3,000 At Work On New Camp Here: More In Daily

It's lose now, and already, more than 3,000 are hitting the ball, nail, dirt and everything else at the new Camp Hood, which is only four miles southwest of Gatesville.

Contracts on telephone and power lines are well advanced and two wells for the camp's water supply are already completed.

Sixty five percent of the residents have been moved off the 36,000 acre northern reservation, with the move due to be completed by February 1. Only 15 per cent movement out of the 16,000 acre southern extension of the camp has been completed, and the landowners have until March to move from there.

Gatesville CCC camp has been turned over to construction workers, and it is contemplated that the first barracks completed for the camp also will be available to workmen.

4,000 "POW" TO BE IN CAMP HOOD IN MAY: 3,000 OUR END

Soon you'll see men with "POW" painted on their backs, at least, that's what they used to have, we've heard, but anyway, effective May 15, 4,000 of these will be stationed at Camp Hood.

Three thousand of these will be assigned to the Gatesville camp and 1,000 to the first unit of Camp Hood.

Special camps will be constructed to house them, and contracts are expected to be let right away. Prison companies, including officers and enlisted men, will be assigned to Camp Hood to have charge of the administration of the two camps. Special barracks and mess halls will be provided separately for them. They will be used for cutting wood for the northern camp where wood and coal will be used for fuel.

RTC Training Begins In Hood: First Class Starts

Camp Hood's third major training organization launched its training program this week. It is the Replacement Training Center.

It started its full-fledged training schedule Monday in preparation for occupying the new cantonment 4 months from now, south of Gatesville.

The first 1,050 men to be trained reported last week and began a 13 week training program under the direction of Col. Walter Dumas, commanding officer of the new RTC.

A part of the troops have been temporarily transferred to Camp Bowie, pending completion of the new camp.

Every week, 1,050 men will report to the center and will be trained as specialists. When they have finished their training, they will be sent out as battle replacements or to fill in vacancies in tank destroyer units.

The RTC organized into five regiments, including 16 battalions, 14 of which already are in existence. Each week's trainees reporting to camp will be distributed thru the 14 battalions until they are up to full strength.

Regimental commanders include First, Major Roy Green, second, Lieut. Col. Pascal H. Ringsdorf, third, Lieut. Col. Joseph J. Fraser fourth, Lieut. Col. William H. Halstead, fifth, Lieut. Col. Francis M. Flanagan.

Colonel Dumas' headquarters staff included Col. Christian Hildebrand, executive Major Asa C. Black, S-1, Capt. S. Howard Van Dyke, S-2, Major Benjamin G. Berry S-3, and Major William J. O'Brien, S-4.

Your Overseas Soldier Can Have The Coryell County News, But YOU Can't Send It After Jan. 15

New postal restrictions on overseas shipments to Army personnel have been recently announced. These do not affect Navy, Marine or Coast Guard personnel.

This new order, issued by the Postmaster General affects the sending of this newspaper overseas to Army personnel and Army civilian employees as follows:

Individual copies of The News can't be sent to A.P.O.'s outside the continental United States unless the addressee makes a specific written request, approved by his commanding officer (battalion or similar unit). You as friend or relative, can't send the paper — only the publisher can do so and that after the soldier's request has been made and the forms complied with.

This new regulation will not affect newspaper subscriptions already going, that is prior to January 15.

U. S. FLIERS BLAST LILLE

London, Jan. 13 (AP).—Flying Fortresses defying swarms of German fighters scored numerous direct hits Wednesday on industrial plants at Lille in the third heavy raid on that German held French city and the 17th bombing attack there since it was captured by the Nazis in 1940.

STEVENSON FOR LIQUOR CURB

Austin, Jan. 13. Gov. Coke R. Stevenson Tuesday urged the Legislature to keep the state government in order for meeting war problems and preparing for return of peace. His message included prohibition of sales of all intoxicating beverages on Sunday, and also a curfew on their sales.

NEW RED OFFENSIVE

(By Associated Press)
A new Russian offensive—the 5th in the current campaign—was said Wednesday night by the Ger-

mans themselves to have been thrown in by Joseph Stalin in the area of Voronezh, the strongest Soviet position in the thousand mile stretch between Moscow and the Black Sea. This and other information suggested the possibility that the supreme Russian effort of the war was not at hand.

