NEW CONGRESS PLEDGES UNITY

Washington, Jan. 6 (AP).—The 78th Congress, dubbed the Victory Congress from the rostrum of the house, met Wednesday in a mood for solemn united action to win the war and for sharp insistence on writing its own laws on domestic issues, regardless of the wishes of the White House. Believe they've got something there.

NEW GROUND WON: MATEUR

Allies, N. A. Jan. 6 (AP).—Veteran British First Army troops captured Jebel Azzag and nearby points in an attack launched Tuesday to drive the Axis enemy from high ground dominating Allied positions along a road about 15 miles west of Mateur, the Allied command announced Wed. night.

NAZIS TO INVADE NORWAY

Stockholm, Jan. 6 (AP).—The Swedish press reported Wednesday that idkum Quisling has made a list of representative Norwegians, including churchmen, to be arrested and held as hostages the moment an invasion of German held Norway occurs.

JAP AIR BASE BATTERED

Washington, Jan. 6 (AP).—In a daring foray into the Jap dominated Middle Solomons, an American force of surface warships has shelled and battered the enemy air base and installations at Munda, New Georgia Island.

BALONEY, QUICK VICTORY TALK

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP).—Elmer Davis, whose job is to keep the nation informed on the war, took exception Wednesday to a high ranking naval officer's flat prediction of victory this year.

NAZIS HURRY IN CAUCASUS

Moscow, Jan. 7 (AP).—The Red army has killed or captured 26,500 more German troops south and southwest of Stalingrad, a special communique said Thursday as front dispatches reported the Germans in disorderly retreat thru the north Caucasus.

FDR ADDRESSES 'EM THURS.

Washington, Jan. 6 (AP).—Pleasure driving is forbidden in the east, effective at noon tomorrow.

Any motorist driving to amusement place or to purely social engagements faces the cancellation off all or part of his gasoline ration, the OPA announced today.

WICKARD ACKS ON FOOD CRISIS

Washington, Jan. 6 (AP).—Food Administrator Claude R. Wickard announced tonight that committees are being organized thruout the nation to meet the "critical supply problems" that have resulted in widespread local food shortages.

10,000 IN TOKIO ALREADY

London, Jan. 6 (AP).—A British war office statement said tonight that 10,000 prisoners of war—half of them Americans—are interned in Japan. Don't look like any war'll be over in '43, does it?

Former CBS news editor Matthew Gordon has joined the literary legions fighting Axis propaganda with a punchy book, "News Is a Weapon" (Knopf). He reports that when Harold Denny, the N. Y. Times newsboy, returned to this country after being in a Nazi prison, he said: "The Nazi official questioned me about the New York Times, which he evidently hated, and revealed more knowledge of this newspaper's internal organization than I had myself. He told me of a staff change that I verified on arriving in New York!" Actually the staff change was no secret. The Times itself mentioned it. But the incident illustrates how closely Nazis follow our press, because they know it is one of their most formidable enemies.

James Gordon Bennett Sr. became a journalist in the 1820s. When he died in 1872 he was called "The World's Most Infamous Journalist" and a "black-hearted, contemptible libeler" by his kindlier enemies. Bennett was the first Washington correspondent before starting the old N. Y. Herald, which he created in a cellar, with candles as the only source of light. His initial investment was \$500. He was the entire staff, including porter. He is blamed for so-called "yellow jour-

THE FOOD PICTURE FOR 1943

What food rations civilians are assured this year will depend largely on the weather, on farmers' ability to get labor, machinery, and fertilizer, and on the complex proceeding and transportation industries.

For that reason, many forward-looking homemakers in villages and small towns will be resolving, along with rural women, to grow as much of the family's food supply as possible. Jennie Camp, specialist in home production planning for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says some prediction about 1943 food supplies may help these homemakers with their planning.

For example, the supply of cereals—flour and grain foods—will be ample. For civilians, the supply of fats and oils will be shorter, so meals in 1943 will include less fried foods, gravies, and oily dressings. Sugar supplies likely will be shorter, too, because of the transportation situation.

Consumers can expect larger quantities of sweet potatoes and dried beans and peas in '43. However, the carry-over of white potatoes is not as large as usual, Miss Camp says. The total milk supply may average about the same as last year, but war needs may mean less milk for civilians. More poultry for meat is in prospect, but eggs may be less plentiful. Meat is almost certain to be less plentiful, and it will be one of the next items to be rationed.

Fruits and vegetables are the big question mark in this year's food production, Miss Camp says, so homemakers will be smart not only to grow their own, if possible but to waste none, learn about their food values, and overcome dislikes and whims about certain foods.

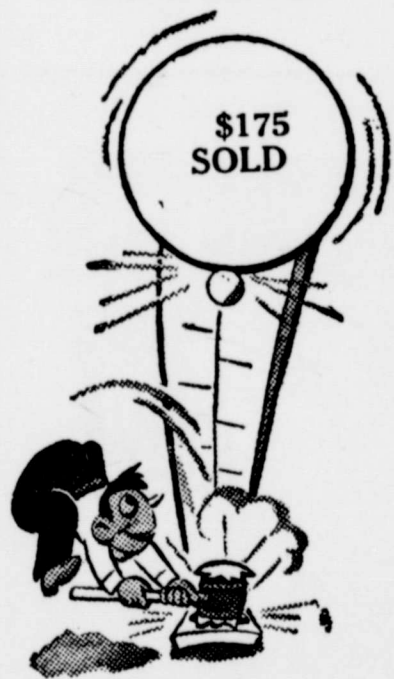

All holders of "B", "C", "D" Ration Books must have inspections made every 2 months with inspections at least 30 days apart.

Also, Your Tire Serial Numbers MUST correspond with the numbers turned into your Ration Board. In case of error, go to the Ration Board and get them corrected. When applying for new tires, you must have your motor number, license number and your Gas Ration Book Number. For Tire Inspection, you must have Gas Application papers and tires.
