the Gatesville itself end, 25 private housing units, or houses have been approved, and construction on these can start immediately.

In the Camp Hood northern end, approval was received for 225 re-

sidences to be built on the reservation, 240 family apartments and 236 dormitory, or single apartments.

A whole bunch of credit is due to the hard work of the Housing Committee of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce and to its officers for this start in a very necessary grant. They, and we know positively, have been working on this since April, or before, and it's not coming too soon. It is thought possible that there may be even a larger grant of houses for Gatesville.

## REV. GAINES B. HALL IS NEW PASTOR FOR PRESBYTERIANS

Rev. Gaines B. Hall, D. D., is the new pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, and comes here from Norman, Oklahoma. He replaces the Rev. Edward S. Bayless who is now a Chaplain in the U. S. Army.

Rev. Hall was State Superintendent of Home Missions for Oklahoma, and was for twelve years, pastor at Wichita Falls before going to Oklahoma.

He grew up as a boy at Turnersville, and no doubt is remembered by many old time Coryell county citizens. He will live at the Manse at 1103 E. Leon, and brings with him, his family, his wife and daughter.

### MORE ASSASIN PLOTS

Algiers, Dec. 30 (UP).—Arrest of 12 persons in connection with a plot to assassinate Gen. Henri Honore Giraud, new High Commissioner for French North Africa, and Robert Murphy, President Roosevelt's special representative, was announced by Giraud Wednesday night.

### CHINA CALLS ENVOYS HOME

Washington Dec. 30 (AP). — Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek has ordered the Chinese military mission here to come home, it was disclosed Wednesday night, and reports were current in Chinese circles that the move grew out of serious dissatisfaction in Chungking. There, ladies and gentlemen, is dynamite. Jap-Chink collaboration, the "race war" and plenty to pay. It's more than serious.

### ALLIES SHELL HILLS, TUNISIA

London, Dec. 30 (AP).—Allied artillery has shelled enemy strongholds in the Hidous Hills northeast of Medjez-el Bab, announcements from North Africa said Wednesday night as the far-flung struggles in Libya and Tunisia continued to merge slowly into a single battle for Africa.

### FLOODS IN PA.

### HITLER IS BLOATED

### BOMBERS RAID NAZI SUB BASE

London, Dec. 30 (UP).—Big American Four-motored bombers struck another blow at Germany's U-Boat fleet today, blasting the submarine nests at Lorient on the French Bay of Biscay coast and shooting down a "number of nazi fighter planes" which tried to hold them.

### COMMANDOS BOTHER JAPS

Australia, Dec. 30 (AP). —Australian commandos and Dutch guerillas are constantly harrassing the Japs thruout much of Portuguese Timor and have been doing so since the war began, it was officially disclosed today.

### MOROUDERS ATTACK IN MEX.

Mexico City, Dec. 30 (UP). — Armed bands of marauders attacked towns in the state of Zacatecas Sunday reports reaching here said tonight, but military reservists and civilian authorities repulsed them all after bloody street fighting causing at least 13 casualties.

### REDS GAIN KOTELNIKOVSKI

Moscow, Dec. 30 (UP). — The German debacle on the broad Stalingrad front swiftly approached its final stages tonight as the red army fanned out beyond captured Kotelnikovski, sweeping thru village after village and capturing 2 divisional headquarters.

### U.S. MUST FEED AFRICA

Washington, Dec. 30 (AP). — There will be "serious disturbances" in north Africa by the first of February if the United States doesn't get substantial shipments of food and clothing into that area, Milton S. Eisenhower associate director of war information predicted today.

### FARM PRICES HIGHEST IN 22 YEARS

Washington, Dec. 30 (AP).—The agriculture department reported tonight that farm prices were carried to the highest point in 22 years by a 9 point rise from Nov. 15 to Dec. 15, with virtually all commodities included.

### FORMER EDITOR OF GATESVILLE ADVANCE DIES IN DALLAS

A great old warrior, Dr. J. B. Cranfill, died in Dallas Monday at the ripe old age of 84, after a short illness. He was a long time prohibitionist leader in Texas, writer, teacher and newspaper man.