MINERS SPLIT ON WPB ORDER

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Jan. 13 (AP).—Striking antiacite miners in the Pennsylvania hard coal field apparently split Wednesday on an ultimatum from the War Labor Board that they return to work immediately or face possible government intervention.

NAZIS AIR FIELD RAIDED

N. Africa, Jan. 13 (AP).—American Flying Fortresses, destroying 34 Axis planes aground and aloft in a brilliant raid on Castel Beni-Airfield, 10 miles south of Tripoli, have torn a considerable

hole in the already thin air cover on which Field Marshal Erwin Rommel is depending for an effective retreat from Libya into Tunisia.

U. S. DIPLOMATS SEIZED

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP).—Germany is trying to force the release of its captured armistice commission in North Africa by seizing as hostages the American diplomats and other nationals in France.

SIX INDICTED ON BUILDING FRAUD

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP).—Attorney General Biddle announced today that a federal grand jury at Harrisburg, Pa., has returned six indictments which name nine persons and charge conspiracy to defraud, bribery, extortion and theft in connection with the building of a naval supply depot at Mechanicsburg, Pa.

Dear Friends:
Most of you who read this letter heard the President's message to Congress over the radio. You have, therefore, formed your own opinion of what he said. Personally I thought that it was one of his best speeches. It emphasized the things we all want to emphasize—the winning of the war. It did not recommend the creation of any new agencies or bureaus.—I hope that we will not be called upon to create any new "bureaus" or "administrations" for the remainder of the war. I believe we have all the country can carry and certainly we have all that we need. There is no reason that I know of why the regular departments of government should not perform all the duties of the multitude of independent "offices" and alphabetical agencies. In Canada the practice has been to have the regular departments assume all new duties. In the United States the practice has been for the President to establish some agency by executive order and then after it was full grown and performing a work that was alleged to be vital to the war effort to ask Congress to feed the child with an appropriation for its support. I hope that this practice has come to an end. The President's speech as well as the very frank speech of Speaker Rayburn on the preceding day encourages me in this hope.

There is at this time a definite feeling here that the Executive has been given all the power he can possibly need to win the war, and that the need for new legislation must be clearly justified from a military standpoint. I think this Congress is going to be ready to take any action that can be shown to be needed to win the war, but like the American people, it is going to want a clear explanation of the military necessity. I am of the definite opinion that many of the actions of various boards and bureaus are not contributing to the war effort. In some cases these regulations simply are not needed. In other cases they are needed, but the methods used are unnecessarily harsh. In still others the policy and the methods may be needed, but in too many cases the agency in charge takes the attitude that it need not explain anything to the people. To my mind this is a serious mistake. I think the people are entitled to know WHY action is taken.

With all the defects and shortcomings of our government we must, however, all take pride in the very impressive array of results secured during our first year of war. The President was able to point to a production record unequalled by any Axis nation, and to a development of military and naval might that must give Hitler many a gray hair. We are all proud of this record and of the government that has done the job. Let us all resolve to make it an even better job in 1943.

One interesting side-light on the organization of the House reflects the inability of most people to stand prosperity. In years past the Democrats had a top-heavy majority in the House. The small Republican minority was outstanding for its unity of purpose and action. This year the Republicans have almost as many members as the Democrats. At the first gathering of the Republicans the meeting was, I am told, marked by prolonged and violent disagreement. On the other hand, the reduced Democratic Delegation held the most harmonious caucus I have ever witnessed. Of course, this Democratic harmony may not last now that we have elected the Speaker and organized the House, but I hope that it may be a warning to all of us that when this war is won the United Na-

tions simply can not afford to fall out between themselves. The defeat of the Axis armies is only part of the job. We must turn the violators of law over to the officials of the conquered lands for punishment. We must right the wrongs that the Axis has committed. We must exercise the power needed to control the Axis Nations and to police them so that they can never again throw the world into chaos. Then we must establish a fair system of international trade and exchange. We must do these things to protect our own children and their children. To do these things we must have the help and cooperation of our Allies. We can not afford to assume this burden alone. We must not, therefore, let an incomplete success lead us to dissension as it seems to have led the Republican party.
