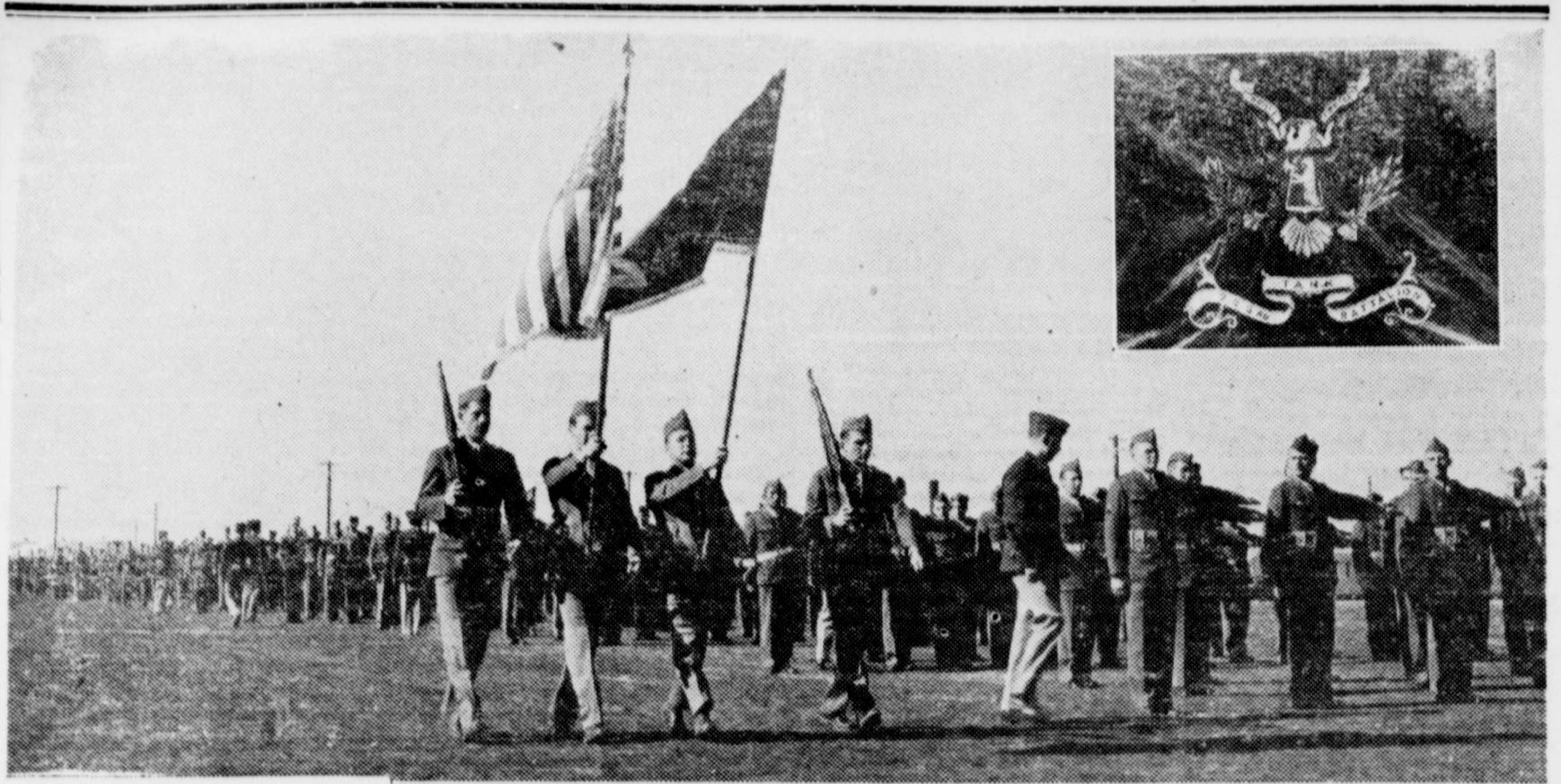

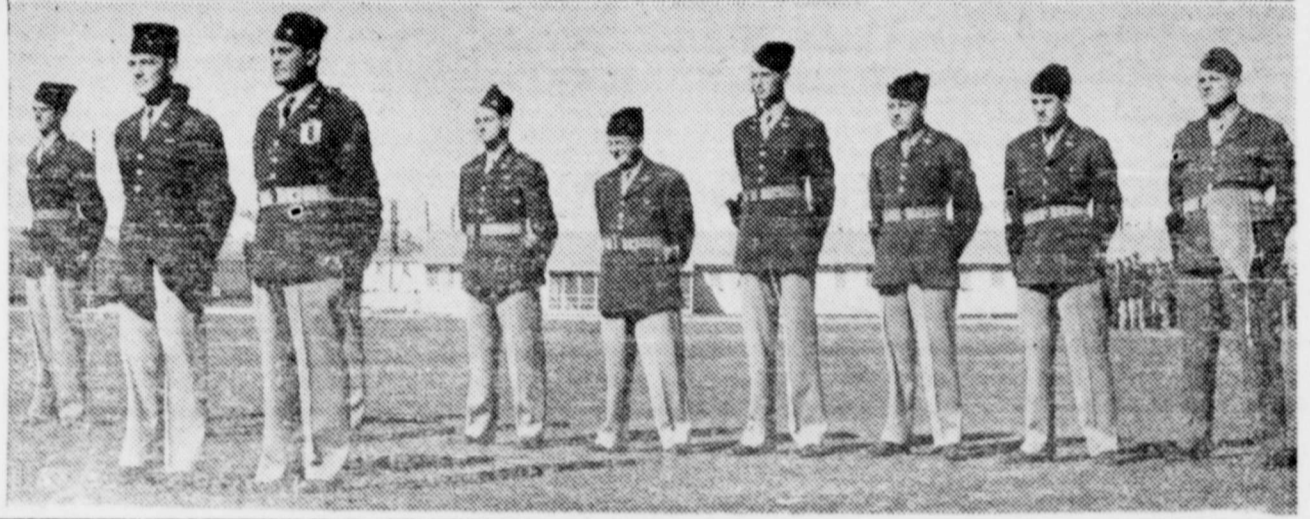

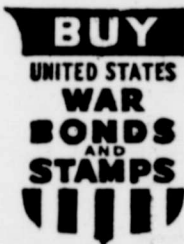

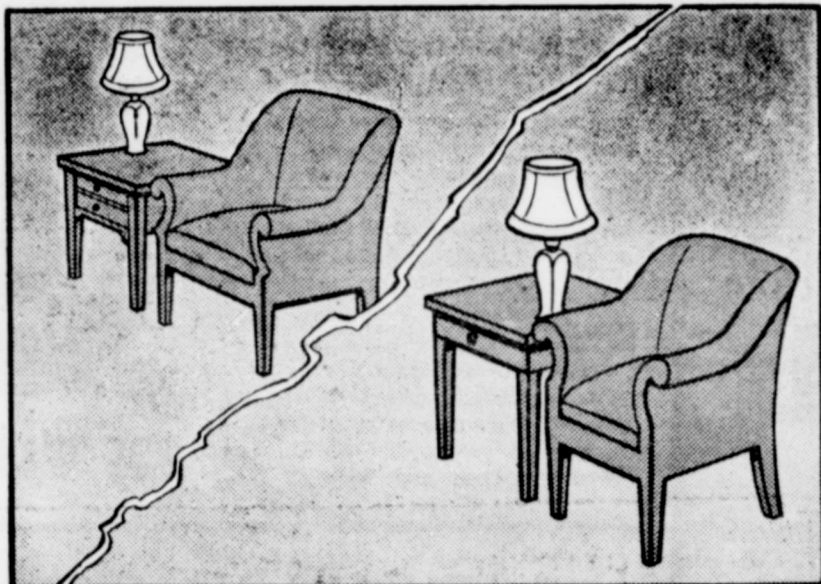

MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR LIGHTING

(No. 7 of a Series)



Place Lamps to Utilize Light Most Efficiently

The amount of useful light you get from a lamp decreases rapidly as the lamp is moved away from the working area to be lighted. Conversely, the useful light increases greatly as the light source is moved toward the working area. In the above example, merely by moving the end table lamp eight inches from the far to the near side of the table, the amount of useful light for reading or sewing was more than doubled. Remember this important point and always place chairs close to lamps. You'll not only get more light for your money, but you'll prevent needless eyestrain.

There's a Right and Wrong Way to Wire a plug

Repairing loose plugs helps conserve vital war materials, but be sure you do it right or a "short" may develop.



WRONG WAY, left, shows wires not wound around prongs first.



RIGHT WAY, right, shows wires put around prongs. When cord is yanked or jerked, pressure is put on the prongs, not the connections.

Pvt. Salvatore D. Santos, Filipino at Camp Hood, and formerly of the merchant marine, Houston, is looking for Japs.

He's circled the globe 4 times, and was on a ship sent to the bottom by a Nazi sub. When the Japs invaded the Philippines his 2 sisters and 2 brothers were taken prisoners and are now held by the Japs, and a third brother was killed in the battle of Cebu.

south to the camp. No plans have yet been announced for the construction of the remainder of the road connecting with Temple. In event of highwaters from the river would cover the detour around the camp, Colonel Thirkeld told the commission that the camp would grant emergency passage thru the cantonment area. All roads within the camp, including the Highway 36 extension, would be built by the army.