He suffered a heart attack at his Kirby Building office Thursday, and died in Baylor Hospital.

Once he was a candidate for Vice-President on the Prohibition ticket, and helped to drive the saloon from Texas, only living to see liquor return to the state again, but without the saloon.

He was son of a doctor, born Sept. 12, 1858 at Whitt, and attended public schools of Bastrop and Gonzales counties. He married Miss Oliva Allen of Crawford in 1878.

### EGAN CAREER AT TURNERSVILLE

The young doctor opened his first office in the general practice of medicine at Turnersville, soon after he obtained his license and launched the Turnersville Effort, a monthly newspaper. Later he homed to Gatesville where he established the Gatesville Advance.

Dr. Cranfill continued to practice medicine, but as editor of the paper he made it a mouthpiece for the prohibition fight. His trenchant pen forced him to edit the Advance at times with a pistol on his hip. The newspaper was moved to Waco and named the Waco Advance in 1886. He sold it two years later and bought the

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Western Baptist at Dallas, moving it to Waco and changing its name to the Baptist Standard.

After 12 years as editor of the Standard, the state Baptist denomination's official publication, which in the meantime had moved to Dallas, he sold his interest and was engaged in varied activities until his death.

He became a member of the First Baptist church 6 months after Dr. George W. Truett was named pastor and had taught the Cranfill Bible Class, one of the largest in Texas.

He made his home in Dallas living there with his daughter Miss Mabel Cranfill, after the death of Mrs. Cranfill. A son, Tom E. Cranfill, Dallas oil man, died in 1934.

Honorary degrees of doctor of law were conferred on him by Hardin-Simmons, Abilene and Baylor University, Waco. He was also author of five books, and editor and publisher of 20 others.

At various times, he was financial secretary of Baylor University, superintendent of Texas Baptist mission work, vice-president Baptist Young People's Union of America, stated lecturer at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Ft. Worth, and member of the executive board of minister's relief of Southern Baptist Convention.

He had memberships in the Philomathesian Society, Baylor, American Sociological Association, Texas Poetry Society and Old Trail Driver's Association.

He was one of the founders of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Baylor Hospital. He is survived by besides the above, five grandchildren, five

great-grandchildren, and two sisters, Mrs. Lillian Lindsey and Mrs. Elbert Renfro, Los Angeles, Calif. Services were held Tuesday at 4 p. m. at the First Baptist Church Dallas, Dr. Geo. W. Truett officiating.

VICTORY TAX— (Continued from page 1)

wages or salaries, but for businesses, these can be counted, and the tax applies to the gross net income in the case of businesses, and the gross in the case of wage or salaried people.

Single persons are allowed a credit of 25 percent of the amount of their Victory tax as a post war credit, married persons 40%, plus 2% for each dependent, but in no case, can the credit exceed \$500 for the single and \$1,000 for the married, and \$100 for each dependent.

Q. Does a person have to wait until after the war to get the post-war credits?

A. No, it may be used currently, at the option of the tax payer, as a deduction for life insurance premiums paid, for amounts paid on outstanding indebtedness or for the amounts invested in war bonds. For example, if a married person's Victory tax amounted to \$100, he could reduce his liability by 40 percent, or \$40, if he had paid out that much or more during the year for life insurance premiums, mortgage payments, or War Bond purchases. Thus his net Victory tax liability would be \$60. If he chooses, or if he had made no such payments during the year, he would pay the full amount of the Victory tax, and thereby become entitled to receive, after the cessation of hostilities, a post war credit of \$50 for the year. If only part of the Victory tax credit is used currently, the balance is refundable after the war.

Q. How is the post war credit payable?

A. It will be allowed as an offset against any taxes due from the taxpayer after the cessation of hostilities. Any balance will be refunded to the taxpayer immediately.

Q. Does the taxpayer have to file a separate return in connection with the Victory Tax?

A. No, it will be computed on the regular income tax return.

Q. How is the Victory tax paid?

A. It is deducted automatically from your salary by your employer, under a withholding provision. There you are, and now, you're as mixed up as we are.