Johnson, Dec. 17, he says "They were a big reason why Rommel lost all but 50 of his tanks in Egypt on his retreat into Libya. The gun fires at high velocity and flat trajectory . . . a piercing shell that is fatal to any German tank now in Africa."

Summarizing the work being done at Camp Hood, Walter Humphrey, "The Home Tower" in the Temple Daily Telegram says, in part as follows: "3,300 men had graduated from the various branches of the TDS, which started in Gatesville last summer, and has been in Hood only since August. 44 classes have been turned out, including 12 of officer candidates.

Actually, there are 8 schools, which is graduating 100 to 150 2nd Lts., each month. Four are officers classes, in these 4 branches, Automative, Arientation, Pioneer and Tactical basic. The other 4 are enlisted men's in automotive, radio electrician and technician, pioneer, and weapons.

Besides outside wrk, there are 46 class rooms, shops, laboratories. 58% of the school's work is outdoor, and 84% practical with only 16% theoretical.

"The OCS is the largest, and at present, there are 2,006 men enrolled in the school, and a class is graduated each week, the 12th being graduated Thursday.

"There is an 8% average loss between enrollment of a class and its graduation 13 weeks later. Most of the young officers are assigned to Hood.

"Peak of the school is expected in early '43, and can graduate from 15,000 to 18,000 men before '43 ends. That's production, and (ask any OCS) not the 40 hr. kind, with time and a half!"

"The Tank Destroyer Center", Camp Hood, has force of 100% licensed water works operators according to the Post Engineer, Major H. G. Olmsted, who has worked to attain this goal.
